Task Force (TF) Mapping Procedures

Principles:

- The TF will provide Q2 with specific instructions for a starting point for the first maps to be presented to the Task Force on 3-2-22 the first mapping meeting of the TF.
- Mapping requests and changes will be initiated by the TF and they will work with Q2 who will draw the next requested iterative map.
- Discussions will be focused on Communities of Interest, Neighborhoods, District Boundaries, Census Data and compliance with The Voting Rights Act.
- Allow Task Force to explore multiple paths or maps.
- Offer clear forward direction and clarity for the mapping process status at the end of each meeting.

Communication

Liaisons on process, clarification or info/questions between TF and Q2 for mapping will be Members Matt Castillon and Chasel Lee. Members Castillon and Chasel Lee will be in charge of coordinating the process and keeping a written log of what feedback or input is incorporated in each map. This feedback should be reflected in the public record and in the Final Report.

Task-Force Centralized Mapping for Follow Up Maps

TF members will initiate all requests for maps or mapping changes.

After the members have shared their comments there will be a recommendation to advance one of the prior maps with specific changes.

Where possible the TF will attempt to advance the next stage of the mapping process off a chosen specific and hopefully single map. If needed multiple map will be advanced but the goal will be to always advance off of one specific map.

As the new map is selected the TF will ask Q2 to come back with that map as the basis with 2 or 3 new/different versions on the next iteration.

After the TF has provided their direction to Q2 there will be public comment.

The members may again discuss the maps and any changes they would like to see if any.

The map may then be advanced without further changes or with changes recommended and approved by the TF. If consensus has been reached then the mapping request will be advanced to Q2. If there is no consensus, a formal vote may be taken.

This will be the process the TF will follow at each mapping meeting until the final map is selected on or before April 14th.

Groups and the public may submit their maps to the TF through the public website, and TF members may pick parts or all of a map to incorporate into their mapping requests. In order to maintain fairness, all outside feedback will be evaluated independently and no outside individual will be given preferential treatment over any other member of the public.

• Specifically, non-TF generated maps are a form of public comment, and no publicly generated maps will be directly presented to a member of the TF by an interest group or non-task force member.

Sample Mapping Advancement and Naming Sequence:

-Mapping Day 1 (3-2-22): TF provides parameters to Q2 to create Map 1 A

-3-9-22 Q2 provides Map 1 A to the TF for discussion on 3-14-22

-Mapping Day 2 (3-14-22):

• TF provides new mapping instructions of boundary changes to Map 1 A which will then be returned named Maps 2 A and 2 B.

-Mapping Day 3 (3-23-22): Q2 will return next mapping day with changes requested by TF - Maps 2 A & 2 B

- TF motions through consensus or vote to move one of the maps let's say Map 2 B forward
- TF provides new mapping instructions of boundary changes to Map 2 B which will then be returned, if there are three, named Maps 3 A, 3 B and perhaps a 3 C.

*From here on in mapping days will be numbered but not dated as dates may be added as we go along.

-Mapping Day 4: Q2 will return next mapping day with changes requested by TF - Maps 3 A, 3 B, & 3 C

- TF motions through consensus or vote to move let's say Map 3 C forward
- TF provides new mapping instructions of boundary changes to Map 3 C which will then be returned, if there are two, named Maps 4 A & 4 B.

-Mapping Day 5: Q2 will return next mapping day with changes requested by TF - Maps 4 A & 4 B

- TF motions through consensus or vote to move map let's say 4 A forward.
- TF provides new mapping instructions of boundary changes to Map 4 A which will then be returned, if there are two, named Maps 5 A & 5 B.

The mapping continues as noted above until a final map is voted on.

Live Line Drawing

Line drawing is conducted during public sessions at officially agendized task force meetings. Line drawing may also occur at any other designated mapping meetings if the TF decided to do so. Combination of mapping and line drawing meetings may occur at the discretion of the TF.

Two specific dates, because of Q2 turn around requirements have been designated as line drawing days. They are 3-26-22 and 4-9-22.

Consultants (Q2) will be present with a mapper and digital maps at the ready.

The Task Force can start with existing lines, or with someone's proposed new lines, or with a blank map. In some cases the task force may work up "visualizations," which may be rough-sketch districts, and proceed from there.

The Chair or designee will focus on a particular area and then begin taking input from other Task Force members about particular lines.

TF members are free to give whatever reasons they think germane to their proposals, whether it were public input, or balancing populations, or known neighborhood boundaries.

1. Only one change could be considered at a time (though mappers could undo past changes as needed).

Line mapping will be done by consensus.

It's all iterative: after an area is finished (an area could be a district, multiple districts or any area of San Francisco) then public input would come in, and the TF might also do further research, and then revisit that area and make changes

Force requested be made to Map 4 A, which was drawn in the Task Force's live line drawing meeting on March 26, 2022. Map 4 A was Maps 4 B, 4 C, and 4 D were drawn to adhere to the following Task Force direction. This direction was based off changes the Task posted on the Task Force's website and map viewer on 3/28/2022. The Task Force direction for these maps is as follows


- Include Haight Ashbury with District 8
- Make the Tenderloin and SOMA west of 2nd Street and north of I-80 whole in one district while maintaining the publicly submitted definition of Chinatown District 3
- Explore maintaining 16th Street west of the 280 and potentially add in Showplace Square as the northern line of District 10
 - Explore including the Dogpatch with District 10
- Explore maintaining the Sacramento Street boundary of District 3, and potentially unifying the Financial District in District 3
- Explore including Portola with Sunnydale, Visitacion Valley, University Mound, Little Hollywood, Bayview and Hunter's Point in District 10


The boundaries of publicly submitted Communities of Interest were respected when possible in the creation of each of these maps.


Because the Task Force must adhere to district population requirements as outlined in the Charter, it is not possible to accomplish all of the above direction in one map. Some of this direction was implemented in each map. Map 4 B moves Haight Ashbury into district 8B; includes Portola with Sunnydale, Visitacion Valley, University Mound, Little Hollywood, Bayview and Hunter's Point in district 10B; and maintains the district 3B boundary of Sacramento Street. These changes cause shifts to other districts, including but not limited to moving part of SOMA into district 5B, the boundary between 8B and 9B shifting west to balance population, and the boundary between 6B and 10B moving south to balance population.



As a result, the boundary between 6C and 3C is moved north to Pacific Avenue and the Map 4 C moves Dogpatch into district 10C, adjusting the boundary between districts 10C and 6C to 16th Street per Task Force boundary between 8C and 7C is moved east, among other changes in the districts to balance population.



- Move the border between Districts 8 and 9 to Guerrero
- Keep Potrero Hill unified in one district
- Keep the OMI Neighborhoods in District 11
 - Unify South Beach
- The boundaries of publicly submitted Communities of Interest were respected when possible in the creation of both maps. Drawing districts to +/-5% deviation is acceptable to respect the boundaries of recognized neighborhoods


With the exception of including Sunnydale with district 10A, each of these goals outlined by the Task Force is accomplished in Map 2 A to the extent possible given discrepancies between census geography and neighborhood boundaries.


compensate for the population change in district 6B. The Financial District was added to district 6B to help balance between districts 3B and 6B and to avoid creating further large-scale impacts on the map that would contradict the direction listed above. All of the direction outlined above is accomplished in Map 2 B to the extent possible given discrepancies between Map 2 B is based on Map 2 A as a starting point. Sunnydale is included in district 10B, and so the northern border of that district moved south to accommodate the added population. As a result, the Tenderloin is included with district 3B to census geography and neighborhood boundaries.







































































Mapping and Public Input

Introduction: What is Redistricting?

- San Francisco has 11 supervisorial districts, used to elect the Board of Supervisors.
- Redistricting is the process of adjusting the existing supervisorial district boundaries.
- the decennial Census data used to balance the populations Redistricting happens every ten years, after the release of of the supervisorial districts.
- Redistricting provides the opportunity to bring the existing districts into compliance with all redistricting criteria.

What are the criteria for redistricting?

- Compliance with US and CA Constitution (equal population)
- Compliance with the federal Voting Rights Act (VRA)
- Preservation of recognized neighborhoods
- Preservation of communities of interest (Cols)
- Contiguity
- ➤ Compactness



Constitution and the Voting Rights Act

- U.S. Constitution requires that districts be of roughly equal population.
- Population variations between districts should be limited are necessary to keep recognized neighborhoods intact. variations, limited to 5% of the mean ($\pm 3,977$ people), to $\pm 1\%$ of the mean (± 795 people) unless additional
- to protect the voting power of racial and language minorities. District map must comply with the Voting Rights Act (VRA)



Recognized Neighborhoods and Communities of Interest

- public as well. Neighborhoods may vary in size and definition depending on who is defining them. sources like the Planning Department. Neighborhood data may be submitted by members of the <u>Recognized neighborhoods</u> are generally based on data and geography collected from official А
- common interests (such as social, economic, or cultural interests) that should be included within a Communities of interest (Cols) are generally described as a population of residents that share single district for purposes of its effective and fair representation. А
- Cols are defined by those familiar with the community.
- Law does not limit the kinds of interests that may bind a community.
- It is up to those who live in or work with a community to identify and establish the interests that unite it. А
- Interests need not be limited to the current situation but can also include common goals.
- Communities of Interest do NOT include relationships with political parties, incumbents, or political candidates. А



Examples of Common Interests

Economic interests:

Current situation: common employment or economic opportunities (or lack thereof) Goals: expanding opportunities, development, job creation, etc.

