### Task Force (TF) Mapping Procedures

#### Principles:

- The TF will provide Q2 with specific instructions for a starting point for the first maps to be presented to the Task Force on 3-2-22 the first mapping meeting of the TF.
- Mapping requests and changes will be initiated by the TF and they will work with Q2 who will draw the next requested iterative map.
- Discussions will be focused on Communities of Interest, Neighborhoods, District Boundaries, Census Data and compliance with The Voting Rights Act.
- Allow Task Force to explore multiple paths or maps.
- Offer clear forward direction and clarity for the mapping process status at the end of each meeting.

#### Communication

Liaisons on process, clarification or info/questions between TF and Q2 for mapping will be Members Matt Castillon and Chasel Lee. Members Castillon and Chasel Lee will be in charge of coordinating the process and keeping a written log of what feedback or input is incorporated in each map. This feedback should be reflected in the public record and in the Final Report.

#### Task-Force Centralized Mapping for Follow Up Maps

TF members will initiate all requests for maps or mapping changes.

After the members have shared their comments there will be a recommendation to advance one of the prior maps with specific changes.

Where possible the TF will attempt to advance the next stage of the mapping process off a chosen specific and hopefully single map. If needed multiple map will be advanced but the goal will be to always advance off of one specific map.

As the new map is selected the TF will ask Q2 to come back with that map as the basis with 2 or 3 new/different versions on the next iteration.

After the TF has provided their direction to Q2 there will be public comment.

The members may again discuss the maps and any changes they would like to see if any.

The map may then be advanced without further changes or with changes recommended and approved by the TF. If consensus has been reached then the mapping request will be advanced to Q2. If there is no consensus, a formal vote may be taken.

This will be the process the TF will follow at each mapping meeting until the final map is selected on or before April 14<sup>th</sup>.

Groups and the public may submit their maps to the TF through the public website, and TF members may pick parts or all of a map to incorporate into their mapping requests. In order to maintain fairness, all outside feedback will be evaluated independently and no outside individual will be given preferential treatment over any other member of the public.

• Specifically, non-TF generated maps are a form of public comment, and no publicly generated maps will be directly presented to a member of the TF by an interest group or non-task force member.

#### Sample Mapping Advancement and Naming Sequence:

-Mapping Day 1 (3-2-22): TF provides parameters to Q2 to create Map 1 A

-3-9-22 Q2 provides Map 1 A to the TF for discussion on 3-14-22

-Mapping Day 2(3-14-22): TF provides new mapping instructions of boundary changes to Map 1 A

Q2 will return next mapping day with the changes to Map 1 A which will be returned named: Maps 2 A & 2 B

-Mapping Day 3(3-23-22): Q2 will return on next mapping day with the changes requested by TF on Maps 2 A & 2 B

- TF motions through consensus or vote to move Map 2 B forward
- TF provides new mapping instructions of boundary changes to Map 2 B which will then be returned named: Maps 3 A, 3 B and perhaps a 3 C.

\*From here on in mapping days will be numbered but not dated as dates may be added as we go along.

-Mapping Day 4: Q2 will return on next mapping day with the changes requested by TF on Maps 3 A, 3 B, & 3 C

- TF motions through consensus or vote to move Map 3 C forward
- TF provides new mapping instructions of boundary changes to Map 3 C which will then be returned named: Maps 4 A & 4 B.

-Mapping Day 5: Q2 will return on next mapping day with the changes requested by TF on Maps 4 A & 4 B

- TF motions through consensus or vote to move map 4 A forward
- TF provides new mapping instructions of boundary changes to Map 4 A which will then be returned named: Maps 5 A & 5 B

The mapping continues as noted above until a final map is voted on.

#### **Live Line Drawing**

Line drawing is conducted during public sessions at officially agendized task force meetings. Line drawing may also occur at any other designated mapping meetings if the TF decided to do so. Combination of mapping and line drawing meetings may occur at the discretion of the TF.

Two specific dates, because of Q2 turn around requirements have been designated as line drawing days. They are 3-26-22 and 4-9-22.

Consultants (Q2) will be present with a mapper and digital maps at the ready.

The Task Force can start with existing lines, or with someone's proposed new lines, or with a blank map. In some cases the task force may work up "visualizations," which may be rough-sketch districts, and proceed from there.


The Chair or designee will focus on a particular area and then begin taking input from other Task Force members about particular lines.

TF members are free to give whatever reasons they think germane to their proposals, whether it were public input, or balancing populations, or known neighborhood boundaries.


#### 1. Only one change could be considered at a time (though mappers could undo past changes as needed).

Line mapping will be done by consensus.



# **Public Input and Communities of Interest**

# Introduction: What is Redistricting?

San Francisco has 11 supervisorial districts, used to elect the Board of Supervisors.

Redistricting is the process of adjusting the existing supervisorial district boundaries.

Redistricting happens every 10 years, after the release of the decennial Census data used to balance the populations of the supervisorial districts.

Redistricting provides the opportunity to bring the existing districts into compliance with all redistricting criteria.

No draft maps have yet been created by the Redistricting Task Force.

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# What are the criteria for redistricting?

- Compliance with US and CA Constitution (equal population)
- Compliance with Federal Voting Rights Act (FVRA) which addresses race and language minorities
- Preserve recognized neighborhoods
- Preserve Communities of Interest (COIs)
- > Contiguity
- Compactness



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# Recognized Neighborhoods and Communities of Interest (COIs)

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<u>**Recognized Neighborhoods</u>** are generally based on data and geography collected from official sources (like the Planning Department). Neighborhood data may be submitted by members of the public as well. Neighborhoods may vary in size and definition depending on who is defining them.</u>

<u>Communities of Interest</u> are generally described as a population of residents that share common interests (such as social, cultural, and economic interests) that should be included within a single district for purposes of its effective and fair representation.

