RE: Prop I information for the Harm Reduction Therapy Center to consolidate staff into a single leased location at 21 Merlin Street, San Francisco 94107

The purpose of this memo is to provide a summary and supporting documentation pertaining to the hearing scheduled for August 3, 2021 at the full Health Commission for a new DPH project, and to document the Department's compliance with its own Good Neighbor Policy. It should be noted that the Health Commission's approval action is the authorization for the Department to enter into contracts that fund a "project". In this case, however, the funding to support the proposed new leased site will occur through a reallocation of existing funding within the Harm Reduction Therapy Center (HRTC) contract. As a result, there is not a corresponding contract subject to approval at the August 3, 2021 Health Commission meeting. Instead, this hearing will provide an opportunity for the Health Commission to hear comments and concerns, if any, with the proposed site.

The Department established its Good Neighbor Policy following Citywide legislation adopted in June 1998, to allow interested residents to bring concerns regarding City funded projects involving new construction, a change in use, or a significant expansion of an existing use at a specific location to a public hearing. The Department's Good Neighbor Policy includes public posting requirements established in the City's legislation, referenced as "Prop I" and detailed in Chapter 79 of the San Francisco Administrative Code. Additionally, the Good Neighbor Policy requires the Department to convene a minimum of two public meetings, with the second meeting being held before the Health Commission.

Under the Good Neighbor Policy two meetings are required to allow interested residents and the public-at -large to bring concerns or comments pertaining to HRTC's proposed lease at 21 Merlin Street. The first of these was held as a community meeting on July 12, 2021. The second will occur at the August 3, 2021 full Health Commission. DPH completed its signage posting for the required community meeting and for the Health Commission hearing on July 1, 2021. There were 40 attendees at the July 12, 2021 community meeting (attendees included Department staff, HRTC representatives, and the public). There was no opposition raised, and all questions were addressed.

In compliance with Chapter 79 of the San Francisco Administrative Code, (put into effect July 9, 1998 upon the passage by voters of Proposition I "Citizens Right to Know" Act of 1998), and the Department of Public Health's (DPH) "Good Neighbor Policy", established in response to Chapter 79, the purpose of this meeting is for the DPH Health Commission to allow interested persons and the public-at-large the opportunity to bring up their concerns prior to the final funding and approval of a project. (Note: The Health Commission's approval action is to authorize the Department to enter into the contract that funds a "project". In this case, however, the rental funding to support the proposed new leased site will occur through a reallocation of existing funding within the existing and approved HRTC contract).

# **Notice and Meeting Requirements**

Public notice of a proposed new City project must be posted at least 15 days prior to the date at which a new City project will be considered for approval (i.e. the Health Commission). In lieu of signposting requirements, notices may be mailed to property owners within 300 feet of the lot line of the property. # **Required Community Meeting**

DPH's Good Neighbor Policy establishes a required community meeting to be held prior to the Health Commission meeting (the second required meeting) for the involved contractor to give information to interested neighbors and the public-at-large about the project, and also to receive input from the public about any concerns regarding the project. Additionally, the Good Neighbor Policy speaks to DPH's commitment to ongoing collaborative work with its neighbors.

DPH and HRTC hosted a community meeting virtually on a Zoom platform on July 12, 2021. The meeting began with a welcome hosted by Pat Denning, PhD, followed by introductions of all attendees including HRTC staff, then a history of the agency, and a description of the scope of work provided to various areas of CCSF. Based on Zoom data, there were 40 attendees (attendees included Department and HRTC staff and representatives plus the public). There was no opposition voiced at the meeting and multiple attendees expressed support.



# Affachment IV

Dear Neighbors,



We are a group of 15 licensed psychologists, social workers, and marriage and family therapists who work with people with mental health disabilities, supported by an administrative and program support team of 4. We are very happy to be moving to a new space on Merlin Street, thus consolidating our staff into one location after 20 years of maintaining multiple locations in Oakland, San Francisco, and in many community-based organizations (CBO's) with which we have contracts to provide onsite mental health services.

In 1993 we began offering private harm reduction psychotherapy to people with complex emotional problems that led to difficulties with alcohol and drugs. We quickly became known as a group that could help by offering an alternative to 12 step programs which, powerful as they can be, do not treat multiple problems simultaneously. This led to local, national, and international attention as we produced hundreds of trainings, consultations, and conferences as well as many books and professional papers.

In 2001 we were invited to bring our integrated mental health and substance use treatment model to other social service agencies and medical clinics in San Francisco. Over the years, we grew from 4 to 9 community-based programs, where we locate therapists in organizations that serve homeless and mentally ill/dually diagnosed residents of San Francisco. We currently locate therapists in 4 partner agencies, two that specialize in working with youth.