Social interests:

Current: schools, transportation, parks, housing

Goals: improving recreational opportunities or public safety, preserving historic resources, etc.

Cultural interests:

Current: holidays, cultural businesses


Goals: cultural meeting centers, official recognition through cultural districts



Contiguity, Compactness & Census Geography

- Districts should be <u>contiguous</u>
- All parts of a district must be adjacent to another part of the district
- Areas separated by water and not connected by a bridge, tunnel, or regular ferry service are not contiguous
- Districts should be compact
- Does not bypass nearby areas of population in favor of more distant populations
- District boundaries must generally follow census blocks

D4: Unites Inner Sunset with Outer Sunset, preserves as majority API

D5: loses NOPA and Parnassus/Inner Sunset, but gains Polk Gulch, Nob Hill, and the Hub, protects renters.

D6: Keeps TL and SOMA Filipinas united

D7: gains OMI, loses parts of Twin Peaks

D10: mostly same, but loses parts of Sunnydale

I would like to express my sincere appreciation for adopting Japantown's established borders and keeping us whole with the Western Addition in District 5, particularly with the African American community in the lower Fillmore. Thank you for listening to our voices at the March 26 mapping meeting and including the Japanese Community Youth Council at 2012 Pine Street, Booker T. Washington Community Service Center at 800 Presidio Avenue, Hamilton Recreation Center at 1900 Geary, and the Western Addition Library at 1550 Scott within District 5.

The latest iteration of proposed maps encompasses all of Japantown's key cultural and institutional assets with one exception: Chibi Chan Preschool at 2507 Pine Street at Pierce. This child development center is a vital program of the Japanese Community Youth Council, an anchor institution that serves the Western Addition, with a sister program (Chibi Chan Too) at Booker T. We are the supervisor-appointed representatives of the San Francisco Bicycle Advisory Committee (BAC), and each month we advocate for our respective community members to be able to cycle safely throughout the City of San Francisco. We regularly meet with SFMTA, DPW, and BART representatives as well as community members and other public entities.

Since we each represent a different district, we will address specific concerns below. We do, however, submit this letter as an approved communication from the BAC as a whole.

The maps are quickly changing and being sent out rapidly, yet a few trends are emerging from most redrawings. Our specific observations are outlined below.

District 5 concerns:

Each map, except for map 4D, splits up Page Street into multiple districts. Page Street is one of the epicenters of safe bicycling infrastructure and projects in San Francisco. The Page Street Pilot program, which was implemented just before the pandemic, and the Page Slow Street–a hub of community bonding and artistic expression–have inspired people of all ages to learn how to ride a bike. Both of these pilot projects have shown how fun riding a bike can be when streets are designed with bicycles in mind and made safe for recreation, commuting to work, and community building. When streets are slow, streets are safe, and when streets are safe, people ride bikes or walk to their destinations. In our opinion, increasing both of these modes of transportation is crucial to meeting both the city's Climate Action Plan of achieving net zero greenhouse gas emissions, and Vision Zero SF commitments.

Breaking up Page Street into separate districts has many implications, one of which is the disruption of community-supported infrastructure improvements. This threatens to make the approval process even more complex than it currently is, given the need to align additional stakeholders. Implementing the Page Street Bikeway Improvements Pilot program took years of advocacy behind the scenes, consisting of community meetings, open houses, and meetings with the supervisors' offices. The street has been at the center of a strong community-based effort that has been several decades in the making. These communities have rallied together to create better walking and bicycling improvements for our neighborhood.

Most of the new maps we have seen show the neighborhoods of NOPA, Lower Haight, Haight Ashbury, the Panhandle, and Hayes Valley split into separate districts. These neighborhoods, which are connected via Page Street and the Wiggle, are major bicycle arteries through which commuters travel from San Francisco's west side to destinations east and south.

While map 4D most closely resembles the original district, the census shows that this

district has had the least population deviation in the last 10 years, and as such, is not in need of redistricting to begin with. We ask that the Taskforce uphold the City Charter allowance of 5% population deviation. The City Charter states that district population variations of up to 5% are allowed to "prevent dividing or diluting the voting power of minorities and/or to keep recognized neighborhoods intact," and that "redistricting...shall reflect communities of interest."

District 10 concerns:

We reached out to our community in D10 for feedback on how the BAC can best support their efforts, and community member Donovan Lacy responded with:

Map 3B, cuts an artificial, unnatural line dividing the greater Potrero Hill, Dogpatch, and Showplace Community of Interest (the "Col"). Mariposa, from Potrero to 280, has never served as a community dividing line. Jackson Park, to the north of Mariposa, is a key RecPark facility in the Potrero Col and serves as the home for afterschool programs for both of our elementary schools, Daniel Webster and Starr King Elementary. 17th Street serves as a significant retail corridor for the Col as well as a critical pedestrian and bicycle route for the whole of the Col.

Map 3A presented a reasonable view of our Col and a District 10 that kept our Community of Interest whole and made sense. But if that map is off the table, the northern edge of the district should move at least as far north as 16th Street between Potrero and 280. While we believe our neighbors in Showplace, particularly those at Daggett Place and the California College of the Arts, should remain in our district, 16th Street at least provides a reasonable line that keeps the vital core of our Col together.

District 10 is shrinking. We have ceded our areas west of Potrero and we may be able to cede the area south of General Hospital (from Potrero to 101) if necessary to keep the core of our community together. However, your current Map 3B cuts straight through our heart. Please keep us whole.

The BAC has worked for years with the D9 and D10 communities on the Hairball, the traffic, bicycle and pedestrian interchange at Cesar Chavez/Potrero Ave/Bayshore Blvd, advocating for safer bicycling and pedestrian infrastructure. It has been no easy task, as our communities are bisected by two freeways (101 & 280) under multiple jurisdictions. This experience alone gives us first hand knowledge of the difficulties of working among various stakeholders to achieve a beneficial community outcome.

Conclusion:

We ask that the Taskforce 1.) keep D5 neighborhoods together along Page Slow Street, and to include the neighborhoods of Lower Haight, Upper Haight, NOPA, Alamo Square and Hayes Valley as demonstrated in map 4D, and 2.) keep D10 together as demonstrated in maps 3A & 4D.

I have reviewed the four maps currently under consideration and know that:

Map 4A is the best fit for us. Thank you for listening to our pleas. This is our preferred map.

Map 4B keeps most of us together, but excludes a large swath of SoMa which needs to be included. New development around 4th Street and the 80 is a part of our emerging neighborhood, and they have the same needs as all of our emerging neighborhoods.

Map 4C is a good fit for what we propose. The only missing part is making sure that the Chase Center is included by extending he southern border. The Warriors pay in to a fund that supports maintenance and operations in Mission Bay as well as special projects. We worked tirelessly with the Warriors to set this up; we must stay connected.

Dear Task Force Members,

My name is Elizabeth Carney and I have lived and worked at Second and Bryant in South Beach since 1994. As past president of our homeowners association, along with being an active participant of our neighborhood association (South Beach/ Rincon/ Mission Bay neighborhood Association)I have worked long and hard to address difficulties of traffic, to manage the introduction of Giants stadium and Chase center, and to manage the development from an industrial to a neighborhood with services and schools.

First, thank you all for your time and expertise in guiding this redistricting effort. This is an effort with little precedence: the City must absorb and balance a 30K population increase and make room for our Emerging Communities to grow into established neighborhoods just like those throughout the City.

I have reviewed the four currently proposed maps.

A couple of comments:

-At 2nd and Bryant, our gritty urban neighborhood needs South Beach for nature- the district line would be better at 4th street than 2nd street.

-our needs and challenges mean we have very little in common with established neighborhoods such as North Beach and Chinatown as we live on a "entrance ramp" to the Bay Bridge and must manage this traffic condition.

Map 4A/6A acceptably aligns with our Emerging Communities map, would allow further community-building and problem-solving work in our Rincon/East Cut, South Beach and Mission Bay Communities, and position us to support the new developments in Central SoMa, Treasure Island, and Mission Rock. Thank you for listening to our input. The inclusion of the Financial District, Union Sq and Dogpatch are optional from our neighborhood perspective.

Map 4C/6C also aligns acceptably, but only if Mariposa Park is added back. This park was developed by Mission Bay and is part of its redevelopment plan. It's maintenance is provided through Mission Bay CFD funds. Moving a portion of the southern border from 16th St to Mariposa St (as in map 4A) would correct this.

Map 4D/D6 is not at all acceptable; it cuts out Rincon Hill/The East Cut, a vital part of our triad of emerging communities and a key player in our interconnected efforts to manage congestion and safety issues around the Bay Bridge. If moved, they would be an outlier in D3.