COIs are defined by those familiar with the community...

Law does not limit the kinds of interests that may bind a community.

It is up to those who live in or work in a community to identify and establish the interests that unite it.

Interests need not be limited to current situation but can also include common goals.

Communities of Interest <u>do not</u> include relationships with political parties, incumbents, or political candidates.



# **Examples of Common Interests**

## Economic interests:

Current situation -- common employment or economic opportunities (or lack thereof).

Goals -- expanding opportunities, development, job creation

## Social interests:

Current -- schools, transportation, parks, housing

Goals -- improving recreational opportunities or public safety, preserving historic resources

Cultural interests:

Current -- holidays, cultural businesses

Goals – cultural-meeting centers, official recognition through cultural districts



# Tell us about your Community of Interest

What is your Community of Interest? What ties you together? What common interests do you share?

<u>Where is your Community of Interest?</u> What are the boundaries of your community (streets, parks)? Where is it on the map? What is different or the same about the areas around your community?

To Whom it May concern:

I am a homeowner and a longtime resident of Potrero Hill. My property is located on San Bruno Avenue and 18th.

It has come to my attention that there is a proposal to redraw the district, which effectively splits up Potrero hill. If this proposal is accepted, our street would become part of District 9 (Mission), rather than District 10 (Potrero/Bayview).

One reason that I am concerned: The first draft of the District 10 map has a population of 78,967. Keeping Potrero Hill whole—that is, restoring the area between 16th and 22th, Potrero and Kansas to District 10—would add 1,480 people to the district. The resulting population of 80,447 is only 1.13% above the target district population and well within the 5% deviation allowed by law to maintain a Community of Interest such as a recognized neighborhood.

I fail to understand the reasoning behind the new boundaries and would suggest rethinking the idea to split up neighborhoods, such as ours.

Dear Members of the San Francisco Redistricting Task Force:

The letter is in follow-up to my 1/22/2022 letter to you and the Redistricting Task Force Remote Meeting for District 2 on Saturday, February 26, 2022.

Late afternoon today, I received word through my neighbors that you have put together a revised Redistricting Map for which we are to respond by tomorrow. My response to this latest Redistricting Map is that it is contradictory to what you said you look for when assessing and balancing community needs with redistricting criteria. One our call, you explained that you try keep neighborhoods together as a community where they meet in their daily lives such as shared shopping areas and restaurants, entertainment and outdoor activities, places of worship, where they gather as a community to connect in the shared neighborhood experiences, support Neighborhood businesses and support services and we support each other in common interests and goals.

I can't speak for the west most sides of Districts 1 and 2 because they are not our neighborhood. I was surprised to hear that District 1 feel aligned with Sea Cliff and that they share the same neighborhood interests, shopping at the same stores, frequenting the same restaurants and their kids attend the same schools and that they feel strongly that they should be included in the same community because of these shared mutually interest in issues concerning these areas.

However, what I can respond to is the proposed Redistricting lines on the map I received today for our neighborhood in District 2. I am speaking specifically about the redistricting line from Arguello to Fillmore along the southern edge of the California Street corridor of District 2.

The first speaker on our Saturday who identified himself as a Judge, on the board of the PUC, who resides and belongs to the Pacific Height's Residents Association (PHRA) in Pacific Heights (see at the end). He stated clearly how important it was not to make the changes proposed to the redistricting lines of District2 because they would detrimentally impact our neighborhood community.

From this latest map, it looks like you have carved out Jorden Park, Laurel Village, Laurel Height, and it seems parts of Pacific Heights from around Arguello to Presidio Avenue. These neighborhoods are not only very much connected by the two grocery stores at Laurel Village (Cal-mart and Bryans Market) but also by the food uses like Peets Coffee, Starbucks, Susie's Cupcakes. There is the new Proposition Chicken Restaurant along with the New Super-Duper Burger. Panda Express is going in, there is a new furniture store, Walgreens, Ace Hardware, Wells Fargo, Bank of America, Union Bank and Old Republic Bank. There's also Sephora, Chicos Clothing, not to mention the second-floor dental offices at Laurel Village that service the surrounding communities. It is our family-oriented, collective, within walking distance neighborhood shopping area. It is where we all meet during our everyday lives.

These same neighborhoods have another couple of blocks that have and will continue to be shared which you have also cut out. That is the 10-acre site that touches all our neighborhoods known as 3333 California Street. The Judge was very clear that he and other taxpayers in Pacific Heights fought for, supported the City of S.F. to get the project approved as part of their vision for housing, goods and services that will be shared by our neighborhoods get incorporated into our collective community.

The Jewish Community Center was also a big supporter of that redevelopment project which will benefit them and their members in the years to come. I know we won't take kindly to having that entire 10-acre site removed from District 2 and put into District 1 after all the time, effort, sweat and tears we all put into the process. If I'm seeing this correctly, in the same block not only is the S.F.F.D. Credit Union across the street from the JCC carved out but Fire Station 10 at Pine and Masonic on Presidio Avenue has also been carved out into District 1. Why? These members are huge part of our community and we ask that they NOT be removed from District 2.

