9 WHEREAS, The Administrative Code requires City departments to obtain Board
10 of Supervisors' approval to accept or expend any grant funds; and

11 WHEREAS, The Board of Supervisors provided in the administrative provisions
12 of the Fiscal Year (FY) 2022-2023 Annual Appropriation Ordinance that approval of
13 recurring grant funds contained in departmental budget submissions and approved in
14 the FY2022-2023 budget are deemed to meet the requirements of the Administrative
15 Code regarding grant approvals; and

16 WHEREAS, The California Governor's Office of Emergency Services that
17 provides grant funds to the Police Department requires documentation of the Board's
18 approval of their specific grant funds (Paul Coverdell Forensic Science Improvement
19 Program Grant); and

20 WHEREAS, The Police Department (SFPD) applied for funding from the
21 California Governor's Office of Emergency Services (Cal OES) for the Criminology
22 Laboratory; and

23 WHEREAS, On June 7, 2023, the California Governor's Office of Emergency
24 Services (Cal OES) approved SFPD's application in the amount of \$70,549 to pay for

1 training and procure equipment for the Criminology Laboratory for the project period
2 beginning on April 1, 2023, through June 30, 2024; and

3 WHEREAS, The adopted budget for FY2022-2023 is \$69,818; and

4 WHEREAS, The grant does not require an Annual Salary Ordinance
5 Amendment; and

6 WHEREAS, The SFPD proposes to maximize use of available grant funds on
7 program expenditures by not including indirect costs in the grant budget; now, therefore,
8 be it

9 RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors retroactively authorizes SFPD to
10 accept and expend the grant of \$70,549 from the California Governor's Office of
11 Emergency Services (Cal OES); and, be it

12 FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors hereby waives inclusion
13 of indirect costs in the grant budget; and, be it

14 FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors authorizes the Chief of
15 Police, or his designee, to enter into the agreement on behalf of the City and County of
16 San Francisco, as well as execute extensions and amendments for this grant.





2) Employment eligibility confirmation with E-Verify

26. Limit on Use of Grant Funds for Grantees' Employees' Salaries

With respect to this award, federal funds may not be used to pay cash compensation (salary plus bonuses) to any employee of the award recipient at a rate that exceeds 110% of the maximum annual salary payable to a member of the federal government's Senior Executive Service (SES) at an agency with a Certified SES Performance Appraisal System for that year. (An award recipient may compensate an employee at a higher rate, provided the amount in excess of this compensation limitation is paid with non-federal funds.)

Points of view or opinions in this document are those of the author and do not necessarily represent the official position or policies of the U.S. Department of Justice."

29. Press Releases

Subrecipients (and any Second-Tier Subrecipients) shall transmit to the Cal OES Program Specialist copies of all official award-related press releases at least fifteen working days prior to public release. Advance notice permits time for coordination of release of information by Cal OES where appropriate and to respond to press or public inquiries.

30. Copyright; Data rights

Subrecipients (and any Second-Tier Subrecipients) acknowledge that OJP reserves a royalty-free, non-exclusive, and irrevocable license to reproduce, publish, or otherwise use, and authorize others to use (in whole or in part, including in connection with derivative works), for Federal purposes: (1) any work subject to copyright developed under a Subaward; and (2) any rights of copyright to which a Subrecipient (at any Second-Tier Subrecipient) purchases ownership with Federal support.

Subrecipients (and any Second-Tier Subrecipients) acknowledge that OJP has the right to (1) obtain, reproduce, publish, or otherwise use the data first produced under a Subaward; and (2) authorize others to receive, reproduce, publish, or otherwise use such data for Federal purposes. "Data" includes data as defined in Federal Acquisition Regulation (FAR) provision 52.227-14 (Rights in Data - General).

It is the responsibility of the Subrecipient (and any Second-Tier Subrecipient) to ensure that the provisions of this condition are included in any Subaward under this Subaward.

Subrecipients (and any Second-Tier Subrecipients) shall ensure that requirements associated with 34 U.S.C. section 10562(4) (which relate to processes in place to conduct independent external investigations into allegations of serious negligence or misconduct by employees or contractors) are satisfied with respect to any forensic laboratory system, medical examiner's office, coroner's office, law enforcement storage facility, or medical facility in the State that will receive a portion of the grant amount.

b. Accreditation

Subrecipients (and any Second-Tier Subrecipients) shall ensure that any forensic laboratory or forensic laboratory system (not including any medical examiner's office or coroner's office) that will receive any portion of the award either is accredited, or will use a portion of this award to prepare and apply for accreditation by not more than two years from the award date of this award.