While Maps 4A and C support our full Community Of Interest (COI), Map 4B/6B looks to be a good faith effort to balance our core triad of neighborhoods— Rincon/East Cut, South Beach and Mission Bay—while making room for a good portion of the Tenderloin/Soma COI, albeit in a different district. This map largely aligns with our secondary COI map, High-density Waterfront Neighborhoods, and could be acceptable in the spirit of all neighborhoods working together to balance the redistribution of population across districts

In closing, I see three paths forward in maps 4A/6A, 4C/6C, and 4B/6B as a compromise to recognize the TL/SoMa COI. Each allows us to jointly address such shared challenges as taming hazardous arterials, fostering the services needed to support our economically diverse population, and getting a new school open to support our large growth of families.

We have done the work of supporting new housing for all of San Francisco, Don't diminish our ability to build the community—and ensure its health and safety—as well.

I have reviewed the four currently proposed maps.

Map 4A/6A acceptably aligns with our Emerging Communities map, would allow further community-building and problem-solving work in our Rincon/East Cut, South Beach and Mission Bay Communities, and position us to support the new developments in Central SoMa, Treasure Island, and Mission Rock. Thank you for listening to our input. The inclusion of the Financial District, Union Sq and Dogpatch are optional from our neighborhood perspective.

Map 4C/6C also aligns acceptably, but only if the Chase Center parcels 29-32 are added back. These parcels are legally in the Mission Bay Redevelopment Plan, and part of the Mello Roos CFD District that includes all Mission Bay properties. While the parcels are legally bound to Mission Bay, the Warriors themselves are a City-wide asset; they strive to support communities beyond their home arena.

Map 4D/D6 is *not at all* **acceptable**; it cuts out Rincon Hill/The East Cut, a vital part of our triad of emerging communities and a key player in our interconnected efforts to manage congestion and safety issues around the Bay Bridge. If moved, they would be an outlier in D3.

Maps 4A and C support our full Community Of Interest (COI). Although Map 4B/6B looks to be a good faith effort to balance our core triad of neighborhoods—Rincon/East Cut, South Beach and Mission Bay—while making room for a good portion of the Tenderloin/Soma COI, albeit in a different district, it does not properly support our full COI.

In closing, I see two main paths forward in maps 4A/6A and 4C/6C. Each allows us to jointly address such shared challenges as taming hazardous arterials, fostering the services needed to support our economically diverse population, and getting a new school open to support our large growth of families.

The challenges of building community and complete neighborhoods are real and best done together. We have been working together to provide an adequate network of parks, recreation and open space in a chronically under-served area.

Hello: I've been waiting to speak for some time. Please give this to each member of the RTF.

To the SF Redistricting Task Force:

My name is Steve Leeds, a resident in the Inner Sunset, D5, for over 43 years. I'm a member of the West Side Tenants Association, which is a member of the unity map coalition. WSTA is an all volunteer organization of tenants on the westside working against gentrification, displacement of tenants and for equity and housing justice I strongly urge the task force to not divide Japantown and for it to remain in District 5. I strongly recommend you ensure that the neighborhoods of the Haight, Cole Valley, Inner Sunset, the Panhandle, Alamo Square, and Hayes Valley be kept whole within District 5, as they have each built up community resources and support systems within their respective neighborhoods.

Unfortunately, San Francisco redistricting has weakened the power of low-income communities and communities of color for many decades. Neighborhoods, such as the Western Addition faced "urban renewal", destruction, removal of residents, and gentrification. This is but one part of our city's shameful history. It's time to go beyond the rhetoric of healing and justice to concrete action. You as the redistricting task force have a responsibility to listen to all voices and not engage in political horse trading and gerrymandering.

I strongly urge the task force to seek out the city's most vulnerable communities for input, move forward with map 4D as a starting point, and support Community Unity Map, version 2. Thank you.

Hello, Task Force Members,

My name is George Canciani and I live in 461 Second Street, The Clocktower, and have lived there for the past 25 years.

The challenges of building community and complete neighborhoods are real and best done together.

The problem with 4D, breaks up the original historic Clocktower configuration with buildings across Bryant Street, divided among District 3 and District 6, and dividing our residential and cultural community, currently part of Disitrict 6. The Clocktower building needs to remain a part of District 6.

First, thank you all for your time and expertise in guiding this redistricting effort. This is an effort with little precedence: the City must absorb and balance a 30K population increase and make room for our Emerging Communities to grow into established neighborhoods just like those throughout the City.

I have reviewed the four currently proposed maps.

Map 4A/6A acceptably aligns with our Emerging Communities map, would allow further community-building and problem-solving work in our Rincon/East Cut, South Beach and Mission Bay Communities, and position us to support the new developments in Central SoMa, Treasure Island, and Mission Rock. Thank you for listening to our input. The inclusion of the Financial District, Union Sq and Dogpatch are optional from our neighborhood perspective.

Map 4C/6C also aligns acceptably, but only if Mariposa Park is added back. This park was developed by Mission Bay and is part of its redevelopment plan. It's maintenance is provided through Mission Bay CFD funds. Moving a portion of the southern border from 16th St to Mariposa St (as in map 4A) would correct this.

Map 4D/D6 is not at all acceptable; it cuts out Rincon Hill/The East Cut, a vital part of our triad of emerging communities and a key player in our interconnected efforts to manage congestion and safety issues around the Bay Bridge. If moved, they would be an outlier in D3.

While Maps 4A and C support our full Community Of Interest (COI), **Map 4B/6B looks to be a** good faith effort to balance our core triad of neighborhoods—Rincon/East Cut, South Beach and Mission Bay—while making room for a good portion of the Tenderloin/Soma COI, albeit in a different district. This map largely aligns with our secondary COI map, High-density Waterfront Neighborhoods, and could be acceptable in the spirit of all neighborhoods working together to balance the redistribution of population across districts

In closing, I see three paths forward in maps 4A/6A, 4C/6C, and 4B/6B as a compromise to recognize the TL/SoMa COI. Each allows us to jointly address such shared challenges as taming hazardous arterials, fostering the services needed to support our economically diverse population, and getting a new school open to support our large growth of families.

We have done the work of supporting new housing for all of San Francisco, Don't diminish our ability to build the community—and ensure its health and safety—as well.

I don't know why Q2 has ignored the Community Unity map, since it was arrived at with the cooperation of groups from all over SF. I suggest you refer to the Community Unity map in your decision making.

Among the most recent maps you have published, the 4D map is the most reasonable - but it needs a lot of work:

For example:

- For District 4 - If you move the District 4 boundary south of Sloat Boulevard, you will be depriving the people in that area of the their community of interest with District 7. So instead please keep the current southern D4 boundary at Sloat Boulevard.

- To add population to District 4 - Move the boundary for District 4 east along the edge of Golden Gate Park - along Lincoln, Irving, Judah and Kirkham to meet the western boundary from District 5. Keep the Inner Sunset in District 5 and District 4.

- Keep the south-eastern edge of Golden Gate Park in District 5.

- For District 1 – Keep the current northern boundary of District 1. Do not move into Sea Cliff, which is not a community of interest with the rest of the Richmond District and would better relate to District 2.



My name is Pamela Tau Lee, my husband and I are long time residents on 16th Ave near Cabrillo. My husband grew up in the Richmond, I am a retired public school educator. My son and daughter-in-law are part of the 60% renters who thankfully live in a rent controlled unit here in the Richmond.

This is the second time I am here to address you. I know that you have been agonizing over the task before you, I too as well. Please let me share what our family has been trying to address over these past 3 months.

As a 74 year old Chinese woman, I have been trying to figure out how to step forward with aging and my changing needs. We do not want to be a burden to our family, we strive to age with the best of health possible, be happy, safe and continue to take care of each other and contribute to the community. My husband and I have come up with a plan. Key to this plan is being able to stay in familiar surroundings with access to services that elders like me need. In a nutshell, my husband and I need to continue to live in the Richmond district.

My daily life is enriched by the fact that places like the Golden Gate Senior Center. The Center is always there for me. It provides services that I can benefit from now and in the future because they are in tune with our aging Asian long-time residents.

As a retired American Federation of Teachers Local 2121 educator, I've thrived and benefitted from the fact that my neighbors and I share working class values. Our shared outlook of community and care for working class families have always come through for me and my husband when we are in need and including the other way when they are in need. Over the past year on almost a daily basis, we receive mailings urging us to sell our home. While we know that most homeowners are receiving these, as aging residents, I am angered by these predatory actions. The message that comes across is, it's time for you to move.

Forty-five years ago, I was very active in the fight to defend and protect Chinatown/Manilatown from developers and the push for "urban renewal." Their efforts were buoyed by so called "leaders" like Justin Herman who pointed to the historic neighborhoods as slums, a blight and the residents there needed to be removed. I took leadership and learned from the tenants who lived in the International Hotel. They were forcibly evicted from the only home and community that they knew, a neighborhood where they found safety, care, familiarity and "family." Within 1 - 2 years after being evicted, the majority of the International Hotel elderly tenants were dead.

I need you to understand what your actions can mean for the vulnerable in our city and elderly residents like myself. Adding areas such as the Sea Clift, Presidio Terrace and West Clay Park have higher incomes and their needs will put them in competition with our struggling community non-profits. Keep our united working class neighborhoods together. This can and should be avoided, you have the responsibility and power to do just that.

Keep the district line at Lake and California street.

