AB 628 – The Breaking Barriers to Employment Grant

Updated: 3/22/21

BACKGROUND

The Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act of 2014 (WIOA) represents the single most significant change in federal workforce policy in over 15 years.

Among other requirements, WIOA mandates that states develop a plan for making workforce investments, set goals, and then report on their progress in meeting milestones to those goals. California has historically invested miniscule amounts into the workforce system, relying instead on Federal funding and missing opportunities to provide greater emphasis on access and equity in programs.

JOB TRAINING & COVID

The COVID-19 pandemic has had disastrous effects on California's job training system while increasing its necessity. At its peak, 4.8 million Californians filed for unemployment, while businesses in the State reported 3984 mass layoffs of workers since February. In the last year, 84% of Black Californians in our state's labor force have filed for unemployment benefits, and have yet to see any significant net jobs gains. In response, the Federal government's relief packages have included next to no dedicated retraining funding. To make matters worse, annual appropriations of Federal funding are based on unemployment rates in the early part of the year, and California's low unemployment rate in January of 2020 belied the tidal wave of job loss to come, underfunding the workforce system further.

Before the pandemic, California's Unified Strategic Workforce Development Plan (State Plan) outlined a goal (2017 through 2027) to produce one million "middle-skill" industry-valued and recognized postsecondary credentials for in-demand sectors that provide meaningful careers and pay family-sustaining wages to workers without college degrees. In meeting this goal, the State Plan anticipates doubling the number of people enrolled in apprenticeship programs. This goal will not be achieved without ensuring California's most vulnerable

populations are included among the State's individuals in high-wage, high-growth careers. This focus is now more critical than ever, as low-wage jobs in accommodations and food service have suffered the highest rates of job loss, displacing families and individuals already at the greatest risk of sustained poverty.

NEED TARGETED APPROACH

Key challenges to meeting this important goal are the significant number of workers who are not currently ready to take on middle skill training. The Public Policy Institute of California estimates that by 2025 the State will be short 1.5 million middle skilled workers.

California needs to extend this targeted program to help build a stronger workforce development system that recognizes the contributions of current and prospective workers who have disproportionately impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic, and increases their skills to match business and industry demand. While the original Breaking Barriers legislation was critical in providing an initial investment into the workforce system, our state has an opportunity to further the equity and access of the program. With the pandemic-related job loss highest among immigrants and low-income workers of color in California, many of whom are also represented in high-risk, frontline industries, our state can better address these disparities with community-responsive, equitable, and accessible workforce development programs.

BILL SUMMARY

This measure builds upon key objectives in the Breaking Barriers legislation and the State Plan by assisting individuals in obtaining the fundamental programs and support services necessary to secure meaningful and stable careers, leverage multiple services to meet a worker's individual needs, and reach people who face systemic barriers to employment. Moreover, the bill expands access and eligibility for community-based organizations to supply training and support services, and refocuses equity and access as priority measures of program success.
