GENERAL PUBLIC COMMENT

Francisco Dacosta spoke of quality of life issues and spoke of needing a police force closer to the number of 2000. He stated that the police force now cannot manage a lot of the situation because of the pandemic and because of other issues that adversely impact the citizens of San

David Aaronson, Wealth & Disparities, read a quote by their founder regarding bias in the SFPD. He went on to talk about problems with the working group regarding traffic DGO 9.01 and concerns regarding holding meetings in police station and during workdays. He talked about intimidation and that meetings should be held in time and convenience in people in the Black community.

Luke Bornheimer talked about barricades along Mission Station and that they should come down and be removed as soon as possible. He also talked about a lack of traffic enforcement on Focus on the 5. He stated that they need to see traffic enforcement especially on Focus on the 5.

Susan Buckman, Wealth & Disparities, read a quote by their founder regarding bias in the SFPD. She went on to talk about problems with the working group regarding traffic DGO 9.01.

Jean Bridges, Wealth & Disparities, read a quote by their founder regarding bias in the SFPD and spoke of lack of urgency in response to their requests.

Stacy spoke of barricades on Mission Station and that they create a hostile environment and spoke of traffic enforcement especially on Focus on the Five as this is critical for the community.

Chief's Report

- Weekly crime trends
- Major/Significant Incidents

Chief Scott reported on crime trends YTD: Violent Crime up 6 percent; homicide down 6 percent; rape up 8 percent; robbery up 3 percent; assault up 10 percent; human trafficking down 56 percent. Property Crimes up 8 percent; burglary down 23 percent; motor vehicle theft up 2 percent; arson down 15 percent; larceny theft up 19 percent. Gun violence is down 8 percent compared to 2021; Two shooting incidents for the week ending on 9/4/22; total 122 incidents resulting in 141 victims YTD. One homicide for the week ending 9/4/22; there are a total of 34 homicides YTD with 25 resulting from a firearm; 63% overall clearance. Guns seized 694; ghost guns seized 129 YTD.

Significant incident: Homicide at 1000 Block of Oakdale, September 4th, multiple shot spotter notifications with two victims with gunshot wounds located, 1 victim succumb to her injuries; a third victim with gunshot wounds self-transported to the hospital; three of the four suspects open fired at a group of people who were in the parking lot; Bayview provided additional patrols in and around the area of the incident. Two shooting incidents: September 4th, 500 block of Valencia, victim approached by suspect who was an ex-coworker; victim and suspect was in a physical fight; suspect pulled out a gun and shot two rounds striking the victim who was transported to the hospital; suspect was taken into custody. Another shooting on September 4th, 300 Block of Ocean, Ingleside, officer responded to a club and located a victim with gunshot wound to the chest; no arrest has been made, investigation is ongoing.

Significant arrest: Internet Crimes Against Children "ICAC" Unit made arrest on a person responsible for child pornography in Livermore and investigators seized multiple electronic devices as evidence and determined that there are additional victims. Retail theft arrest of a repeat offender when officers responded to the Safeway on 30th and Mission; total of three suspects were arrested; this was the sixth arrest of one of the suspects arrested. Arrest of shooting suspect on August 16th, where a male was shot by his girlfriend's ex-boyfriend on the 1000 block of Market Street. On August 30th, a subject came into SFPD to retrieve items from a previous case. The officer recognized the suspect from a crime bulletin; suspect was booked on the assault with a deadly weapon. Robbery with a gun series, two suspects taken into custody on August 31st following an investigation of at least nine armed robberies in San Francisco throughout the month of August. Hit a run with serious injuries on September 3rd at Junipero Serra where a vehicle traveling at a high rate of speed ran a stop light and collided with a vehicle; suspects fled on foot where suspect's vehicle were used for retail thefts in Palo Alto and Stonestown Galleria, no arrest made, investigation is ongoing.