Keep the most vulnerable able to live in safety and a voice. Thank you Pamela Tau Lee

Dear Members of the San Francisco Redistricting Task Force,

API Council reaffirms our position on opposing the proposed maps of 4A to 4D, as we are concerned with the fragmentation of San Francisco's historical and established cultural neighborhoods. The expected outcomes of these maps are undermined by the risk of displacement, gentrification, and under-representation.

The task force's response towards organizing efforts in District 6 has failed to uplift the voices of the most directly affected community members, in which Filipino American residents have long sought to preserve and maintain voting power without losing the rich history that empowers their cultural unity. Divisions in West Soma, Tenderloin, and the Filipino Cultural District pose severe repercussions in displacing Filipino Americans from the very community they have built for generations. To keep District 6 intact, we urge the task force to 1) avoid expanding District 3 beyond Broadway and Mason Streets in the Northwest and 2) limit expansion into the Transbay area to 2nd Street, Folsom Street, and the Embarcadero.

The API community living in Chinatown is most vulnerable to displacement and the disempowering effects of gentrification. We oppose expanding D3 at the expense of working-class families, tenants, immigrants, and our aging population.

It is important to understand that the affected neighborhoods contain different demographics with a plethora of unique priorities informed by the conditions of community members. API communities in the Richmond District and Chinatown will face increased risks of gentrification, which have not been remedied during the ongoing housing crisis. In particular, the map for District 1 compromises the ability of API working-class families and tenants to live in the Richmond District, which simultaneously dilutes their voting power. We urge the task force to expand District 1 eastward toward the Anza Vista and Jordan neighborhoods rather than the Seacliff neighborhood.

We ask for a transparent and holistic redistricting process informed by the most vulnerable and marginalized voices within these district lines. We cannot move forward at the expense of working-class families, tenants, immigrants, and elderly people. With representation and community interests at stake, we ask for the task force to implement these recommendations with values of equity, fairness, and accessibility in mind.

Dear Task Force Members,

This revised letter is to address the most recently released preliminary maps (4A- 4D) of the new district lines. Of these iterations, map 4D largely keeps the various LGBTQ neighborhoods that have been historically and culturally part of District 8 and the Castro LGBTQ Cultural District whole. However, there are still fragments of the Castro LGBTQ Cultural District as well as the Mission Dolores and Upper Market neighborhoods that are cut out of this iteration which we feel should be kept within the boundaries of District 8.

As we have stated before, neighborhoods such as the Upper Market and Mission Dolores are culturally and historically cohesive parts of the Castro. Many members of the LGBTQ community that call the Castro home reside in these neighborhoods. Many historic and culturally significant businesses and sites are in this area as well. Of particular note is the current home of the Gay Men's Chorus at 170 Valencia Street which falls within our district footprint.

Accurate representation of the districts was a major reason for leadership reflective of those communities in the 1977 election of supervisors like the late Ella Hill Hutch, Gordon Lau, Roberto Gonzales and Harvey Milk and that representation is all the more imperative now. In a time when decades of progress due to LGBTQ activism are being rolled back, with laws like Florida's "Don't Say Gay" bill having recently been passed to harm and traumatize another generation of queer youth, it is all the more disheartening to face potential erasure and silencing of voters who have historically been an integral part of the Castro community which some of these preliminary maps could still do. Additionally, some of the highest concentrations of LGBTQ seniors live in these neighborhoods.

Although a vast improvement, the preliminary maps released by the Task Force vary enough to disregard these communities and the boundaries of the Castro LGBTQ Cultural District and could likely hamper the Cultural District's ability to advocate and properly represent community interests and preserve important LGBTQ cultural landmarks and spaces if District 8 is still partially fragmented as proposed.

The District is grateful for listening to our concerns and asks the Task Force to consider adjustments to the preliminary maps released on March 30th so that District 8 be redrawn to include queer neighbourhoods such as Duboce Triangle, Corona Heights, Buena Vista, Twin Peaks, Upper Market, Mission Dolores, Eureka Valley, Diamond Heights and Noe Valley in their entirety and as indispensable parts of the greater Castro community as well to preserve intact within one District, the boundaries of the Castro LGBTQ Cultural District.

Dear Redistricting Task Force:

Thank you for the opportunity to provide public comment on Map 4A and Map 4BCD.

Chinese for Affirmative Action (CAA) was founded in 1969 in San Francisco's Chinatown to protect the civil and political rights of Chinese Americans and to advance multiracial democracy in the United States. Today, CAA is a progressive voice in and on behalf of the broader Asian American and Pacific Islander (AAPI) community.

We evaluated the maps in accordance with the principles we believe are critical in redistricting, specifically:

- 1. Maintain the voice and representation of working-class communities of color
- 2. Maintain cultural districts and historical neighborhoods
- 3. Keep communities of interest together

Unfortunately, the latest versions of the maps do not adhere to these principles. For instance, Maps 4A, 4B, and 4C fail to include the outer edges of the Japantown Cultural District in District 5 and instead splits this cultural district between Districts 2 and 5.

Furthermore, Map 4A and Map 4C separate the Tenderloin from Central SOMA and the Filipino Cultural District, and Maps 4A, 4B, and 4C separate the Trangsender Cultural District from the Leather District. It is critically important that the voices of Filipino and low-income residents of color are unified in one district that contains both the Tenderloin and SOMA, especially as wealthier neighborhoods along the waterfront have emerged.

Similarly, we are concerned that the latest maps dilute the voice of the working-class Chinese community in Chinatown. For example, Maps 4A, 4B, and 4C add Russian Hill into District 3, and Map 4D adds South Beach, Rincon Hill, and East Cut into District 3. These additional neighborhoods have up to 6.5 times the household median income of Chinatown residents. The AAPI community in Chinatown is vulnerable to displacement and gentrification, and the proposed alterations to District 3 harm working class families, tenants, immigrants, and the elderly.

Lastly, the new boundaries for District 1 in all four versions of Map 4 undermine the voice of the working-class AAPI community in the Richmond neighborhood. Maps 4A, 4B, 4C, and 4D all expand District 1 to include the wealthy Seacliff neighborhood, where residents have a median income about \$60,000 higher than families in the Richmond. We are concerned this imbalance will disempower the AAPI families in the Richmond who deserve equal representation.

We urge the Redistricting Task Force to continue updating the maps in adherence to the principles of maintaining the voice and representation of working-class communities of color, maintaining cultural districts and historical neighborhoods, and keeping communities of interest together.

Dear Commissioners,

My name is Barbara Welch Chionsini. I am a native San Franciscan, raised in District 4 and educated in District 7. I worked for the City and County of San Francisco for 26 years and am retired from the San Francisco Sheriffs Department. I have lived in Lakeshore Acres for the past 37 years and have been working with the Lakeshore Acres Improvement Club the entire time. I was also the Vice President of the West of Twin Peaks Central Council for two years, an umbrella group for approximately 20 Neighborhood Associations on the Westside of San Francisco. I spearheaded and currently chair the Lakeshore Acres/Merced Manor (LMWG) a twelve member working group that was created to work on the Sloat Boulevard Pedestrian Safety Project and am currently working with the MTA on the Lake Merced Quick Build Project. I am also in the process of chairing the District 7 Women's Advisory Group.

I am writing to the Commission to voice my concerns regarding the current redistricting map that moves Lakeshore Acres and Merced Manor from District 7 to District 4. I have listened to comments made about the residents of Lakeshore Acres and Merced Manor and Lowell High School. Lowell High School is a citywide school under the jurisdiction of the San Francisco Unified School District. The school sits on property owned by the San Francisco Unified School District and is not part of either the Lakeshore Acres or Merced Manor residential neighborhoods.

My husband and I and our Westside neighbors attended the Redistricting Task Force Meeting on March 21, 2022. We participated in the public comment portion of the meeting along with residents of District 11 at City Hall. I felt that the comments were thoughtful and heartfelt and neighbors showed concern for their communities. However, some of the comments made by telephone by individuals not in attendance at the meeting were derogatory and offensive.We are a racially and culturally diverse neighborhood and we invite everyone to feel welcome. I listened to several comments directed at our neighborhood and Supervisor Melgar that were made by callers who did not attend the meeting in person. The comments were insulting, sexist and racist. Many of the comments regarding Lowell High School were from callers who could not differentiate Lowell High School from our residential neighborhoods.

In November 2020 District 7 elected its first female supervisor Myrna Melgar to the Board of Supervisors. Supervisor Melgar also has three female staff members. Supervisor Melgar is an urban planner and a great fit for D-7. She has reached out to every group in D-7 and has attended more community meetings in her 18 months in office than the three previous male supervisors put together. If she is unavailable Jen Low, Chief of Staff, Lila Carrillo or Meaghan Imperial attend the meetings. She is currently working with members of our working group on issues related to Sloat Boulevard, Lake Merced Boulevard, Stonestown Shopping Center, Lakeshore Plaza, and Community Policing at both Taraval and Park Police Stations.

As a member of Lakeshore Acres and a female resident attendance I find this proposed move of Lakeshore Acres and Merced Manor into District 4 an insult to the women of our community and to Supervisor Melgar. Our communities voted for Supervisor Melgar because we felt that she was the best candidate to represent our neighborhoods. The Task Force now wants to put us in District 4 with a male supervisor who has no interest in working with our community. Some members of the Task Force have no understanding of the dynamics of our neighborhoods and are tone deaf to the needs of the community. We did not ask to drafted into District 4 and District 4 did not ask for us. There is no historical nexus between Lakeshore Acres and Merced Manor and the Sunset. We were never a part of the Sunset.

