Starting On Tuesday January 31, 2023 Treasure Island Community Development (TICD) and its contractors will implement temporary traffic control with flaggers on the Treasure Island Causeway. The traffic control is for the final striping and signage improvement of the roadway. The Island community can expect the following:

Dates/Time of Work:

Tuesday, January 31, 2023 to Wednesday, February 1, 2023 from 7:00 AM to 3:00 PM

Nature of Work and Traffic Impacts:

- Roadway striping and signage
- Vehicle travel through both the western and eastern halves of the Causeway in the work area.
- Traffic control with flaggers will be in effect at each end of the work zone to guide vehicles to the correct travel lanes.
- No Impact to MUNI bus stops or route
- Once completed, the Causeway portion of the roadway will be in the permanent final condition.
- Please plan accordingly for slight delays along Treasure Island Road during the work period.







You must call in advance to schedule a phone appointment. When you call, please mention "Problem Solving Day". All California TAS offices are participating, so please call the nearest office to you.







YIMBY Visits Treasure Island, San Francisco

A recent site visit to <u>Treasure Island</u> by YIMBY reveals significant progress has been made for the region's most active construction project. Cranes and rising concrete have only started to divulge the scale of the 405-acre vision, nearly three decades in the making, that will redevelop <u>San Francisco's</u> storied artificial island with a mixed-use urban neighborhood populated by around eight thousand homes. The <u>Treasure Island Community Development</u> joint venture sponsors the project.

TICD is a partnership with <u>Stockbridge Capital Group</u>, <u>Wilson Meany</u>, and <u>Lennar Corporation</u>. The three developers are overseeing the roughly \$6 billion redevelopment of Treasure Island and <u>Yerba Buena Island</u> with housing, including replacement residences for existing residents and new affordable apartments. Plans include new construction and the adaptive reuse of existing structures to produce retail, hotels, and offices surrounded by new public open space.

Treasure Island Ferry

Our visit to Treasure Island yesterday was made with the new Treasure Island ferry, which unfortunately does not connect with Google Maps. The ten-dollar round-trip ticket purchased in-person or online will get passengers on the approximately ten-minute ride from the Ferry Building to the island in the middle of the Bay. The 55-seat boat sees just a handful of passengers each hour nowadays, according to the crew. However, demand is expected to increase once the island population surges in the coming years, and a larger boat will be necessary.

The ferry station on the island unloads just outside the semicircular 1939 Fair Building. Behind the Treasure Island Administration Building, land has already been leveled for the 117-unit Parcel B with design by <u>Stanley Saitowitz Natoma Architects</u>.

Tidal House

Along with the aerial pictures, new renderings have been shared of <u>Tidal House</u>, the tallest building currently under construction on Treasure Island. The 22-story high-rise at 39-49 Burton Street will create 250 new rental units. It is the first of several towers expected to form the island's skyline. Concrete has reached the fourth floor, and the tower is expected to open next year. Groundbreaking for the Tidal House tower was announced in July of last year by <u>Webcor</u>, the general contractors.

The 220-foot tall structure will yield around 313,240 square feet from the 0.84-acre property. The ground level will include the residential lobby, live-work units, a broad courtyard, and a corner café. Unit sizes will vary with 15 studios, 16 junior one-bedrooms, 93 one-bedrooms, 115 two-bedrooms, and 11 three-bedrooms. Parking will be included for 109 cars. GLS is responsible for the landscape architecture, which includes the podium-top courtyard and some sidewalk improvements.

<u>David Baker Architects</u> is responsible for the design. The white tower will sit on top of a four-to-five-story articulated townhome-style podium. The folded tower skin will express a repetitive bay window pattern, playing off the region's architectural vernacular. The design style, made most popular with MIRA SF by Studio Gang, has been proliferating with several more projects in the pipeline.

Immediately beside Tidal House, excavation work has started for Portico at C2.2, a 148-unit midrise complex designed by <u>Mark Cavagnero Associates</u>. The same architects are responsible for the 178-unit Hawkins apartment, for which the site has been cleared.

Crews are working on finishing touches to the <u>Maceo May Apartments</u>. The 105-unit project will provide housing for formerly homeless veterans and their families. The project will be delivered to the <u>Chinatown Community Development Center</u> and <u>Swords to Plowshares</u>, a Bay Area-based developer. <u>Mithun</u> is the project architect.

Across from Maceo May Apartments, another affordable housing project has broken ground. The seven-story Star View Court at 78 Johnson Street will eventually add 138 new homes with services provided by <u>Catholic Charities</u> and <u>Mercy Housing</u>. Completion is expected by next year. Concrete has reached the third floor.

The first construction phase will be connected by Cityside Park, a walkable thoroughfare for pedestrians and cyclists. The public amenity is being designed by <u>CMG Landscape Architecture</u>. The shared public way will extend through blocks C2 and C3 to the Cultural park and existing chapel. Across from the cultural park, the fair building will contain a new landscaped space facing the waterfront plaza, while the rear will overlook Marina Plaza.