It appears the redistricting line for District 2 ends at Steiner and California, eliminating all the businesses in that last block of California Street between Steiner and Fillmore on the south side of the street include Mollie Stone's Market which is seen here included in District 3. Why would you consider removing our beloved Laurel Village and the redevelopment project of 3300 California and Fire Department Credit Union along with Fire Station 10 from District 2? They are the center point for our Pacific Heights, Jorden Park, Laurel Heights, and the Lower Pacific Heights neighborhood area. I ask that you to take another look at what has been put before us and reconsider needlessly breaking up our neighborhood and shattering our community. If Sea Cliff wants to be included in District 1, it's not for us but them to sell to you.

Working together and knowing we support common goals and shared interest in public safety, economic issues, housing for the homeless as well as social and culturally diverse issues, we create a more inclusive and productive community we can all share in the Jordon Park, Pacific Heights, Laurel Heights/laurel village neighborhoods.

We maintain a strong bond with the other neighborhoods under the current umbrella of District 2 and have for many years. We are interested in maintaining the diversity we have while meeting similar goals within the current lines of District 2 and do not understand or want to see our sense of community as well as the productive working relationships we have developed and nurture within our community disrupted or altered unnecessarily.

	I support your decision to put Jordan Park, Laurel Heights, North of Lake, West Clay Park from District 2 back into the Richmond in District 1. What doesn't make sense is to have the Sea Cliff neighborhood, which is clearly part of the Richmond, be physically separate from the rest of District 2. Since it is a legal requirement to "create geographically compact and contiguous districts," Sea Cliff must be included in D1. In addition, Sea Cliff is part of the Community of Interest that is the Richmond District. Residents who live in Sea Cliff shop at Laurel Village and on Clement Street more than they do on Chestnut Street and Fillmore Street. I'm writing to support the D3 United Neighborhoods Plan. I am a resident of the Gateway Apartments and Townhomes on the waterfront just north of the Embarcadero Center between Jackson and Washington Streets, built under the Golden Gateway - Lower Embarcadero Redevelopment Plan of the 1960s. Our multi-racial, multi-ethnic and multigenerational waterfront community is closely connected with the other neighborhoods in the northeast corner of San Francisco shown in the D3 United Neighborhoods Map and have common interests in this corner of the city.

This is historic San Francisco. The city grew rapidly here following the Gold Rush. Buildings on Van Ness Avenue, our natural boundary to the west, were blown up to create the firebreak to stop the spread of the great fire following the 1906 earthquake. In my 25 years with the San Francisco Planning Department, this very northeasterly part of San Francisco was always considered distinct.

We are both a community and top tourist destination. Our "Main Street" is Columbus Avenue. The Barbary Coast Waterfront, Jackson Square, North Beach and Telegraph Hill are on the east, and Chinatown, Nob Hill and Russian Hill on the west. Ghirardelli Square, the Cannery, Fisherman's Wharf, Pier 39 and Pier 45 are on the north, and Market Street and Union Square on the south.

These areas are important to the city's history and its gradually returning tourist economy. We must have a supervisor who understands the relationships in this community of varied but very related interests. These residential neighborhoods often have a common voice on issues. The necessary geographic enlargement of our district is welcome, as it would allow adding the missing corner along north Van Ness Avenue.

Some competing maps before you would split us up, tear us apart. They would dramatically remake our representation when it would be so simple just to extend our NW corner to Van Ness Avenue. Unite the Russian Hill neighborhood and keep us and our neighbors together. Please keep it simple. Reaching the required population in D3 does not have to be complicated.






A significant piece of information seems to have been left out of the considerations in establishing the proposed boundaries of D9 and D10. The boundary as drawn splits the Dogpatch & NW Potrero Hill Green Benefit District (which is managed by Public Works and not OEWD) between 2 supervisorial districts in a most awkward way. Please see the attached map indicating the proposed district boundary and the boundaries of the Green Benefit District.


The odd jog in the boundary is unpleasantly reminiscent of the part of Potrero Hill redlined in the 1930s.. That map is also attached.

I identify with my working class neighbors (homeowners and renters alike). I love our longtime small businesses, many of which cater to the diverse needs of the community, especially Chinese and Russian. As a 74 year old Chinese American, I am especially grateful for our community spaces such as the Golden Gate Park Senior Center. Their senior art program transformed me to become an art-tivist.

My son and daughter-in-law are part of the 60% renters who thankfully live in a rent controlled unit. They now live close so they can assist us with our needs as we age. We are still living in a pandemic and both my husband and I are immune-compromised. If they were not able to find their rent controlled unit, I doubt we could be together in this. During this pandemic and anti-Asian violence moment, which I directly experienced, young working class renters and student neighbors stepped forward to help me with our grocery shopping and be a walking buddy.

This is how the values, shared backgrounds, experiences and identities of D1 have enhanced my quality of life. I strongly urge you to support the Community Unity map. The Unity Map satisfies the need to add residents to D1.

Changing district lines to include the Sea Clift makes no sense. I sense ulterior motives. The proposal to include the Sea Cliff is in contradiction to how district lines should be drawn. The West of Twin Peaks Central Council redistricting committee met and examined the redistricting plan presented by the "Coalition for San Francisco Neighborhoods" which keeps most of District 7 intact and gives us enough population to qualify until the next census. The issue was presented to the delegates representing multiple neighborhoods in District 7 and on the West Side and the majority have agreed to endorse the plan as presented.