I urge the Redistricting Task Force to visit Lakeshore Acres and Merced Manor and meet the members of our 12 member working group and learn more about our communities of interest. I also urge you to reconsider your decision to remove and disenfranchise Lakeshore Acres and Merced Manor from our community partners in District 7 and Supervisor Melgar, our first female supervisor elected in District 7.

My name is Dave Howard. I live in and own a condo in the SOMA Grand building at 7th & Mission with my wife, Ina. We've lived in the Mid-Market area since 2013 and I work as a senior information security engineer for a local startup. I'm an amateur street photographer and I commute to work on foot, so I spend a lot of time walking around the area. Every day I see drug addicts using fentanyl and meth on the street and homeless people unsheltered and suffering. Drug dealers have moved onto our block, and as a result there has been a concerning increase in violent crime.

Despite the recent issues, we love this neighborhood and my wife and I frequent many local establishments for meals, getting together with friends, and shopping. We love the new Whole Foods that's just opened up on our block. My wife is originally from the Philippines and we go to local events run by the SOMA Pilipinas Cultural Heritage District, eat at Uncle Tito's & Manila Bowl, and shop at the local Filipino market.

I am writing to ask that the Mid-Market neighborhood be kept whole. Our district is defined by Market St, not divided by it, and the district should continue to include both sides of Market St. Despite our neighborhood's central location, high density, and abundant transit, we don't have the resources we need. Mid-Market is experiencing a humanitarian crisis of addiction, mental health problems, and violent crime. In order to achieve those investments, Mid-Market needs to be able to speak to a single San Francisco Supervisor who understands the broader situation across the whole neighborhood.

I believe that the most elegant way to keep our neighborhood whole is to keep it together with Western SOMA and the Tenderloin. Market Street is a backbone, not a border.

Thank you so much for taking the time to read this and consider my point of view, which I believe is shared by the majority of my neighbors.

Members of San Francisco's Redistricting Task Force:

Community of Interest and Historic Development Patterns Lacking in Placing Tenderloin in D5!

It was shocking to see that three of the RDTF's most recent four proposals (maps 4A, 4B and 4C) in the fourth round of mapping made a very major shift by pulling the Tenderloin into District 5.

Where was any significant public testimony supporting such a change? A positive aspect of 4th set of maps in terms of D5 was keeping historical Western Addition relationship between the Fillmore and Japantown intact that was supported by much public testimony.

However, the strong "Western" component of the Western Addition has been ignored. Van Ness has been an historic dividing line between downtown and more residential areas to the West. These western areas (including portion of the Haight) contain both Victorian era architecture and mid-century modern predominantly middle-income family friendly housing complexes created through the redevelopment process. The Western area, particularly Cathedral Hill, is home to an extraordinary number and concentration of religious institutions. Large scale medical institutions also shape the character of District 5. The residential population of the Western Addition and beyond to the Haight is culturally, racially and age diverse and although close to commercial areas is not part of the City core.

The population and housing of the Tenderloin, is substantially different from District 5. The residential buildings are all fire-resistant post 1906 earthquake and many are single room occupancies intended to serve workers in the downtown core. The downtown core and ground floor commercial spaces are intertwined in a much different manner than the commercial shopping and visitor resources of the Western Addition. The Tenderloin population has more problems with aging, poverty, homelessness and substance abuse than in the Western Addition and needs specialized focus and attention to these needs. It seems more appropriate to link the population so close to the downtown core of the city to that core rather than its western expansion. Randy Shaw's 2015 book <u>The Tenderloin, Sex, Crime and Resistance</u> in the heart of San Francisco gives much of the human and political history, so different from the Western Addition and its own struggles.

If the Western Addition churches and the medical institutions would be willingly integrated into treatment and support of some of these problems, then the inclusion could make sense. But to date, this is not the reality. The problems are indeed difficult and challenging and were the Tenderloin included in District 5, would overwhelm almost all other issues in the Western Addition neighborhoods. The best course is to put Like with Like and not force a situation where cooperation is unlikely. The shared values, the shared geography, the shared economics, the shared social service needs are NOT present in making a forced combination. **Only Map 4D, makes any sense to me, or, as well to the SF League of Women Voters.**

PS I write this as a former Tenderloin resident, my first decade in San Francisco, to now living thirty+ years on Cathedral Hill. I am also a retired urban planner and member of LWV. I

conceptually agree with much of the work done on the Unity Map and have often collaborated on community issues with residents of the Haight.

What is your community's mutual interest?

Founded in 2006, the Barbary Coast Neighborhood Association (a non-profit California corporation) serves the residents and businesses in the <u>Barbary Coast</u>, the historic northeast waterfront along the Embarcadero from Bay Street to the Ferry Building, across to Sue Bierman Park, the Gateway, Walton Park, into Jackson Square, then down Sansome Street through the Historic Warehouse District along the foot of Telegraph Hill including Levi Plaza and several apartment and residence buildings.

Redevelopment projects in the 1960s transformed maritime and industrial areas into mixed use communities that wrapped around the Embarcadero Freeway. By 1985, this area had become one of the densest parts of the City, but no neighborhood organization represented those living and working between the Financial District and the foot of Telegraph Hill along the waterfront. With the help of our neighbors in in District 3 neighborhoods, The Barbary Coast Neighbors grew out of a 2003-05 fight to stop a big-box hotel development at Broadway and the Embarcadero in violation of the 40' height limit along other parts of SF's waterfront. While it took an earthquake to bring the freeway down, it took neighbors working together to keep a new 84-foot hotel from going up.

Where is your community located?

The current Barbary Coast Neighborhood is situated at the edge of the Financial District (south end), Chinatown/North Beach/Telegraph Hill (west side), Fisherman's Wharf (north end) and the Embarcadero and Port property on the eastside.

Please see attached map. The community of interest has the following boundaries:

- Northern and Eastern Boundary: The Embarcadero from the Ferry Building to Bay Street/Fisherman's Wharf.
- Western Boundary: Base of Telegraph Hill along Sansome Street to Broadway, then down to Montgomery (to encompass Jackson Square Historic District), and down to Clay St.
- Southern Boundary: From Montgomery & Sacramento Streets to the Ferry Plaza including the Gateway and Sue Bierman Park.

Why should your community be kept together?

The Barbary Coast Neighborhood represents the historic and redeveloped parts of the northeastern waterfront with historic ties to other D3 neighborhoods as the gateway to Chinatown, North Beach, and Russian Hill from the waterfront. The area features small businesses and restaurants and is in close walking distance to the business centers of the Financial District and Union Square.

As part of District 3, we have a long, storied history of collaboration, cooperation, and community with all D3 neighborhood and merchant organizations. This includes a sustained record of shared experience and preservation advocacy among neighbors of Northeast San Francisco that has evolved over several decades.

Good afternoon, Task Force Members and staff,

First, thank you all for your time and patience in guiding this epic redistricting effort. This is an effort with little precedence: **the City must absorb and balance a 30K population increase and make room for our Emerging Communities to grow into established neighborhoods** just like those throughout the City. Virtually all external postings around redistricting have failed to acknowledge the reality of whole new neighborhoods—with a strong affordable housing component--now existing on the eastern edge of the City. All the discussion is focusing on balancing the scales of the legacy neighborhoods. **Old and new deserve equal consideration, and to your credit, you have acknowledged this new reality**.

While Maps 4A and C support our full Emerging Communities COI map, **Map 4B/6B looks to be a good faith effort to balance our core triad of neighborhoods—Rincon/East Cut, South Beach and Mission Bay—while accommodating a good portion of the Tenderloin/Soma COI**, albeit in a different district. This map largely aligns with our secondary COI map, High-density Waterfront Neighborhoods, and I feel is acceptable in the spirit of all neighborhoods working together to balance the redistribution of population across districts.

In closing, I see three paths forward in maps 4A/6A, 4C/6C, and 4B/6B as a compromise to recognize the TL/SoMa COI. Each allows us to jointly address such shared challenges as taming hazardous arterials, fostering the services needed to support our economically diverse population, and getting a new school open to support our large growth of families. We have done the work of supporting a range of new housing for all of San Francisco so far; please don't diminish our ability to build the community within it—and ensure its health and safety—as well.

The Alchemy Apts, the Haight Street Art Center, Alchemy Community Gardens, and the UC Dental School must return to D5. Boundaries are Market to Laguna north to Haight St, west to Buchanan, south to Hermann west. Only the LGBTQ senior housing Open House relates to Castro LGBTQ Cultural District (Market to Laguna north to Waller, to Palm Lane south, to Hermann). Other residents and institutions do not identify with the Castro LGBTQ Cultural District and don't consider themselves part of D8. The Haight Street Art Center serves as a community center for D5 including the Lower Haight, Hayes Valley and the Greater Western Addition, and public schools such as John Muir Elementary School, nothing from D8.