Treasure Island Overview

While Tidal House is currently the tallest project under construction, it will be overshadowed once construction starts on Treasure Islands' <u>Parcel C2.1</u>, a 31-story tower with a 345-foot rooftop height. The <u>Handel Architects</u>-designed addition will feature 265 apartments.



The master plan was designed by <u>Skidmore Owings and Merrill</u>, who oriented the project around three compact neighborhoods with public transportation emanating from the mixed-use hub with connections to San Francisco. Of the 8,000 units, plans include 421 townhomes, 2,232 low-rise units, 519 mid-rise units, 3,144 tower units, and 1,684 to be managed by Authority Housing.

For now, the Treasure Island and Yerba Buena have seen the opening of <u>Bristol</u>, Maceo May Apartments, and Clipper Cove Beach. With the landscaping and five more projects under construction at the moment, there are nearly a thousand units either complete or rising. The first phase will open around 1,500 units. Tidal House is expected to open by 2024. Completion of the master plan is anticipated by 2036.

Moving the needle: San Francisco to unveil Hiroshi Sugimoto's towering sundial monument

The 70ft-high public art commission expresses 'humanity's yearning for the infinite'

The San Francisco Bay will soon be home to a monumental site-specific sculpture by the artist Hiroshi Sugimoto. *Point of Infinity*, a nearly 70ft-high stainless steel needle that also acts as a sundial, will sit atop Yerba Buena Hilltop Park on Yerba Buena Island. The work's sky-scraping dimensions required clearance from the Federal Aviation Administration and will be visible from multiple sightlines in the city, particularly the iconic Bay Bridge.

The \$2m public art commission is part of a \$50m park development on Treasure Island and Yerba Buena Island, announced in June 2017. Overseen by the San Francisco Arts Commission on behalf of the Treasure Island Development Authority, the high-profile project drew more than 500 proposals that were whittled down to three finalists: Sugimoto, Andy Goldsworthy and Chakaia Booker.

Nearly five years after Sugimoto's appointment, little about the project has been revealed—until now. As the San Francisco public art commissioner, Jill Manton, tells *The Art Newspaper*, "It's taken a number of years. I've gotten used to saying it's on 'city time'—there was a long pause between the idea and the reality because it was a complicated project."

Sugimoto himself has only just approved the final fabrication of the sculpture. The piece underwent "a dry fit" on 8 December to ensure that all its parts could be assembled correctly. The work will be shipped in February, and the journey to San Francisco's port will take around two months. The opening is currently planned for May.

Point of Infinity is not an arbitrary title—the work is based on the mathematical formula for infinity. According to the artist's project proposal, the starting point was "not to 'make' a sculptural shape but to ask myself what should be 'given' to this very specific place". He set out to explore the limits of human memory and invention, conceiving "a hyperbolic curve that would suggest both infinity and eternity: two converging curved lines, getting closer and closer but never meeting".

"In the material world, it is physically impossible to make a point that reaches all the way to infinity," writes Sugimoto. "What I can do, however, is suggest infinity by making an approximate point that can exist in the material world, as a mathematically modeled structure with a 1 1/8-inch-wide tip."

The sundial-monument also evokes the Tower of the Sun, the centrepiece of the 1939 World's Fair in San Francisco, for which Treasure Island was originally constructed. A large stone will be etched with the position of the sun's shadow on the vernal and autumnal equinoxes at noon. "The creation of the pyramids is shrouded in mystery. By contrast, this tower will act as a symbol expressing humanity's yearning for the infinite even 50 centuries in the future," the artist writes.

The commission came about somewhat circuitously, Manton explains. She had approached Sugimoto's San Francisco dealer, Fraenkel Gallery, to ask if the artist would be interested in creating a public work for San Francisco International Airport, and then casually mentioned the Treasure Island opportunity. "Once he heard about it, he was dead set on applying," Manton says. "I have to say that Sugimoto's [proposed] work really was singularly the most stunning and exquisite." The project was put to a selection panel (and presented to the public, though they didn't have a direct vote) which chose *Point of Infinity*.

A city like San Francisco, known as a haven for both artists and patrons, is often caught between serving community and capital interests. When the development masterplan was first unveiled, Manton caught wind and petitioned the mayor's office to "make Treasure Island a destination for the arts" that would "benefit the public realm instead of private art on private property". Through the city's Percent for Art policy, which levies a 1% fee on private developers to finance public art initiatives, Treasure Island "will generate about \$50 million over the 20-year course of the development project", she explains.

Sugimoto's project is the first big step in achieving that plan—but it doesn't end there. The San Francisco Arts Commission has recently engaged five photographers to document the evolution of the island over the next year, launched a youth photography programme, and temporary exhibitions of public sculptures are in the works. The organisation is also gearing up to commission a public artwork for the city's Waterfront Plaza. All of this is "not only cultural development, but community engagement and urban development", Manton says, adding: "I feel like this very much fits into how the arts can be utilised for the greater good."

From San Francisco, you can get to the island by car, bike or a <u>quick ferry trip</u>, which makes this an easy day trip.