Preserving "communities of interest" is a vitally important criteria for redistricting. A community of interest is a concept defined in the California Constitution as a group of people that share a common social or economic interest that can be understood geographically, like people who share the same bus lines, live in a similar type of housing or speak the same language.

District 7 is an area that shares social, historical, and geographical features. Further identified by landmarks, main roads and natural boundaries, neighborhoods with historic homeowner associations and integrity, churches, schools and other unique other characteristics. District 7 is a "core" district with shared communities of interest. Our district is contiguous, compact and can be equally populated without a lot of changes to the existing district.

Generally speaking, we are aware that there will be tweaks in the mapping process to achieve your directive to balance the population in each district, we feel that map submitted keeps D7 intact with minimal disruption.


1. There are geographical and topographical borders that warrant keeping the neighborhoods on the West side together such as Twin Peaks.

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



Incredibly disappointed that I was not given the opportunity to speak. I sent an email on 2/24 (below) but I also wanted to speak during the Public Comment portion at tonight's meeting.

## Had you called on me, here is what I was planning to say:

### Good evening Task Force Members.

My name is Gary Pegueros.

I have been a resident of South Beach for the past 18 years and have served on the Board for the Neighborhood Assoc for South Beach / Rincon / Mission Bay since it began in 2008. I have also been the volunteer NERT Coordinator for these same neighborhoods since 2009.

It's over these last few decades that we've seen the considerable planning and development of South Beach and our adjacent neighborhoods including SoMa, Mission Bay and the East Cut, among others. These neighborhoods have been transformed over these many years due in part to the sizeable influx of residents, and there's much development still to continue.

We share many of the same issues and challenges – some of which are:

- the need for improved public transit based on growing number of residential bldgs
- concern over increasing street congestion based on our proximity to the Bay Bridge and nearby freeways
- the need for parks and open spaces, as well as local school options
- the need for affordable, neighborhood-serving retail and services

• a concern over sea level rise given our proximity to the bay

Dear Redistricting Task Force members,

The South of Market neighborhoods including The East Cut (Rincon, TransBay), South Beach, Yerba Buena, Eastern and Western SoMa, along with Mission Bay and Treasure Island (and Mission Rock and Central SoMa as they are developed) all share common and essential needs and should be viewed together as a Community of Interest unit. Born of light industrial uses, freeway networks, and brown fields, these neighborhoods—our home--are the result of decades of planning. But there is more work to be done for our neighborhoods to thrive – work that is easier to accomplish together than apart.

This exponential growth from Treasure Island to the Embarcadero to Mission Bay to Western SoMa is the desired result of a cluster of redevelopment projects that are now emerging as densely populated, diverse communities working to establish ourselves as fully realized neighborhoods, integrated into the city fabric.

We are keenly aware that District 6 grew more rapidly over the last decade than any other district--adding the most housing, and most **affordable** housing (30%+in some areas) to the city--and as a result the district must now realign its borders to cede some population to other districts to meet the Redistricting formulas. **What we ask is that our neighborhoods—those cited in our opening sentence--be kept together.** We all share a common urban form and common challenges of not-yet-established San Francisco neighborhoods. Together with the just-emerging City and Port development areas adjacent--Mission Rock and the Central SoMa Plan Area--our core needs are shaped by common influences.

As the South Beach | Rincon | Mission Bay Neighborhood Association (founded in 2008), we recognized the need early on for a cohesive voice to represent these fledgling redevelopment areas at City Hall, and the equally pressing need to build a sense of community and pride of place as new neighbors moved into the area.

Our neighborhoods were built from the ground up (or massively renovated) and require unified attention. All the good planning that went into creating these new neighborhoods did not account for some basic and essential needs. We have no local school options in communities where we are building thousands of family housing units. We have limited affordable, neighborhood-serving retail where people across our diverse economic spectrum can shop for groceries, hardware, and other needs. We need to transform streets that were built to give fast arterial access to the Bay Bridge and freeways into safe, pedestrian-friendly neighborhood streets. We share common health and safety risks being situated adjacent to freeways, the Bay Bridge, and the Port. We lack an adequate network of parks, recreation and open space. And looking ahead, we share challenges related to sea level rise.

Together, we are building socially, culturally and economically diverse neighborhoods. We CAN solve for the common challenges we face, but doing so requires a systemic and cohesive response. The synergies between our emerging neighborhoods are clear and we need to move forward together as a recognized community of interest.

For the many reasons above, we see Market Street as a natural separation or boundary. The street grid and mix of uses changes markedly between north and south of Market Street. The neighborhoods North of Market are established. Although the issues there are acute and variable depending on specific blocks, there are many similarities in these established neighborhoods. The neighborhoods South of Market, by contrast, are either mostly industrial PDR areas transitioning to denser growth with a more diverse mix of uses, or--where the bulk of the growth has happened--are the former/current redevelopment areas and planning department areas cited above.

Within this context, we hope you see the clear synergies and needs for the joint advocacy that we have pursued for more than a decade ... and need to continue going forward as a clearly defined community of interest. Working together, we hope to bloom into a network of established neighborhoods firmly rooted in our shared history, but it will take another decade or more to make this happen. Please keep the District 6 area south of Market and including Mission Bay and Treasure Island intact.

To the Redistricting Task Force:

My wife and I have lived in Central SoMa since January, 2009, moving downtown from Noe Valley. For 25 years, I worked in offices downtown before retiring two years ago. Since moving to Central SoMa, I enjoyed walking to the financial district for work and to Union Square for shopping. Increasingly, we are concerned about the nature of the neighborhood. Our friends from around the city are reluctant to visit for dinner or social events, or attending the neighborhood theaters. They worry about being accosted, having their car damaged. They wonder why we moved to this neighborhood. Walking through crowds of drug-dealers and users to get carry-out or to go to the movies troubles us.