As the Cultural District was being formed, former HVNA president Paul Olsen helped to write the legislation forming the Castro LGBTQ Cultural District, and <u>specifically requested that Hayes Valley not be included in the Cultural District</u>, noting that LGBTQ residents in Hayes Valley faced discrimination by those living in the Castro area simply because they lived in Hayes Valley. Your current Map, Map 3B, divides greater Potrero Hill, Dogpatch, and Showplace Community of Interest (the "Col") along an artificial, unnatural line on Mariposa St. Mariposa, from Potrero to 280, has never served as a community dividing line. Jackson Park, to the north of Mariposa, is a key RecPark facility in the Potrero Col. 17th Street serves as a significant retail corridor for the Col. It also serves as a key pedestrian and bicycle route for the whole of the Col.

Map 3A presented a reasonable view of our Col and a District 10 that made sense. I would like to know what that map is no longer under consideration.

Regardless, if map 3A is no longer being considered, then the northern edge of the new district should move at least as far north so as to allow our neighbors in Showplace, particularly those at Daggett Place and the California College of the Arts, should remain in our district.

Barring that, the line should move at east to 16th Street between Potrero and 280, which keeps a greater and vital portion of the neighborhood intact and in the same district.

Please keep us whole. Neighborhoods are vital to a thriving San Francisco, and district 10 is shrinking. We have already ceded areas west of Potrero and we may be able to cede the area south of General Hospital (from Potrero to 101) if necessary to keep the core of our community together. However, your current Map 3B cuts straight through our heart, and will break the neighborhood apart.

Dear Reverend Townsend and Redistricting Task Force Committee,

This letter is in broad support of the attached map put together by the Van Ness Corridor Neighborhood Council, with a focus on the southeast quadrant that affects Hayes Valley. There are three areas that HVNA is most interested in including in theD5 redistricting, as detailed below.

55 Laguna & surrounding area

The southern boundaries of HVNA around Buchanan-Page-Laguna-Waller, including the 55 Laguna complex at Laguna and Hermann, and surrounding area, were excluded in the last redistricting. (See Figure 2, HVNA boundaries, and Figure 3 and 3A showing the existing D5 boundary vis a vis this area, attached). This area houses many tenants including legacy rent-controlled LGBT tenants, who are historically within HVNA and part of its founding, and comprise a significant community of interest. Additionally, the traffic patterns north of Market are congested and complicated, and cutting out parts of Haight and Buchanan from D5 makes this more challenging to manage, and impacts all the residents in this sector. We think it is extremely important to keep this entire section north of Market united in D5 under one supervisor.

Arts/Cultural District and new residential buildings east of Van Ness/Civic Center

HVNA's membership already includes some of the new residential buildings, such as 100 and 150 Van Ness and SFCM's Bowes Center. These developments are within our association boundaries, but are not part of D5; they are in D6, which has the biggest growth (+30%). HVNA believes it would be a natural fit for D5 to include these new residences.

Additionally, D5 currently includes major performing arts venues, such as the Jazz Center, the Sidney Goldstein Theater, as well as the San Francisco War Memorial and Performing Arts Center, one of the largest performing arts centers in the US, comprised of the Opera house, Herbst Theater, the SFAC gallery, and Davies Symphony Hall. Extending D5 east of Van Ness to include Bill Graham Auditorium, SFPL, the Asian Art Museum, City Hall, and other smaller cultural entities makes sense, since the majority of the large performance venues are already within D5 and HVNA boundaries. Civic Center CBD already extends into Hayes Valley, to Gough Street. All of these Civic Center institutions and locations have a large impact on HVNA's residential and commercial district, impacting traffic and other aspects of the neighborhood which a single District supervisor could more easily oversee.

<u>The Hub</u>

The Hub is a future community of interest, as residents will comprise dense population in a small congested geographic area, and as a part of the Market/Octavia Plan, it is of particular interest to HVNA. The Hub currently falls into three separate supervisorial districts, which makes it difficult to ensure that this important area gets the supervisorial focus that such major housing developments deserve. District 5 in its current configuration already has two of the large development corners within its boundaries; it makes sense to include the entire Hub in D5. Traffic from development of the HUB will have a major impact on the main arteries of Hayes Valley. Future HUB residents will certainly become part of the Hayes Valley community, enjoying shopping, dining, and cultural events in our neighborhood, so it is of particular interest to HVNA to see it included in its totality within our supervisorial district.




Figure 1: Proposed Redistricting Map prepared by the Van Ness Corridor Neighborhood Council




Figure 3: Existing D5 Map (Dept of Elections)




Figure 2: HVNA boundaries

SF Redistricting Task Force must change course to draw a fair map

March 30, 2022 Advocacy, News, Redistricting

The League of Women Voters of San Francisco is deeply concerned that the draft supervisor district maps created so far by the city's Redistricting Task Force fail to adequately reflect the input that has been shared by the most vulnerable and least represented people in our city. LWVSF is especially alarmed to see draft maps that would diminish the voting power of low-income, immigrant, renter, LGBTQ+, and people of color neighborhoods.

"Dozens of historically and systemically excluded communities in San Francisco have put in substantial time and effort to tell the Redistricting Task Force what they need," said LWVSF President Alison Goh. "Yet, with just over one week left in the mapping process, the needs of many of those groups have been left out of the draft supervisor maps made by the task force."

LWVSF has attended every Redistricting Task Force meeting and listened closely to comments from San Franciscans. There has been overwhelming community support for keeping the Tenderloin and West/Central South of Market areas together in District 6, and for keeping the SOMA Pilipinas Filipino Heritage District, LEATHER & LGBTQ Cultural District, and Transgender District whole and together in one supervisor district. Yet, in the Redistricting Task Force's most recent set of draft maps, only one map — Map 4D — actually reflects these concerns.

Many people have also spoken passionately about the need to protect the voting power of low-income, renter, and Asian Pacific Islander communities in the Richmond. Yet, in the Redistricting Task Force's most recent set of draft maps, the areas of Sea Cliff, Presidio Terrace, and north of Lake Street, which are primarily affluent homeowner neighborhoods with characteristics at odds with most of the Richmond, are moved into District 1.

LWVSF's displeasure with the timeline the Redistricting Task Force gave itself to create draft maps and hear public input on those maps is well documented, as are our concerns about the task force's community outreach. In other cities and counties, redistricting commissions have often needed two to three months or more to hear public input on draft maps. The San Francisco Redistricting Task Force gave itself less than five weeks total for its mapping phase, significantly abridging due process.

None of the draft maps issued by the Redistricting Task Force so far would create more fair, equitable representation in our local government. Of the four draft maps currently being considered by the Redistricting Task Force, Map 4D is the only path forward as it keeps the Tenderloin and West/Central SOMA united in one district, and does the best job of reflecting the community of interest needs of the three cultural districts in the area.

This is not an endorsement of Map 4D, which has many substantial yet solvable problems. By moving forward with Map 4D, LWVSF is hopeful that the Redistricting Task Force will prioritize the needs of the most vulnerable and least represented people in San Francisco's new supervisor district map.

Dear Commissioners,

My name is William Chionsini. I was born and raised in San Francisco and have lived in Lakeshore Acres for 37 years. I am a retired San Francisco Sheriff's Captain. I am the President of Lakeshore Acres Improvement Club (LAIC) and have been a member of our board for over 30 years. I am a member of the Lakeshore Acres/Merced Manor Working Group (LMWG). Additionally, I am also the past a President of the West of Twin Peaks Central Council.

LAIC is bordered on the north by Sloat Boulevard, Inverness Drive on the east, Lake Merced Drive to the south and west and Skyline Boulevard to the west.

The Lakeshore Acres/Merced Manor Working Group includes all of Lakeshore Acres and all of the homes directly east of LAIC in Merced Manor. Merced Manor is bordered on the north by Sloat Boulevard, on the east by 19th Avenue, on the south by Eucalyptus Drive and on the west by 26th Avenue.

Our area is compact. We have common social and economic issues and concerns: Public Safety, Traffic, Quality of Life and Recreation Opportunities. Geographically the following locations have in the past generated and continue to generate operational issues/problems that spill out into our residential areas: Sloat Boulevard, 19th Avenue, Lake Merced Boulevard, Skyline Boulevard, Stonestown Shopping Center and Lakeshore Plaza, Lake Merced and Merced Reservoir.

Only by staying together and focusing on serious issues of safety to our community we have been able to make the following improvements:

Sloat Boulevard - Over the course of approximately 10 years we spearheaded and worked with members of Lakeshore Acres, Merced Manor, and Pinelake Park Neighbors, Department of Public Works, MTA and Cal-Trans on the Sloat Boulevard Pedestrian Safety Project which was completed approximately two years ago. It was the largest safety project on the Westside of San Francisco at that time.

Ocean Avenue Pedestrian Safety Project from 19th Avenue to Sunset Boulevard.

Lake Merced Boulevard - Several members of Lakeshore Acres are currently working with Supervisor Melgar, MTA and DPW on the Lake Merced Pedestrian Improvement Project.

Stonestown Shopping Center - We currently have members of our working group working with Brookfield the current ownership of Stonestown.

Lakeshore Plaza - We currently have members of Lakeshore Acres working with Supervisor Melgar, Taraval Police Station and DPW to address problems regarding Public Safety, garbage, and crime inside the plaza that spilled out into the neighborhood. In 2016 Officer Kevin Downs was shot and seriously injured during a robbery at Lakeshore Plaza and the incident spilled out into Everglade Drive that seriously impacted the neighbors.