Strategies: Central: Focus on street robbery issues and auto burglaries; plainclothes teams deployed in areas where these crimes have occurred; Richmond: Focus on prevention and high visibility in areas with increased burglaries and break ins.

The Chief then reported on barricades along Valencia were put in place on some of the sidewalks in the Mission to hold ground once the sidewalks were cleaned up.

The Chief gave a brief update on some of the General Orders that the Commission have prioritized. There are 29 DGOs that are in the current revision process. DGOs 1.03, 1.04, 1.05, 1.06, 1.07: Duties of Personnel: 4 DGOs will be combined; Serious Incident Review Board, draft written and need to assemble working group.

PUBLIC COMMENT

Francisco Dacosta spoke of a stabbing incident and stated that the Street Violence Intervention Program does excellent work. He stated he is noticing more violence.

Luke Bornheimer spoke regarding barricades around Mission Station along Mission and Valencia Streets and that it would be great to see these down.

DPA Director's Report

Report on recent DPA activities, and announcement

Executive Director Henderson reported the following: In the year 2022: 465 cases opened; 501 closed; 244 pending; 47 cases sustained; 22 cases past 270-day; 16 cases mediated. Cases received in the past 5 weeks: 61 new cases; 5 (Central) harassment, a supervisor failed to intervene, failed to provide a badge number on request, failed to take a stolen identity report, and failed to make an arrest; 8 (Southern) abuse of power, failure to conduct a thorough search, reckless driving, failure to investigate an assault, detention of a person for mental health evaluation without justification; 1 (Bayview) followed and harassed complainant; 5 (Mission) illegal seizure of a firearm and failure to investigate an accident; 5 (Northern) failure to take a police report, issued a search warrant without cause, failure to use de-escalation techniques, improper citation, and use of profanity; 6 (Park) issued an invalid parking ticket, followed, and harassed a person, refused to

prepare a police report, and failed to investigate a reported crime; 3 (Richmond) rude and refused to take a police report, wrongful detention and citation, failure to investigate, and arrest a person who attempted to steal car parts; 1 (Ingleside) reckless driving; 5 (Taraval) failure to respond to a trespasser illegally detained a person under mental health evaluation and illegally obtained and provided criminal background information on a person; 10 (Tenderloin) excessive response time for a call for service, failure to arrest a suspect, failure to respond to multiple reports of break-ins, and failure to remove a homeless person from outside their business; 1 (Airport) threatened to issue a vehicle citation at the airport drop-off; 7 (out of town) off-duty trespassed on the property as a form of intimidation.

Audits: Two audits: One on how the Department handles officers' misconduct and second is Auditing the Police Department's compliance with DGO 8.10.

Outreach: Can be found on community calendar on the DPA's website and posted on Tweeter, Facebook, Instagram and on DHR's website: August started giving a mediation program overview at district stations and presented at Park, Tenderloin, and Central Stations; Participated in Mo Magic Backpack Giveaway and Resource Fair and presentation at various District Stations.

PUBLIC COMMENT

Francisco Dacosta spoke regarding when an officer is suffering pain and how many things happen and to have resources to help the officers and spoke of empathy.

Commissioner Elias spoke of pretext stops and stated that she's been working with the Department regarding DGO 5.01 to fix some of the issues with implementing the DGO as it currently stood and was able to fix it and will be on the agenda for next week.

Commissioner Benedicto updated regarding public outreach for draft DGO 9.01 which included outreach with two working group meetings, with patrol officers, with district captains, and with the community at National Night Outs . Next meeting will be on September 28th and information is on the Commission website. He also stated that the Commission have received a lot of emails and thanked the public for their feedback and those feedback are being addressed. He also met with Steve Flaherty regarding upcoming audits.

Commissioner Walker spoke of attending the listening session last night regarding DGO 9.01 and stated that everybody is paying attention to this and stated that it is good to talk about it. She also did a ride along at the Tenderloin and did some training at the Academy.