We became engaged in the neighborhood over the development of 5M, the displacement of the Filipino residents, and the likely disruption of traffic in the area. We also shop and seek services in the Central SoMa area. I'm writing to support the need to keep Mid-Market whole and ensure that Central SoMa and the Tenderloin remain together. These two areas share commonalities that should be clearly acknowledged in any redistricting considerations.

Central SoMa shares, with the Tenderloin, the same populations: aging, marginalized communities of color and low-income individuals and young families, the unhoused, many organizations for supportive services, numerous SROs, new housing for residents with specific needs (e.g., unhoused families, aged, recovering drug dependent, etc.), non-English and non-Spanish speakers, drug influenced (drying centers for alcohol and drugs). And both border on Civic Center, both Central SoMa and the Tenderloin lack open space and city and private parks. Both have limited local school opportunities and limited affordable housing. And both house city, state, and national offices, with people from around the city going to work, from around the state attending meetings, and from around the country going to courts and offices.

As an example of how common political representation is important to this area, note that the Tenderloin and Southern Police districts split the Col, diminishing service along the border. Tenderloin Police Service covers the Tenderloin, across Market, to the northern side of Mission Street. Across Mission Street, a similar Col operates freely: Tents, drug sales and open use, SRO-residents blocking the sidewalk, sales of stolen goods, and other problematic behavior. We need common representation to extend the Tenderloin Police district to Folsom, or the Southern District further north beyond Market. Only a representative for both Communities of Interest could engage this problem.

How the district lines emerge from this review will influence the use and availability of community resources, of political representation, of solutions to the challenges in this neighborhood. We want to see efforts to make this combined residential and commercial area succeed, something that can happen when it is seen as a unified part of the city. Efforts to improve Mid-Market can only succeed when these communities are represented as one.

Market street isn't a dividing line, it is the integral backbone of the area. Market Street growth and revitalization helps both the Tenderloin and Central SoMa.

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Hello! My name is Al Perez, from the Filipino American Arts Exposition. We are the organizers of the annual Pistahan Filipino Parade and Festival at the Yerba Buena Gardens and many other Filipino and Asian cultural events in San Francisco. I also serve as a Commissioner of the San Francisco Entertainment Commission. I have been a volunteer with the Pistahan Filipino Parade and Festival for 20 years. I'm writing to advocate for the Filipino Community of Interest in D6.

Many of you might not know that the Filipino community has a long history of displacement and being negatively impacted by urban renewal and redevelopment in San Francisco — from the 1977 midnight forcible eviction of Filipino residents out of the historic International Hotel on Kearny Street, and the displacement of 4,000 Filipino families to make way for the redevelopment of the Moscone Convention Center and the Yerba Buena Gardens Complex 2 decades later. Unfortunately, that history of displacement continues to this day, with the gentrification of the SOMA in the last 10 years.

Since the early 70s, Filipino families found refuge in South of Market to advocate for equality and equity, pursue the American Dream, raise their families, and to put down roots there – living side-by-side and in harmony with our Chinese, Vietnamese, African American, LGBT and multi-racial neighbors.

I ask this Commission to keep the Filipino community together in District 6. There are 3,159 Filipino residents in the SOMA, 1,460 in the Tenderloin, and 293 in The Hub who share the same history, culture and language.

As you'll see in the Community of Interest Map that I submitted, there are over 22 nonprofit organizations serving the Filipino community, 20 Filipino-owned businesses, 15 public spaces, 10 cultural events and festivals, 3 murals and even a beautiful park named after Victoria Manalo Draves, who was born and raised in the SOMA and was the first Asian American to win Olympic Gold medal at the 1948 Summer Olympics in London.

Thank you, Commissioners for keeping the Filipino community intact and preserving D6 as one of the most diverse and dynamic districts in all of San Francisco.





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Dear Redistricting Task Force members,

Our South of Market neighborhoods including The East Cut (Rincon, TransBay), South Beach, Yerba Buena, Eastern and Western SoMa, along with Mission Bay and Treasure Island (and Mission Rock and Central SoMa as they are developed) all share common and essential needs and should be viewed together as a Community of Interest unit. Born of light industrial uses, freeway networks, and brown fields, these neighborhoods—our home--are the result of decades of planning. But there is more work to be done for our new neighborhoods to thrive and fully integrate with the neighborhood enclaves that predated these planning efforts – work easier to accomplish together than apart.

We are keenly aware that District 6, by plan, grew and diversified more rapidly over the last decade than any other district--adding the most housing, and most **affordable** housing (30%+in some areas) to the city-and as a result the district must now realign its borders to cede some population to other districts to meet the Redistricting formulas. **We ask that our neighborhoods—those cited in our opening sentence--be kept together.** We share a common urban form and the challenges of not-yet-established San Francisco neighborhoods. Together with the justemerging City and Port development areas adjacent--Mission Rock and the Central SoMa Plan Area--our core needs are shaped by these common influences.

Our new neighborhoods were built from the ground up (or massively renovated) and require unified attention. All the good planning that went into creating these neighborhoods did not account for some basic and essential needs. We have no local school options in communities where we are building thousands of family housing units. We have limited affordable, neighborhood-serving retail where people across our diverse economic spectrum can shop for groceries, hardware, and other needs. We need to transform streets that were built to give fast arterial access to the Bay Bridge and freeways into safe, pedestrian-friendly neighborhood streets. We share common health and safety risks being situated adjacent to freeways, the Bay Bridge, and the Port. We lack an adequate network of parks, recreation and open space. And looking ahead, we share challenges related to sea level rise.