Additionally, with respect to accreditation, the Subrecipient (and any Second-Tier Subrecipient) shall ensure that for any Subaward it makes under this award, it will require in a legally-binding and enforceable writing, such as the Subaward documentation (for example, Subaward terms and conditions), that its Subrecipient: (1) if accredited, must continue to demonstrate such accreditation as a condition of receiving or using the Subaward funds; or (2) if not accredited, must use the Subaward funds to prepare and apply for accreditation.

32. Use of Funds; No Research

Funds provided under this Subaward shall be used only for the purposes and types of expenses set forth in the Request for Application. Funds shall not be used for general law enforcement functions or non-forensic investigatory functions, and shall not be used for research or statistical projects or activities. Use of Subaward funds for construction of new facilities is restricted by statute. Any questions concerning this provision should be directed to the Cal OES Program Specialist prior to incurring the expense or commencing the activity in question.

To ensure compliance with the Government Performance and Results Act (Pub. L. No. 103-62) and the GPRA Modernization Act of 2010 (Pub. L. No. 111-352), program performance under this Subaward is measured by the following: (1) percent reduction in the average number of days from the submission of a sample to a forensic science laboratory to the delivery of test results to a requesting office or agency (calculated by reporting the average number of days to process a sample at the beginning of the grant period versus the average number of days to process a sample at the end of the grant period); (2) percent reduction in the number of backlogged forensic cases (calculated by reporting the number of backlogged forensic cases at the beginning of the grant period versus the number of backlogged forensic cases at the end of grant period), if applicable to the Subaward; and (3) the number of forensic science or medical examiner/coroner's office personnel who completed appropriate training or educational opportunities with these Coverdell funds, if applicable to the Subaward. Subrecipients (and any Second-Tier Subrecipients) are required to collect and report data relevant to these measures.

33. Forensic Science or Medical Examiner Services Fees

Subrecipients (and any Second-Tier Subrecipients) understand and agree that, throughout the Subaward period, it must promptly notify Cal OES if it either starts or stops charging fees for forensic science or medical examiner services, or if it revises its method of allocating fees received for such services to program income. The San Francisco Police Department Crime Lab has a backlog in Firearm and toolmark cases and is working to reestablish controlled substances testing that will be addressed using Coverdell grant funds.

Nineteen thousand eight hundred and eight dollars (\$19,808) will be spent on continuing education and training for AFTE meeting, California Criminalistics Institute (CCI) training, and California Association of Criminalists (CAC) meeting in the areas of general criminalistics, trace and impression evidence analysis, distance determination and serial number restorations, instrumental analysis and interpretation.

Twenty-one thousand nine hundred and sixty dollars (\$21,960) will be spent on the purchase of six (6) windows tablets with keyboard and docking station for the photo and electronic note documentation of firearms and gunshot residue evidence and examinations.

One thousand five hundred and sixty dollars (\$1,560) will be spent toward the purchase of six (6) Windows docking stations to accompany the windows tablets for network connectivity and lab domain usage.

Coverdell grant funds will be utilized for five purposes:

- 1) Continuing education and training for staff to meet accreditation requirements.
- 2) Purchase of 6 windows tablets for the digital capture and note taking for Firearms and Gun Shot Residue examinations.
- 3) Purchase of 3 microscope cameras for the documentation of the analysis of firearms casework.
- 4) Purchase of 6 windows docking stations to accompany the 6 Windows tablets for network connectivity and lab domain usage.
- 5) Purchase of 1 Gun Shot Residue Calibration Standard.

The SFPD Crime Lab offers forensic services in Firearm and toolmark identification, Gun Shot Residue Analysis, DNA and Kinship Analysis, Forensic Breath Alcohol Analysis and in the process of resuming Controlled Substances Analysis. Coverdell funds will be used to support staff by providing funding for continuing education opportunities in the disciplines in which the laboratory provides services. The Association of Firearm and Toolmark Examiners (AFTE), the California Criminalistics Institute (CCI), and the California Association of Criminalists (CAC) provide discipline specific training in which attendance at these meetings and trainings

will ensure continuing education requirements for accreditation are met in all disciplines.

Prior to firearms examination and NIBIN entry of cartridge casings, all received casings to the laboratory are sampled for trace DNA. The firearms section of the crime lab is responsible for the technical review of the notes and work product generated during this process. This procedure requires the photo and electronic note documentation of these tasks as they are essential to the workflow process of evidence going into the firearms section. Coverdell funds will be used to purchase Windows tablets equipped with keyboards and docking stations to provide a seamless transition of electronic documentation of the evidence from this process to the Firearms Examination Section.

The GSR section of the SFPD Crime Lab operates with a paperless workflow in which all notes are captured digitally. Coverdell funds will be used toward the purchase of windows tablets for this section to be used as a single source device that is capable of both photographing evidence and recording case notes, eliminating the necessity and time required when using a standalone camera and desktop workstation computer.