Three years ago, knowing how successful we were at working with very complex people, the city of San Francisco's Department of Public Health Behavioral Health Service asked us to develop a "Homeless Treatment Team" for youth. We created mobile "pop-up" mental health clinics in 5 different neighborhoods in San Francisco using large vans converted into therapy offices, and bringing the equipment, supplies, warm food, and other medical and mental health services to meet the emergency and longer-term needs of homeless youth. This program grew to include adults.

COVID forced us to minimize our mobile programs but, knowing our ability to connect with, nurture, and calm many complicated people, we were asked to provide mental health staff in some Shelter-in-Place hotels. This has been an amazing effort, and we have learned how important it is to stay close and connected with people, *including our staff!* 

Because most of our work occurs at so many different locations each week, it has become increasingly important to have a "home base", and we think 21 Merlin is perfect for this! We will set up offices and workstations for our staff and offer clients the opportunity to come for scheduled or drop-in appointments. The space is large enough to create comfortable waiting areas inside, so there will be no need for people to wait outdoors. We envision a warm, nurturing, and calming environment for both staff and clients.

### HRTC Community Meeting – July 12, 2021

This virtual meeting was on Zoom and began at 6:00pm.

Pat Denning, HRTC's Director of Clinical Services and Training hosted the meeting and began by asking all attendees to introduce themselves and announcing that the meeting would be recorded.

There were 40 attendees, counting the host and BOCC. As the introductions were experienced there were many who emphasized their support for the HRTC re-location. Attendees included the public identifying themselves as community members, Board of Director members from HRTC and several other organizations, the Yerba Buena Benefit District, a representative from the Sheriff's Office of Community Programs, someone working at a nearby Navigation Center, private practitioners, and persons who identified as neighbors.

After introductions were complete, Ms. Denning provided a history of the Agency, their recent operational practices, and their vision. She described the organization as consisting of 15 LPHA (Licensed Professionals of the Healing Arts) as well as 4 administrative persons. She described the purpose of the re-location as their desire to consolidate staff in one location. Since 1993 they have been providing integrated mental health/substance abuse therapy with a harm reduction model that has been recognized nationally and internationally; their books have been translated around the world. In 2000 their nonprofit organization was created.

Their model has included placing therapists within other organizations and currently they do so at 4 organizations, two of which specialize with youth. They have consistently seen approximately 1000 unduplicated clients each year. Their model emphasizes a "come as you are" approach where no one is turned away. They build relationships with clients who then can decide at their own pace where to start regarding treatment and recovery. Recently they innovated the placement of "pop-up" clinics on streets where they would park their vans or set up a canopy. The idea is to provide a relaxing place for client respite and the development of trust, with snacks and food provided. The COVID pandemic minimized the in-person gatherings, but outreach efforts continued, and services were provided in the shelter-in-place hotels.

HRTC views the proposed site as a calming, out-of-the-way place away from the noisy streets. The daily operation means that 2/3 of the staff are out in the neighborhoods in their vans, other organizations, or working to provide respite at a canopy. The new address is envisioned as a place that will be attractive to those clients who are ready for a more stable therapeutic relationship.

Daily operating hours will be 10am until 6pm, Monday through Friday. Expanded evening hours are envisioned in the future. Their vision also includes the expansion of staff to include a psychiatrist in the future so that medications can be prescribed on site.

HRTC envisions a brief build-out of the new premises and then opening in late August or early September; an Open House for the neighborhood will be held upon the new site being ready. The estimated client traffic will be 15-20 clients daily.

The meeting was then opened up to questions and comments.

# Attachment V (2 of 2)

One question was regarding their outreach to the nearby SOMA neighborhood, which was confirmed by Ms. Denning, who added that they work closely with Street Medicine and make referrals to primary care and psychiatric care. With their pop-ups and vans, HRTC has been serving many districts of San Francisco, including Bayview, South of Market, Tenderloin, Haight, and Mission. She mentioned that as the pandemic winds down, HRTC will once again be in these neighborhoods.

Another question about waiting lists led to Ms. Denning's description of how HRTC provides immediate access to services without any waiting lists. This often means providing immediate care to clients in crisis. She emphasized that there are no time limits with their services and clients can be served endlessly because HRTC recognizes that it often takes time to make changes.

In response to another question, Ms. Denning described their relationship with the Sheriff's Department, which will be nearby the new offices; they currently receive referrals from that source. She underscored that while HRTC works with many clients who are in various legal systems, HRTC is not accountable to such legal systems and only discloses a client's involvement with HRTC at the request of the client.

There being no further questions or comments, the meeting was closed at approximately 7pm.