Together, we are building socially, culturally and economically diverse neighborhoods. We CAN solve for the common challenges we face, but doing so requires a systemic and cohesive response. The synergies between our emerging neighborhoods are clear and we need to move forward together as a recognized community of interest. We see Market Street as a natural separation or boundary. The street grid and mix of uses changes markedly between north and south of Market Street. The neighborhoods North of Market are established, with acute and specific issues shaped by their complex cultural history and topography. The neighborhoods South of Market, by contrast, are either mostly industrial PDR areas transitioning to denser growth with a more diverse mix of uses, or--where the bulk of the growth has happened--are the former/current redevelopment areas and planning department areas cited above.

Within this context, we hope you see the clear synergies and needs for the joint advocacy that our emerging neighborhood residents have pursued for more than a decade ... and need to continue going forward as a clearly defined community of interest. Working together, we hope to bloom into a network of established neighborhoods firmly rooted in our shared history, but it will take another decade or more to make this happen.

# Please keep the District 6 area south of Market and including Mission Bay and Treasure Island intact.

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Dear Commissioners,

My name is Marily Mondejar, CEO of the Filipina Women's Network, and a long term resident of District 6 since 1995. I was a former commissioner in the 2012 San Francisco Redistricting Task Force appointed by the late Mayor Ed Lee. I also served as president for three years, vice president for two years, and three years as commissioner of the Commission on Community Investment and Infrastructure (CCII), the successor agency of the San Francisco Redevelopment Commission. I was also appointed by the late Mayor Ed Lee.

As you may know, D6 is one of the largest development projects of CCII which displaced thousands of Filipinos to build Yerba Buena, Mission Bay, Transbay Terminal, and the South of Market areas where the SOMA Pilipinas Cultural District and Tenderloin are located.

I write to appeal to the San Francisco Redistricting Task Force to keep the Filipino Community in District 6 intact. The Filipino Communities of Interest in D6 have been developed through the years to serve the unique and cultural needs of the community as well as our allies and neighbors - Chinese, Latinx, African American, Vietnamese and other multi-racial communities.

The Filipino community has suffered evictions and displacements from D3 to D6. **D6 has 5,687 Filipinos** who consider D6 their home, like me. The Tenderloin alone has **1,460 Filipino residents**. **The entire Filipino population in San Francisco is 52,199.** These numbers are from the 2019 American Community Survey (ACS).

FILIPINO COMMUNITY NARRATIVE:

- Filipino families historically have been displaced from the Manilatown community hub around Kearny and Jackson Streets, a community that thrived from the 1920s to the late 1970s.
- More than 1,000 residents lived in Manilatown plus about 30,000 transient laborers and farmworkers in the agriculture, fishing, construction, and shipyard industries.
- The Filipinos were gradually evicted by the SF Redevelopment Agency headed by Justin Herman to make room for the growth of the financial district, known as "urban renewal.".
- The final straw was the I-Hotel midnight eviction by 400 riot police led by Sheriff Richard Hongisto on August 4, 1977. This is considered by historians as "the most offensive action by authorities in San Francisco history."
- Filipinos, a resilient community, then migrated to the Yerba Buena area, SOMA and the Tenderloin areas in D6 which is now the significant hub of Filipino culture, activism, and community.
- Again, the SF Redevelopment Agency displaced over 4,000 Filipinos to make way for the construction of the Yerba Buena Gardens complex, the Moscone Convention

Center, museums, and luxury hotels.

- The Filipinos developed services to suit the needs of Filipino families and children, opening restaurants, small groceries and small businesses.
- Nonprofits were organized in D6 to serve the needs of seniors, and developing afterschool programs for the middle and high school kids.
- Significantly gang violence prevention and gun buy-back programs have been successful in helping the Filipino youth live productive lives.
- Many Filipino immigrants were born and raised in D6. Many went to Bessie Carmichael Elementary School, worshipped at St. Patrick's Church, and played sports at small parks and a rec center at the heart of SOMA with other multicultural residents which make up the rich diversity of D6.
- The Filipinos use the Bart and Muni transportation hubs to get to work, and their children to get to schools and colleges.

Now that the Filipino families have established roots, please do NOT split the community. Please keep our community together.

We were told that Mayor London Breed is wanting to move the Tenderloin to D5. Do NOT do that. This will splinter the Filipino community's voting block and we will lose 1,460 Filipinos. With only 5,687 Filipinos in D6, we are working hard to build our votership so we can elect a Filipino supervisor.

The Communities of Interest map shows the many businesses and nonprofits, community centers, churches, markets, parks, schools, transportation hubs and annual cultural events that are critical to our Filipino heritage and families.

The Filipinos have been displaced numerous times. Help us protect and preserve the Filipino, Asian, Latinx, African American communities and other minority groups in D6.

**I support the proposed Community Unity Map.** There is a move to ADD the Transportation Hubs that are vital to the D6 residents - I also support this motion. It will help the D6 residents who commute and rely on these transportation hubs.

Attached is the D6 Community of Interests Map - The Transportation Hubs (green) as well as the MUNI Metro and BART lines (pink) are highlighted.



