
Resolution urging the City Administrator's Office to conduct a Local Business Enterprises (LBE) disparity study to analyze disparities in the City and County of San Francisco's contracting to women-owned, minority-owned, and disabled Veteran-owned businesses.

How are disparity studies usually conducted?

3

- In its simplest form, a disparity study is an analysis of business utilization vs. business availability. Understanding the gap between utilization and availability helps identify whether a disparity exists.
- There are consultants who **specialize** in **conducting disparity studies**. These consultants typically have a tested methodology and approach.
- Disparity studies often involve multiple components and phases.

An example of major phases of a disparity study and the types of questions addressed in each:



What types of recommendations typically come out of a disparity study?

- The recommendations will range in specificity particularly if a study produces recommendations on numerical targets, such as how large a bid discount should be or the percentage of contracts that could be targeted for certain groups.
- Typical recommendations might include:
 - Review and improve process for unbundling larger contracts
 - Staffing and resourcing recommendations, including resourcing of enforcement mechanisms
 - o Price preferences, bid discounts
 - Evaluation point preferences
 - Networking and mentorship programs
 - Engagement/outreach expansion, increased partnerships with local trade and business organizations
 - Expanding the pool of certified contractors
 - o Technological recommendations, including online bid platforms and process automation

- Changes to evaluation scoring systems
- Requiring certain types of communications between primes and subs
- o Broadly offering debrief sessions
- Expedited payments
- Developing program manuals
- Increasing set asides
- o Regular, periodic disparity studies
- Bonding assistance
- Capacity building
- o Changes in contracting thresholds

- Many jurisdictions have commissioned disparity studies. This includes cities, states, and special districts like airports or ports or individual departments within a larger jurisdiction.
- Below is an incomplete list of jurisdictions that have conducted a disparity study at some point in time.

How long does it take to conduct a disparity study and what is the cost?

- Disparity studies typically take 1 3 years to complete, though the exact duration of a disparity study depends on its scope. Note: A publication from the Government Alliance on Racial Equity suggests, "[a] disparity study has about a five-year shelf life."
- The cost of disparity studies varies, and jurisdictions usually issue a competitive solicitation to identify a firm. A jurisdiction should probably be ready to budget at least \$400,000 for a comprehensive study.

- 1. The City Administrator's Office (CAO) would work with policymakers to define the study's scope.
- 2. The CAO would need to **conduct a solicitation process** to procure a consultant to conduct the analysis and issue the report.
- 3. The **CAO** can manage the firm and serve as the single point of contact for the City for the consultant, departments, and participating LBEs.
- 4. In order to conduct the study, the City's procurement office and any departments with relevant data will have to share contracting data with the firm conducting the study.
- 5. Depending on the quality of data, City staff will likely need to work with the firm to **clean and validate data**.
- 6. Departments may also need to support in **vendor/contractor outreach** efforts and in qualitative analyses.
- 7. LBEs and local small businesses will be asked to participate in interviews and focus groups.