Hello. I'm a 24-year resident and homeowner in Rincon Hil (D6), and I wanted to write to support some of the new proposals.

Specifically, I think 4B is the best map.

Historically, district 6 merged two radically different constituencies -- the Tenderloin and SoMa, but the supervisor can only represent one of the two where their needs differ -- which they have, frequently. Both communities are better served by district lines which separate them, as I see happening with 4 A-D. Frankly, some of our recent supervisors (especially Kim and Daly) had had little interest in the eastern parts of D6.

A second issue is that the way the districts have developed, Rincon Hill and South Beach have a natural affinity, and Mission Bay and Dogpatch fit well with them in terms of culture and interests. These are fast-growing areas which combine technology, manufacturing, medical and housing for the populations working in those areas. It makes no sense to split Rincon/South Beach, nor does it make sense to split Potrero, Mission Bay and Dogpatch, which share the Chase Center, UCSF, and some tech industry, albeit a bit more industrially focused.

So I don't think district 6 map 4D makes any sense, splitting off the eastern parts of Rincon Hil/East Cutl and grouping Potrero and Dogpatch with the Bayview.

4C doesn't really work either, since it splits Potrero/Dogpatch from Mission Bay, which are really a single corridor with issues coming from the Chase Center and UCSF, and there's commonality between the industrial startups of the Dogpatch and the technology ones in South Beach and Rincon, so keep them in D6.

4A isn't bad, but Potrero seems more of a natural match with D6 than D10.

4B seems best, although Yerba Buena probably belongs with D6. Perhaps 4B, but swapping some or all of the section north of Market Street to D3, which it resembles much more closely?

Hello Taskforce members. I want to call your attention to work currently underway between the Tenderloin Community, the Tenderloin People's Congress, SF Planning Department and District 6 Supervisors office.

In the 2019 budget cycle, the **Tenderloin People's Congress** advocated for the City to budget an additional \$70,000 to the Planning Department to assign a City Planner to work with the Tenderloin residents to develop and implement a Tenderloin Neighborhood Plan building on the "Vision 2020-A People's Platform" that had already been developed by the community. Thanks to our partnership with our DISTRICT 6 office, the \$70,000 was dedicated to Planning in the addback process out of the District 6 addback funds. This work would not have happened or continued without the direct support of our relationship with our District 6 Supervisor and staff.

Since then, the Planning Department, responding to the funding and request by the D6 Supervisor, a City Planner was assigned to begin working with the Tenderloin People's Congress and the Tenderloin Neighborhood stakeholders on the Tenderloin Community Action Plan.

We are currently in the middle of that process, having engaged in a yearlong outreach and engagement campaign, and are beginning the writing of the first draft of the plan which will be ready by June 1, 2022 and will then be shared throughout our community for feedback and revisions as needed. Phase 1 of the plan will begin working on implementation as early as July 1, 2022. We expect to finalize a version of the Full Plan by the end of 2022 and will then take the completed Plan to the Planning Commission and Board of Supervisors for review and approval.

This work is being done in direct partnership with the Planning Department, Tenderloin Community and the DISTRICT 6 office and staff.

Cutting the Tenderloin out of District 6 right in the middle of this critical process would be a devasting blow to all of the years of dedicated advocacy and work that has gone into getting this process started and moving in the direction of finally having a Tenderloin Neighborhood Plan for the City (one does not currently exist).

Years of hard work by resident leaders, our community partners, District 6 staff and Planning Department staff have gone into this plan and dividing the TL from Central SOMA and out of D6 at this time would likely derail this process completely.

Please do not let that happen. We are very close to having a 30 year vision for the Tenderloin Neighborhood that is derived from the community itself and supported by the City Agencies, but we need the relationships, partnerships, coalitions and collaborations of our D6 community across Central SOMA and beyond to make that a reality. Our future is now in your hands and we PLEAD with you to please protect our most vulnerable community in San Francisco, especially as they FINALLY have been able to begin developing a City plan for their own future.

I submit, that the **Tenderloin Community Action Plan is a Community of Interest** in and of itself and that it's very survival depends on remaining connected to Central SOMA and IN D6. <u>A Map of the Plan boundaries</u> are found on the San Francisco Planning Department Website at: <u>https://sfplanning.org/project/tenderloin-community-action-plan</u>

(note: you will notice that the plan boundaries do not include Civic Center. While we do consider Civic Center to be an essential part of the Tenderloin neighborhood, it already has a plan in the planning code, the TL does not, which is why it wasn't included in the TL plan.)



I have lived in the same apartment building in D1 (California & 25th Ave) for the last 13 years. Moved from a 1 bedroom rent control apartment in that building to a 2 bedroom rent control apartment because I needed an office space since I work from home & during Covid my neighbor moved out of CA. My landlady likes me and gave me reasonable rent so took that opportunity because to get more space living alone I may have had to leave SF and I love the Richmond District too much for me to leave.

The latest **4A**, **4B**, **4C**, **4D** map draftsall include the Sea Cliff in D1 which is very concerning. This is actually a little heart breaking.

I couldn't have stayed in SF if it wasn't for rent control and affordable rent in D1 when I moved to SF 13 years ago. D1 is truly for the working class and low to middle income worker and renters and seniors and working families.

Sea Cliff is the opposite of what you see in D1/ Richmond District and to include this area in D1 would truly have dire consequences. Sea cliff area is a very high income area (in my lifetime I will never be able to live in sea cliff) and adding that to the median income will make it more difficult to receive the services our community needs.

We also need more diversity and Sea Cliff which is 72% white does not help in this area.

NOPA is good addition to District 1 since it has many renters.

District 1 has the highest number of Ellis Act evictions, so we need more tenants for strength and to keep this district affordable and diverse.

Please consider the Community Unity map for D1 redistricting lines.

And please do NOT include Sea Cliff in D1.

I would like to voice my support for maps 4B and 4C.

I cannot support map 4D because all the west-side districts are underpopulated and all the east-side districts are overpopulated. Map 4D leaves no room for the population growth which is going to continue to be weighted to the city's east side.

I understand that it is hard to move old boundaries. But we should new create districts that can survive long into the future. If we avoid rebalancing now, we'll just have to do it 10 years from now. And it will be even harder then. Let's "rip the bandaid off" now and get it done right.

I also support combining the Western Addition with the Tenderloin in D5.

I'm a former Haight-Ashbury resident, and I saw how the political center of gravity in the current D5 is weighted towards the Haight, NoPa and Sunset neighborhoods. The Western Addition is largely ignored and taken for granted in current D5 politics. So combining the Western Addition with the Tenderloin (and possibly Central Soma) will give those core city neighborhoods a much stronger voice.

Additionally, the Haight is a wobbler neighborhood. It has connections to the surrounding neighborhoods north, west and south, and can easily integrate into those supervisorial districts if needed. Haight residents are adept at making themselves heard, and they will not suffer a decline in representation no matter which district gets that neighborhood.

Finally, as a current Portola resident, I see the value in moving us to D10. While I am happy with our current situation in D9, there <u>is</u> a strong connection between the Portola, Vis Valley, and the Bayview. So I would support combining all those neighborhoods in D10 -- especially if it helps rebalance other areas of the map.

Russian Hill Neighbors is one of the many neighborhood organizations that advocates for a compact and logical D3 with Van Ness Avenue as its western boundary. We appreciate that maps 3B and 4A reflect RHN's input. Thank you for hearing us.

RHN has been grateful for the many D3 organizations that have stepped forward to say that Russian Hill should remain in their district. We think they have done so because they know that, when needed, Russian Hill can be relied upon to work with them on issues of common interest. Although we do not always agree, our history of working together toward productive and thoughtful problem-solving has created a sense of trust and caring among us that promotes mutual respect and prioritizes long-term solutions over short-term interests.

RHN has had an excellent relationship over the past decade with our D2 Supervisors, but we do not have the same long history of collaboration with neighborhood organizations to our west. Van Ness Avenue is not just a line on a map; in terms of working with most of the other neighborhood organizations in D2, it functions as a hard boundary that separates rather than joins us. Placing all of Russian Hill in D2 would isolate us from our traditional network of peers.


I looked through v4 and it still subdivides a core part of Cole Valley. It is better than 3B but not as good as 3A.

So I was disappointed to see that the draft redistricting map severely gerrymandered the northwest part of Potrero Hill and all of Showplace Square into a different district.

Fortunately, adding back the area from Potrero Avenue to Kansas, 17th to 22nd, results in only adding 1.9% more population in the district. Further, adding Showplace Square from Potrero Avenue to the current District 10 boundaries would continue to result in a district within the 5% population deviation allowed under law to keep recognized neighborhoods and communities of interest together in a single district.









So the progressives lose that one (or, if Matt Haney isn't elected to state Assembly, get a representative who is moving hard to the Yimby side). District 4 loses the entire inner Sunset, meaning it will be almost impossible for a candidate like Gordon Mar to win. The progressive vote in D5 is scattered. D3 picks up more conservative areas on the edge of the Marina.

"This is," Calvin Welch, a longtime neighborhood activist, told me, "a clear and direct attack on the progressive board majority."

There are three meetings next week, April 2, 4, and 6. And there will no doubt be more versions.

