- Uses disaggregated data to surface racial disparities


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
- Allocates funding to address CNA findings

Review of DCYF-Funded Justice Services

(2018–2023 Funding Cycle)

Justice Services Service Area



A continuum of services for justice system-involved youth and disconnected TAY that aims to:

- Prevent further youth engagement in the justice system
- Reduce rates of youth recidivism through connection to adult allies, culturally relevant programming, ongoing case management, access to positive skill building activities and whole family engagement

The Justice Services Service Area includes the following initiative and strategies:

- Community Assessment & Referral Center (CARC)
- Cultural Programming
- Detention Based Services
- Girls' and Young Women's Programming
- Multi-Service
- Young Adult Court Case Management
- Intensive Supervision & Clinical Support (ISCS) (funded in partnership with DPH)

Justice Services Overview



Total Funding for Justice Services Area: \$15,323,870

Number of Funded Programs in Justice Services Area: 50

Number of Participants in FY21-22: 2,345 (duplicated)

- Juvenile arrests/referrals to JPD declined each year from 2018 to 2021.*
- In 2021, 292 youth encountered the justice systems and 52% (152) participated in JJCPA supported programs.*
- Among youth who were detained in 2021, 56% participated in JJCPA supported programs.*

Who is in the sample?



- Youth or young adult (up to 25 at time of triggering arrest) with records at:
 - SFJPD
 - \circ DA
 - CARC
- July 2018 to present
- Program participants in DCYF-funded Justice Services or Mentorship compared to match
- Triggering arrest:
 - For participants: most proximal prior to participation
 - For nonparticipants: first arrest in analysis period

What outcomes will be examined?



- Ever re-arrested
- Number of re-arrests
- GPA
- School attendance
- School disciplinary action
- Graduation
- New detentions or incarceration
- Relative rates of justice participation over time