Dear Task Force Members:

Bill Sorro Housing Program (BiSHoP) was created in 2009 by a group of committed community workers and volunteers inspired by Bill Sorro's work to promote social change. BiSHoP was initially established to provide tenants' rights workshops to the families of WWII Filipino veterans who were primarily living in the South of Market and then expanded its services citywide.

BiSHoP has been at the forefront of assisting San Franciscans in accessing affordable housing and providing tenants' rights counseling. Our service provides case management which encompasses the following: counseling in pre-application process by introducing to DAHLIA, creating an account for DAHLIA, counseling in lottery and post-application processes, advocating in denial processes, counseling in move-in cost and lease agreements, recertification processes and basic tenants' rights especially in these times of pandemic. Moreover, our services expanded to support other populations in South of Market and Tenderloin by serving extremely low to low income families and individuals including immigrants, seniors, people with disabilities, as well as formerly incarcerated, veterans, LGBTQ, the homeless and SoMa workers. In addition, BiSHoP is the only organization with two Arabic-speaking housing counselors where many of our clients reside in Tenderloin area. BiSHoP also receives clientele from Treasure Island area and many of them are part of re-entry programs looking for affordable housing.

BiSHoP also continues to advocate for language and digital access as many housing programs provided by the local and state are now shifting digitally which becomes a big barrier in accessing these services. For this reason, BiSHoP service continues to be a high need especially in District 6.

Moreover, BiSHoP advocated for the creation of Filipino Cultural Heritage District in 2016. During this creation, the community recognized many Ellis Act evictions, OMI evictions and other forms of displacement through unlawful rent increases, harassment, and wrongful evictions which threatened and continues to threaten of now very small Filipino community in South of Market. Both Tenderloin and South of Market are main historical core of District 6 and has historical roots of working class communities. We urge you to keep in mind the most marginalized communities in District 6 despite the high development in this district for the last ten years which led to hyper-gentrification of the most vulnerable.

BiSHoP is a member of SOMA Pilipinas; we urge you to respect the Transgender District, SOMA Pilipinas Filipino Cultural District, and the Leather and LGBTQ Cultural District which should remain in D6.We are also working with the Community Unity Map Coalition, which has engaged over 75 organizations as well as countless individuals in a citywide mapping process that prioritizes working class and low income communities of color. Our process and map seeks to preserve Communities of Interests and historic neighborhoods across all 11 districts.

Thank you for your time and hope you take these comments into consideration.

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### Hello,

My name is Francoise Decatrel. I live in District 6 in one of the buildings across from Mint Plaza. I am a working professional as well as a District 6 based business owner. My building is live/work so I spend the bulk of my time in this area. I moved to District 6 (and San Francisco) one year ago. My husband and I chose this area because it reminded us of New York- it feels like a city. I feel there is so much potential to make this area vibrant and a destination for work, nightlife, shopping and dining. Soma, Mission Bay, etc. collectively are a community of interest as it is different from any other neighborhood in the city. As Covid has had such an impact due to all the vacant offices, this community needs more attention now than ever.

Like many other of my neighbors, I am concerned about District 6 being divided. I feel my neighborhood is on the cusp- it could become great or it could keep going down hill. Following is why I feel that District 6 should not be divided.

- I have watched from my building in Soma as children play on objects that homeless people have urinated on within the same 24 hour period. We need more park space that is safe and clean for all ages and demographics.
- I would like to see more businesses open here. I have spoken with some of the store owners in the area and blocks such as Jessie and Stevenson are very difficult for them. I went to grab a coffee the other day and watched a woman in the midst of a psychotic break hit herself repeatedly. She wasn't wearing pants. She was sitting right next to the Blue Bottle door. I didn't feel comfortable walking past her and so moved on. Though I am very sympathetic to this woman and won't go into that now, I feel sorry for this small business as well as the others on the block who are not getting the help that they need. Another example would be the Cannabis dispensary (The Vapor Room) on Stevenson. I would like to stop in and support them but am afraid to walk down the block as are many of my neighbors.
- I know the drug dealers in the neighborhoods because I see them selling drugs all day long, every day of the week. If my area goes to the Tenderloin this will only get worse.

But separating District 6 and merging Soma with the Tenderloin the funds will not be funneled to things like park space, cleaning up crime on the streets, and helping small businesses. Please, reconsider dividing District 6 as I would love to stay in the area but need to see that there is some hope on the horizon. This area has so much potential and its business can and should cater to all demographics.

At the Redistricting Task Force's District 6 hearing on January 14, 2022, Task Force members expressed their frustration with  $Q^2$  that they didn't have anything more definitive in the way of ethnicity data than the broad racial categories provided by the U.S. Census Bureau for the adjusted 2020 Decennial Census and the Bureau's 2015-2019 ACS estimate of Citizen Voting Age Populations for racial categories. They rightly stated that "Asians" covered a wide spectrum of nationalities ranging from Pakistani and East Indian, to Indonesian and Filipino, Vietnamese, Chinese, Korean, and Japanese, who have major cultural and religious differences and do not necessarily vote as a voting bloc.

The problem wasn't with  $Q^2$ , rather it was due to the failure of the Census Bureau to release its 100% Summary Files #1 and #2 which would identify the precise number of residents by national origin down to the Census Tract level, as they did in 2011, and after previous censuses.

In response, I wrote Director Arntz to see if he could provide me with Excel Sheets showing the total number of foreign-born registered voters in District 6 and in selective supervisorial districts elsewhere in the City by country or territory of birth. Within 24 hours he sent me the first set of files and then Shirley Yu per my request reformatted the files by precinct and country of origin alphabetically.

