Victoria Westbrook, Reentry Policy Planner for the San Francisco Adult Probation Department, provided updates regarding the 3 Reentry Council Subcommittees:

- The Legislation, Policy & Procedures Subcommittee has primarily focused on the legislation brought to the Council today. Their July 27, 2021 meeting was rescheduled to August 29, 2022 to plan for efforts to lobby with the Governor on the bills supported by the State Legislation Committee (SLC).
- The Direct Services Subcommittee will be moderating 3 panels at the upcoming Reentry Resource Fair on September 9, 2022. Their next meeting is on September 19, 2022
- At the last Women 1st Subcommittee meeting, Epiphany Center presented information about their Road to Resilience program. Their next meeting will be on September 12, 2022 in which the Department on the Status of Women will be there to continue discussions regarding economic stability and security for justice involved women.

Steve Adami, Director, Reentry Division of the Adult Probation provided updates regarding the Launch of the Minna Project, a 75 bed Dual Diagnosis Transitional Housing Program which has onsite clinical case management. Steve also provided an update on the upcoming Pretrial Pilot Program, a 15 bed Transitional Housing Program specifically for people on pretrial diversion. Prioritization will be given to Assertive Case Management (ACM) clients.

AB 1816 would create the Reentry Housing Program to provide five-year renewable grants to counties to fund evidence-based housing based services interventions, and employment services to allow people with recent histories of incarceration to exit homelessness, remain stably housed, and become successfully employed.

Sen. Steve Glazer, District 07, Democrat

California Conservation Corps: forestry training center: formerly incarcerated individuals: reporting

SB 936 would create a forestry training center in Northern California. This center would be a collaboration between the Department of Forestry and Fire Protection (CalFire), California Conservation Corps (CCC) and the California Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation (CDCR), and would train former inmates in forestry and vegetation management.

Upon completion, these trainees would be eligible for an entry-level forestry or vegetation management position the state. This center would expand workforce development in forestry while reducing recidivism rates by creating a pathway to gainful employment.

10. Presentation: "Housing Needs of Justice Involved Adults." A research project led by the Reentry Division of the San Francisco Adult probation Department and the Direct Services Subcommittee of the Reentry Council. Destiny Pletsch – discussion only).

Destiny Pletsch, Reentry Services Manager from the Reentry Division of the Adult Probation Department presented preliminary findings of the "Housing Needs of Justice Involved Adults" research project. This mixed methods

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research project was conducted by the Reentry Division in conjunction with the Direct Services Subcommittee of the Reentry Council. A formal report with recommendations will be presented to the Reentry Council in the October meeting.

Steve Adami answered questions regarding the presentation from the Council members.

District Attorney Jenkins thanked the 4 current Board of Supervisors' Appointees to the Council for their service on the Council and the contributions they have made.

District Attorney Jenkin explained that recruitment for the 4, now vacant positions will be conducted during August so that the seats will be filled by the October Reentry Council meeting. She further explained that current appointees can reapply for the vacant seats.

12. Introduction of the Just Home Project – Kaitlyn Motley (discussion only).

Kate Motley, the Strategy and Planning Lead from the Department of Homelessness and Supportive Housing presented information on the Just Home Project, a new initiative led by the MacArthur Foundation and the Urban Institute intended to develop supportive housing solutions for justice-involved adults.

CROP's History

- **2008** - Founded by a father and son who believed that incarceration should not determine people's ability to make a positive impact in the world
- **2010** - Under CROP's sponsorship, a team of incarcerated leaders created an Alcohol & Other Drug Certification program
- **2014** - Successfully helped certify 33 people serving life-terms as counselors who helped transform the culture of CTF Soledad
- **2020** - After establishing a scholarship that warranted national news coverage and serving over 1,000 people, the founders of CROP were released from prison and turned their focus to reentry
- **2021** - Awarded a grant for \$28.5 million from the State of California to launch a three-year pilot program called Ready 4 Life



CROP's Theory of Change

CROP is dedicated to reforming California's criminal justice landscape through holistic approaches to reentry that reduce recidivism among people returning from California state prisons. CROP envisions a society that invests in people over punishment and seeks to contribute to this vision, through our mission of reimagining reentry through a holistic, human centered approach to advocacy, housing, and skill development for future work.

We aim to test the hypothesis that: **If justice-involved people are successfully prepared and placed in technology and knowledge-based jobs for the Future of Work, then, people with conviction records will be valued catalysts for increased economic prosperity and community healing.**

- Be currently incarcerated (and will be released in time for their Ready 4 Life start date) or have been released from a California state/federal prison within the past five years
- Be able to communicate and learn in English
- Have a birth certificate and ability to obtain state ID
- Have at least a GED (college preferred)
- Demonstrate stable housing for 9 months (for non-residential Fellows)

Exclusions:

- Individuals with sex offenses
- Major disciplinary infractions/acts of violence within 12 months
- Individuals that require ADL (“Activities of Daily Living”) assistance
- Individuals with a history of serious mental illnesses
- Individuals required to have substance abuse treatment for active addiction issues

Ready 4 Life Career Development Program

Program Fellows Receive:

- 12 months intensively developing a growth mindset and market-driven skills in tech-related careers
- Access to employment opportunities with salaries starting at \$60k/year
- Necessary resources to gain valuable skills, like a laptop computer
- Support with finding permanent housing solutions within the community
- Monthly stipend to help ease the economic stressors of reentry and enable full program participation
- Room and board at our Bay Area Career Campus (*up to 15 Fellows per cohort*)

Program Logistics

Bay Area Career Campus

- In-person learning
- 30 person rolling cohorts (15 on-campus + 15 off-campus)
- Mon-Fri, 9am-5pm

LA Service Program

- Hybrid learning (virtual instruction, in-person events)
- 25 person rolling cohorts
- Mon-Fri, 4:30pm-8pm



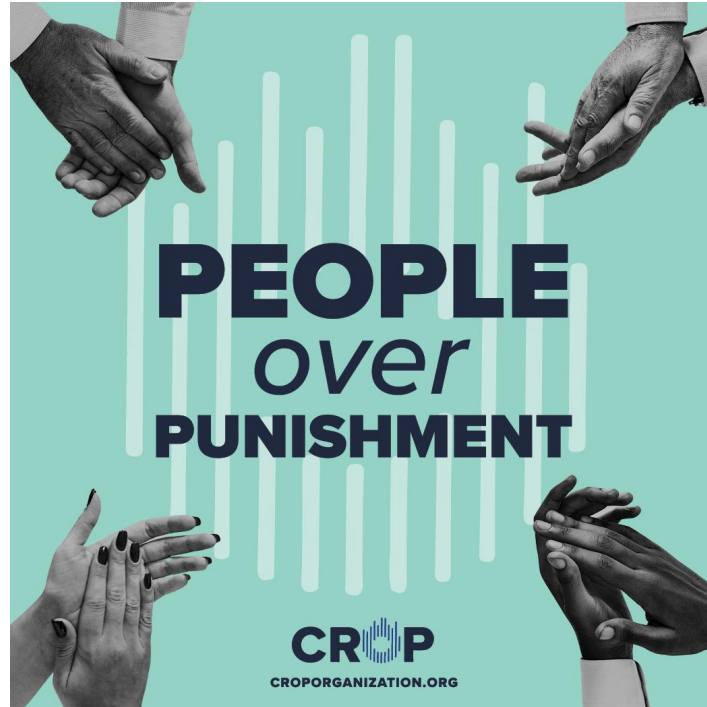
