HR360 serves clients from all racial and cultural backgrounds and from all economic classes, although the majority of clients are indigent.</p> <p>The target population served by HR360 Acceptance Place Adult Residential is gay or bisexual men with (poly)substance use disorders (SUD) who live in San Francisco. Their primary drugs of abuse are heroin, crack, alcohol, cocaine, amphetamines, and barbiturates. HR360 welcomes and serves clients from all racial and cultural backgrounds and from all economic classes, although the majority of clients are indigent.</p>

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### **Purpose of Agreement:**

HR360's Medical Detox Program (Withdrawal Management) provide integrated substance use disorder and mental health treatment in a safe, recovery-oriented environment. Each participant's treatment experience is unique, as services are assessment-driven, strength-based, and participant-centered.

HR360's Acceptance Place Residential Substance Use Treatment Disorder Programs provide integrated substance use disorder and mental health treatment in a safe environment tailored to serve gay and bisexual men who are recovering from chemical dependency. Each participant's treatment experience is unique, as services are assessment-driven, strength-based, and participant-centered.

HR360 is well established within the San Francisco community, the criminal justice system, homeless shelters, medical providers, and other substance use treatment programs.

### **Monitoring Report/Program Review & Follow-up:**

This Agreement will receive annual monitoring through the DPH Business Office of Contract Compliance (BOCC), including for performance and fiscal stability.

### **Health Equity and Inclusion Compliance:**

The Vendor will provide the necessary information to comply with the Department's Office of Health Equity (OHE) requirements and will work collaboratively to remove systemic and operational barriers that impede providing appropriate levels of services to meet the needs of disadvantaged BIPOC stakeholders and communities.

### **Sole Source:**

The Agreement is authorized under the San Francisco Administrative Code Section 21.42. These are two existing programs that were transitioned from Baker Places to HR360 and this allowed the Department to pivot quickly to a new provider without any service disruption.