The data that I developed and will share with you below, was quite instructive, and I prepared color coded maps showing the percentage of the registered voters by precinct of specific nationalities for Asian, Latin American and Middle Eastern voters, which informed my line drawing.

I discussed the data and my methodology with Karin MacDonald the other day and she rightly cautioned me about the limitations of the data I am sharing with you.

The data do not capture the 10%-20% of foreign-born voters who didn't indicate their place of birth on their voter registration forms, nor does it include foreign-born naturalized citizens who are not registered to vote, non-citizens who are not registered to vote, and second and third generation Americans who identified as Asian, Hispanic, etc. with the U.S. Census Bureau, but are not so indicated on the Master Voter File, thus even though the percentage of Asian CVAP and Hispanics CVAP in District 6 is estimated to be 34.82% and 12.42%, respectively, the foreign-born Asians and Hispanics as a percentage of the 44,589 registered voters of District 6 are 15.20% Asian and 2.92% Hispanic. North African and Near Eastern Arabs make up another 1.60%; Russians, Ukrainians, Belarusians, and Moldovans 0.85%; and the rest, mostly other Europeans, Sub-Saharan Africans, and Caribbeans constitute 2.20% of the registered voters of District 6 are foreign-born.

By nationality, the twelve largest foreign-born nationalities in the district are 1) Chinese, 3,146 (7.06%); 2) Filipino, 1,614 (3.62%); 3) Vietnamese, 702 (1.58%); 4) East Indian, 552 (1.24%), 5) Mexican, 380 (0.85%), 6) Yemeni, 246 (.55%). 7) Korean, 220 (0.49%), 8) Russian, 175 (0.39%), 9) Salvadoran, 173 (0.39%), 10) Nicaraguan, 148 (0.33%), 11) Ukrainian, 146 (0.33%), and (12) Iranian, 109 (0.25 (0.24%).

Please see the matrix below for the detailed concentration of foreign-born registered voters when they constitute more than 1% of the registered voters of a particular precinct. The precincts are listed numerically and grouped together by neighborhood.

District 10 is probably the most diverse community in the city, stretching from the bedroom communities of Visitacion Valley, through the historically African American Bayview, including the new developments along Third Street in Dogpatch, and topped by Potrero Hill, a once working class, but now wealthy community.

D 10 may be diverse but it shares a unifying common denominator, we are the only community in San Francisco with large tracts of undeveloped land. From the Cow Palace to 16th Street we will become the next San Francisco. Our community will experience the next explosion of development and the population growth that follows. For that reason, it is very important that we design D 10 not only for the present but also for the future.

If I had my way, I would try to keep the Bayview together with Dogpatch and Potrero. My reasoning for that is this; Bayview has some of the lowest voter turnout in the city. Averaging around 50% of all registered voters. That compares to the ~80% turnout in Dogpatch and Potrero. If D 10 loses the politically engaged northern neighborhoods the district then loses all of our political clout since Visitation Valley has a similarly low turnout. Developers will steamroll the communities that are barely hanging on and we will see the complete exodus out of our historical African American middle-class neighborhood. Visitation Valley could join with D 11 where voter turnout averages in the 70% range.

Another reason I see to keep the eastern neighborhoods together is that they share a bayside boundary. As sea levels rise and new infrastructure is constructed to buffer the bayside communities, it makes sense to include all bayside neighborhoods in the same plans and have unified representation speaking for these communities.

I hope you take my comments seriously and I thank you for your work.

The Barbary Coast Neighborhood Association (BCNA) has submitted a proposed plan for District 3 (D3) in concert with other D3 neighborhoods. A change to current D3 borders was needed to balance population equity—we didn't have enough people compared to other districts—and this was done by adding a section of northern Russian Hill (currently in D2) to D3 and retaining all other existing boundaries.

That is the only change it is proposing. The plan meets the RTF criteria of population equity, communities of interest, and neighborhood unification.

A competing plan has been proposed which would carve up our district in a radical fashion. Regrettably I must vehemently object to the way our district, D3, has been treated in the proposed CSFN map. CSFN, in the process of developing this map failed to consult *anyone* or *make any investigation* of the needs and sentiments of our District 3 (D3). As a CSFN member, BCNA was only informed of the CSFN process, report and map on a few days' notice. The report's author, Christopher Bowman, who prepared the map and report for CSFN had no contact with our BCNA neighborhood organization nor, indeed to the best my knowledge, with *any* resident of D3. Several other neighborhood members of CSFN have similar objections to the proposed map.

CSFN delegates were informed of and shown the contents of his report only days before the CSFN February 2022 meeting at which it was approved as an "Emergency Resolution". Although we understand that Mr. Bowman was the sole person doing a very large task as well as recovering in his VA Retirement Center from a hip fracture in December 2021, the report remains unresponsive to D3 neighborhoods and several others who have similar objections to the process and specific objections to the treatment of *their* neighborhoods..

Because the timing of the report's due date to RTF was too close to follow CSFN rules for the normal one month or more interval to bring proposed resolutions back to the CSFN Delegate's neighborhood organization Boards and members, it was hastily voted on to be sent as an Emergency Resolution. And I would note that most of the delegate representatives of the San Francisco neighborhood organizations who voted in favor were from districts little affected by the proposed new redistricting map .

I ask that RTF recognize that the CSFN submission of the Bowman map and its single person development is not representative of either the considered views of neighborhood's affected citizens or their neighborhood organizations.