But this process keeps coming up with maps that stray further and further from the old districts, for no apparent demographic reason.

I once said that it would be hard to draw 11 bad districts in San Francisco. I was wrong; the task force has done it.



Dear Friends at San Francisco Chinese American Democratic Club and Better Housing Policies:

I am a retired internal medicine specialist and a 37 year resident of the south slope of Potrero Hill. I have no disclosures to report, financial, political, organizational, or otherwise. I am just a concerned citizen who wants to see the best for my community and my city.

I wanted to let you know that, at recent online San Francisco Redistricting Task Force meetings, I listened carefully to the testimony of the Chinese American Democratic Club (CADC), of the Better Housing Policies (BHP) organization, and of residents of Visitacion Valley, Portola, and Bayview neighborhoods. <u>Their heartfelt testimony convinced me to support your proposal to include those neighborhoods together in a new district</u>. I have referred to your new district as the Southeast Waterfront Neighborhoods District (SEWFND). At this stage of redistricting, we should try to avoid using the old district numbers, which tend to tie us down to past decisions that do not reflect current realities.

I also reviewed the CADC and BHP maps you proposed for your new SEWFND (see your map, which is attached). Interestingly, its northern border fits almost perfectly with the southern border of the new district I have proposed, the Northeast Waterfront Neighborhoods District (NEWFND) (see my attached map), which includes all of Potrero Hill, Dogpatch, and most of SOMA. <u>Both of these newly drawn district maps are compact, contiguous, ethnically and racially diverse, and fall well within the required parameters for population</u>.

In the descriptions of your maps, you noted that the map proposal of J.R. Eppler, the President of the Potrero Boosters, of which I am a member, had its southern border at Cesar Chavez. I wish that were the case! Unfortunately, tonight I received the last-minute unexpected notification that, at the Tuesday, March 29, 2022 evening online meeting of the Potrero Boosters, <u>Mr. Eppler will be advocating for something he calls</u> the "D10 Unity Map" (see his map, which is attached). To me, this looks like an ill-considered rehash of the district we have currently.

From the standpoint of the CADC and BHP and of the people who passionately testified about the need for a new SEWFND, <u>Eppler's proposal will NOT allow neighborhoods like</u> <u>Visitacion Valley and Portola to unite with Bayview</u>. And <u>it will not allow Potrero Hill</u> <u>and Dogpatch to combine with SOMA, with which we have developed many common</u> <u>issues over the past decade</u>: in public safety, transportation, UCSF expansion, where our newest residents work, etc. (See my attached Northeast Waterfront Neighborhoods -Community of Interest Statement, which also addresses your aspiration for a new SEWFND.)

I am not sure precisely what you can do at this point. But <u>I would urge you to keep</u> <u>advocating for the CADC and BHP maps you have designed for the SEWFND</u>. Perhaps, in your presentations to the upcoming online meetings of the San Francisco Redistricting Task Force, you might consider pointing out how your maps of a new Southeast Waterfront Neighborhoods District complement the NEWFND map that I have designed for the Northeastern Waterfront Neighborhoods of Potrero Hill, Dogpatch, and SOMA. Please feel free to pass along this email and/or the attachments to others who might find them useful in your testimony. I will also send a copy of this email to the San Francisco Redistricting Task Force to show them how your map and ours complement each other and how they truly represent the most equitable Supervisorial District solution for the Eastern Waterfront Neighborhoods over the next decade.

NE Waterfront Neighborhoods - Community of Interest Statement

The first draft of the new district map, released on Friday, March 11, 2022, is a gerrymandered abomination. It filets our Potrero Hill - Dogpatch neighborhood right down its spine, lopping off part of our community east of Hwy 101, along with blocks north of 16th Street in Showplace Square. Our community leaders have forcefully argued for keeping Potrero Hill and Dogpatch together. However, I must respectfully ask if the redistricting commissioners were paying attention to the testimony our Potrero Hill and Dogpatch community representatives presented at the recent hearings on Zoom.

In my opinion, while the map submitted by our own community leaders recognizes the historic indivisibility of Potrero Hill and Dogpatch, which is one of the necessary criteria, it does not meet the other requirements for an actual district. The criteria include near equal population compared to other districts, contiguousness, compactness, and representation of diverse communities.

Much has changed during the 36 years I have been a Potrero Hill resident. Our neighborhoods, including Dogpatch, have become much more aligned to the new neighborhoods north of us. While we live in Potrero Hill and Dogpatch, many of us work in SOMA. And many of the issues we face are like those of SOMA residents: increasing crime and lack of adequate security; encroaching homelessness and absence of creative ways for solving this dilemma; the expansion of UCSF; traffic and parking issues generated by the huge sports complexes; and inadequate transportation.

Both our Potrero Hill and Dogpatch community leaders and the members of the San Francisco Redistricting Task Force need to start thinking out of the box, so that we do not allow our Potrero Hill-Dogpatch community to become divided. To this end, using the redistricting map tool, I have designed a district that incorporates all the criteria listed above (see attached image). It keeps together historical Potrero Hill and Dogpatch and unites them with the vibrant tech/biotech hub of SOMA by merging the part of District 10 that includes our neighborhoods with the southeastern part of District 6 that includes SOMA.

The new district I have proposed is both compact and contiguous, bounded by the northeastern waterfront, Mission Street in SOMA, the Central Freeway, Potrero Avenue, and Islais Creek. The population of this new district is 79,428 (goal population minus 0.15%) and it is ethnically diverse: 12.2% Hispanic, 38.6% White, 7.0% Black, 38.4% Asian, and 1.1% Multi-Racial. I have given the new district a colorful nickname, "SOMA Pot Patch", which incorporates a bit of each of the names of its components, but it may be formally known as "Northeastern Waterfront Neighborhoods."

At the most recent Redistricting Task Force online hearing on Saturday, March 5, 2022, many leaders and community residents of the Visitacion Valley and Portola neighborhoods testified that it was important for them to have their neighborhoods AND Bayview included in one new supervisorial district. Our proposal to combine Potrero Hill and Dogpatch with SOMA in a new "Northeastern Waterfront Neighborhoods" district would serendipitously have the effect of supporting the aspirations of Visitacion Valley and Portola residents to combine with Bayview in one "Southeastern Waterfront Neighborhoods" district. 

There were many boarded up windows due to not only closures, but vandalism. Trees along Irving Street were also targeted and damaged or destroyed. I feel that if this area was joined together and connected to its most immediate District it would be better served.

Task Force Members,

I am following up on a publicly submitted COI boundary map, the "Filipino Historical and Cultural Community" COI boundaries. These boundaries were submitted on 3/26 through the online form, and can be found under COI Public Input. These boundaries, however, are not shown as a layer on the Redistricting Task Force Map Viewer under "Publicly Submitted Communities of Interest" which have been largely guiding this Task Force in their drawing of boundaries.

There is a layer that has shown up titled "Tenderloin" which covers the northern half of the submitted "Filipino Historical and Cultural Community" boundaries; however, the entire southern portion of this boundary is not included. This boundary covers BOTH the northern areas of the Tenderloin AND the southern areas of the SOMA as outlined in the submitted boundary map. This COI boundary spans both the TL and SOMA.

It appears that either the Q2 consultant or the Task Force (I am not sure who decides how to upload COI boundaries) is manipulating publicly submitted COI boundaries, or altogether ignoring publicly submitted COI boundaries. Why has the COI boundaries that were submitted not been added as a "Publicly Submitted Community of Interest" on the Task Force Map Viewer to inform the process of redrawing district boundaries? It is extremely frustrating that now both online submissions of COI and verbal testimony of COI are being ignored, and that instead the Task Force is trying to redefine what we have submitted and outright dismissing it. If we are incorrectly submitting COI boundary information, either online or verbally, please explain how so.

Other COI maps such as "Emerging Communities" have been uploaded and accepted. If it is easier for the Task Force to upload this boundary map under a different name you can use "Historical POC Communities". I again request for the "Filipino Historical and Cultural Community" OR alternatively named "Historical POC Communities" boundaries be added AS SHOWN (again attached) to the publicly submitted communities of interest layer on the Task Force Viewer Map.



I am writing to express concern about the latest maps that divide the Ocean Avenue community benefits district. The merchants along Ocean are diverse and are reflective of the multicultural roots of the intersecting neighborhoods. For the past few years, Ocean hosted annual Lunar New Year celebrations drawing hundreds of residents to the corridor.

Ocean Avenue serves as a hub and connector not just the Ingleside neighborhood, but for surrounding neighborhoods primarily in District 7: Westwood Park, Dorado Terrace, Westwood Highlands, Ingleside Terrace, and Sunnyside. The current proposed map bifurcates the community benefits district at Ashton Avenue. We fear that this will have an adverse impact on the representation and services we will receive. Currently we are represented by the Supervisor of District 7, which has resulted in a close collaboration with that office. It is clear who we need to reach out to for advocacy on budgetary and policy issues; as well as service requests. Since the office also represents residents in parts of Ingleside and the other neighborhoods - we also feel there is a sense of cohesiveness that we believe will be lost if part of our corridor is redistricted into District 11.

Please reconsider your map and keep all of the Ocean Avenue CBD and the existing precincts up to Holloway in District 7.