Commissioner Byrne would like to do another nighttime ride along at the Tenderloin and stated that the issue of drug dealers at night is disconcerting. He also stated that he and Commissioner Yee will meet with the Chief regarding awards and on Sunday will be the Fire, Police, and Sheriff Memorial Mass honoring first responders who died in the line of duty.

Commissioner Yee thanked Chief Scott and Commissioner Benedicto for attending the townhall meeting in Chinatown and thanked the Chief for resolving issues regarding attack on seniors. He also thanked the working group working on DGO 9.01. He also recommended a town hall meeting at Visitacion Valley.

Commissioner Carter-Oberstone spoke of the great work that has been going on DGO 9.01. He also stated that this will be the most transparent DGO process that the Commission have undertaken.

Susan Buckman, Wealth and Disparities, read a quote from their founder regarding bias from SFPD and spoke of concerns regarding the traffic DGO working group and spoke of no black community involvement in the working group.

Jean Bridges, Wealth and Disparities, read a quote from their founder regarding anti blackness in SFPD and spoke of racial disparities discussed in last week's meeting and concerns about Commissioner Byrne.

Chief's Report

Chief Scott reported on crime trends YTD: Violent Crime up 6 percent; homicide down 3 percent; rape up 8 percent; robbery up 3 percent; assault up 10 percent; human trafficking down 56 percent. Property Crimes up 9 percent; burglary down 23 percent; motor vehicle theft up 3 percent; arson down 15 percent; larceny theft up 19 percent. Gun violence is down 9 percent compared to 2021; Three shooting incidents for the week ending on 9/11/22; total 126 incidents resulting in 145 victims YTD. Two homicides for the week ending 9/11/22; there are a total of 36 homicides YTD with 26 resulting from a firearm; 62% overall clearance. Guns seized 729; ghost guns seized 129 YTD. The Chief also reported on what is happening in the Tenderloin: 371 possession for sale bookings; seized over 68,000 grams of total narcotics, of that 39, 148 are Fentanyl.

Significant Incident: Two homicides: September 6th at the 600 block of Larch, victim passed away, officers responded to shot spotter activation in the area of Laguna and Eddy, investigation is ongoing; September 10th at stabbing homicide occurred; private video footage provided to the officers showed two males in an altercation, one male fell to the ground and later passed away from his injuries. The second subject fled in a vehicle, later taken into custody. Three shooting incidents: September 6th, on Essex Street, victim was inside a residence when one of the subjects grabbed the victim's hand which contained a large sum of money, subject fired a shot and struck the victim, victim was transported to the hospital, no arrest made, investigation is ongoing. September 10th, at 5th and Natoma, victim was approached by an unknown subject asking for change, subject brandished a handgun and when victim did not hand over his money, subject shot the victim, no arrest made, investigation is ongoing. September 11th, 500 block of Felton, victim was at Jack in the Box located on Bayshore Boulevard when victim got into argument with unknown person. A short time later, victim was sitting in his vehicle when he was shot, no arrest made, investigation is ongoing.

Strategies: Community complaint in illegal vending in the Mission resulted in plan that included multi-agencies to go after illegal vending. Park: Car break ins, assigned extra patrol to continue patrolling the area.

Stunt Driving: September 10th, at 6th and Harrison at 1:45 a.m. involving 200 – 300 spectators and a number of vehicles; at 2:09 a.m. an event was reported at Van Ness and Pine with reports of gunshot. Units responded and broke up the group; vehicles left at high rate of speed down Pine and Gough, running redlights. During the event, two people were injured and self-transported to the hospital with minor injuries. At 3:30 a.m., units responded to the Bay Bridge and CHP responded to help break it up.

The Chief reported that the barricade around Mission Station have been taken down.

MOU with the District Attorney's Office have been extended to October 17th.

David Aaronson agreed that there needs to be urgency on the MOU between SFDA and SFPD and spoke of higher rates of drug use imprisonment is not the answer.

Captain Tom Harvey, Lieutenant Mike Nevin, and Sergeant John Crudo presented DGO 5.01, Use of Force Policy and Proper Control of a Person."

Chief's Report

- Weekly crime trends
- Major/Significant Incidents

Assistant Chief Lazar started his report with the announcement of the Latino Heritage Month. He continued to report on crime trends YTD: Violent Crime up 7 percent; homicide down 3 percent; rape up 9 percent; robbery up 4 percent; assault up 10 percent; human trafficking down 42 percent. Property Crimes up 8 percent; burglary down 22 percent; motor vehicle theft up 4 percent; arson down 13 percent; larceny theft up 18 percent. Gun violence is down 7 percent compared to 2021; Five shooting incidents for the week ending on 9/18/22; total 131 incidents resulting in 151 victims YTD. One homicide for the week ending 9/18/22; there are a total of 37 homicides YTD with 26 resulting from a firearm; 61% overall clearance. Guns seized 758; ghost guns seized 129 YTD.

Significant Incident: Two Homicides: On September 18th, stabbing on the 900 block of Geary, argument where two subjects were stabbed, one succumbed to his injuries, investigation is ongoing. On September 19th, at Laguna & Golden Gate, shot spotter notification was received, victim was unresponsive and transported to the hospital, no arrest made, investigation is ongoing. Five Non-Fatal Shootings: September 14th, Hyde & Fulton, victim was walking and saw an individual that they knew and had an altercation where one person shot the other; September 14th, 800 block of Inez, shot spotter activation, Sheriff's Office advised of a person who walked in the hospital who was a victim of a gunshot wound, victim stated he was driving in the area when he was shot; On the 800 block of Clay, victim was in an argument in a hallway and during the argument, the suspect pulled out a gun and shot his neighbor; September 15th, 3100 block of Mission, there were multiple casings located where there was a robbery of a victim at a cannabis club who was approached by three suspects and was shot; September 18th, City Nights Club, witnesses saw someone shooting from 3rd Street and resulted in someone being shot.

Strategies: Chief Lazar stated that the Department is mindful of retaliation and Captains were asked in the Bayview, Ingleside, and Northern to add extra presence for visibility.

Chief Lazar reported on the Tenderloin Micro Grant: It's done three things 1) increased foot beats of officers in the Tenderloin; 2) Increased outreach and education in the community; 3) Partnered with local youth groups specifically YMCA to promote mentorship opportunities. Chief Lazar stated that as a result of this grant: 466 engagements; 59 arrests; 325 citations and 82 admonishments.

Chief Lazar also talked about "Officer of the Month" where there is now a schedule where a bureau selects an officer every month to recognize the great work the officers are doing and spoke of partnership with Hotel Council to host celebration with the officer. Today the Department congratulated Officer Ray Pascua, Airport Bureau, who received Officer of the Month in August, Officers David Nastari and Michael Ellis, Traffic Company who received Officer of the Month in September.

Chief Lazar reported on Dreamforce where officers were present in and outside of Dreamforce. The Department is now planning for Fleet Week. He also announced that October 5th is Coffee With a Cop day.

Director Henderson reported the following: In the year 2022: 488 cases opened; 522 closed; 247 pending; 48 cases sustained; 24 cases past 270-day; 16 cases mediated. Cases received in the past week: 9 new cases; 1 (Central) unsafe driving; 1 (Southern) Failure to dispatch an officer for a behavioral health crisis;1 (Bayview) failure to take action against abusive behavior; 2 (Northern) failure to respond to a burglary call, transported and dropped a person off with no shoes and in pain; 1 (Park) referral to Sheriff's office; 1 (Richmond) failure to ask for current auto insurance and discriminating against a person; 2 (Tenderloin) arresting person for failing to sign a citation and refusing to call a supervisor or sergeant, failure to arrest and assault the suspect.

Director Henderson then presented the monthly statistical reports.