The comparative analysis required in the firearm and toolmark section is highly dependent on the use of comparison microscopes equipped with photo

documentation capabilities. The unit needs replacement cameras for this purpose, as their current cameras are at the end of their life. Coverdell funds will be used to purchase this needed equipment to allow for continued casework and analysis in this section.

The GSR Section evaluates evidence for trace particles found in gunshot residue. Specialized equipment is used for this purpose. Coverdell funds will be used to purchase a GSR Calibration standard that will be used to perform quality control checks for the Laboratory's SEM/EDX instruments to ensure they are functioning properly while performing automated analysis of GSR casework samples.

Additionally, this standard will be used for method validation/verification projects if needed due to parameter adjustments in the future.



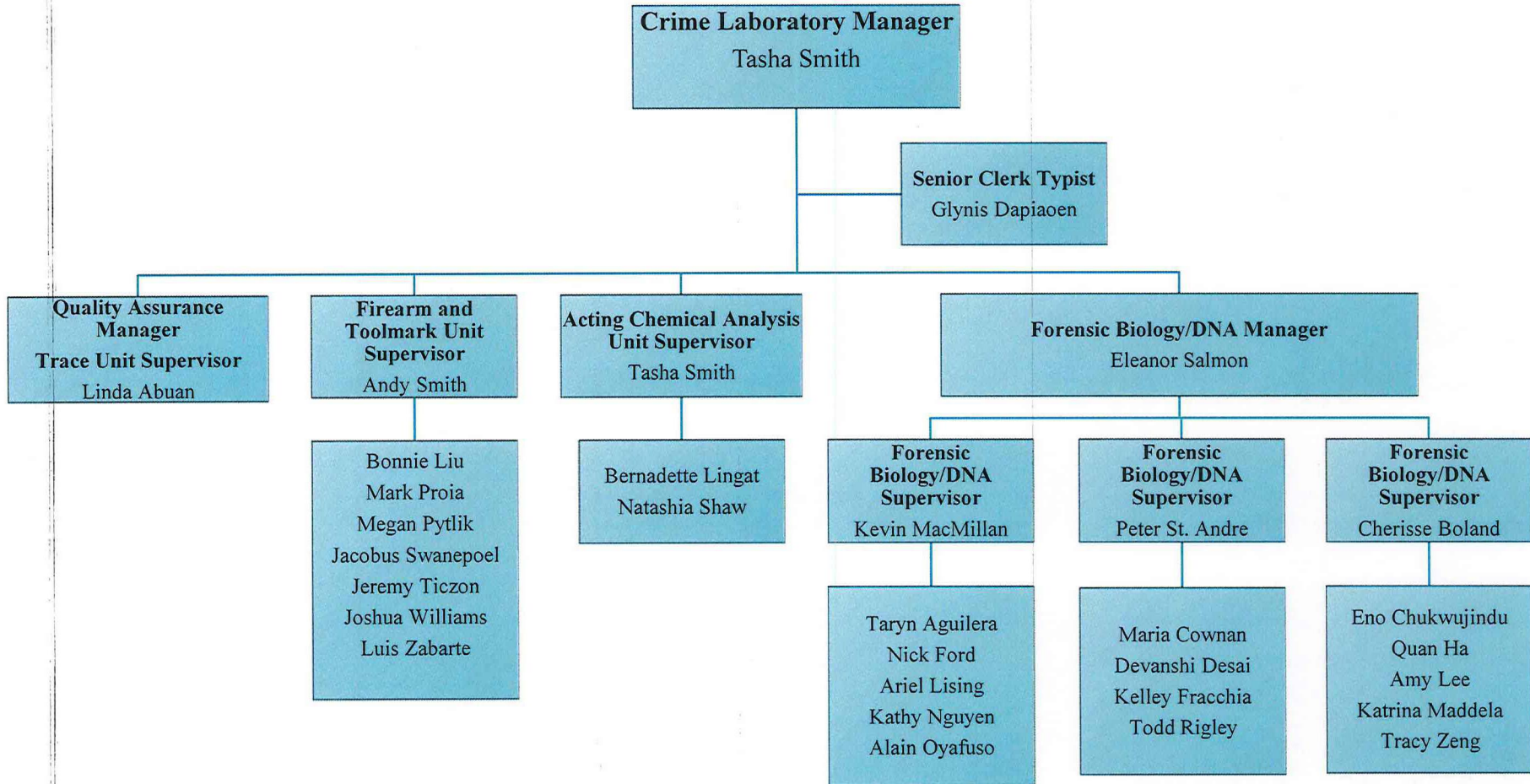

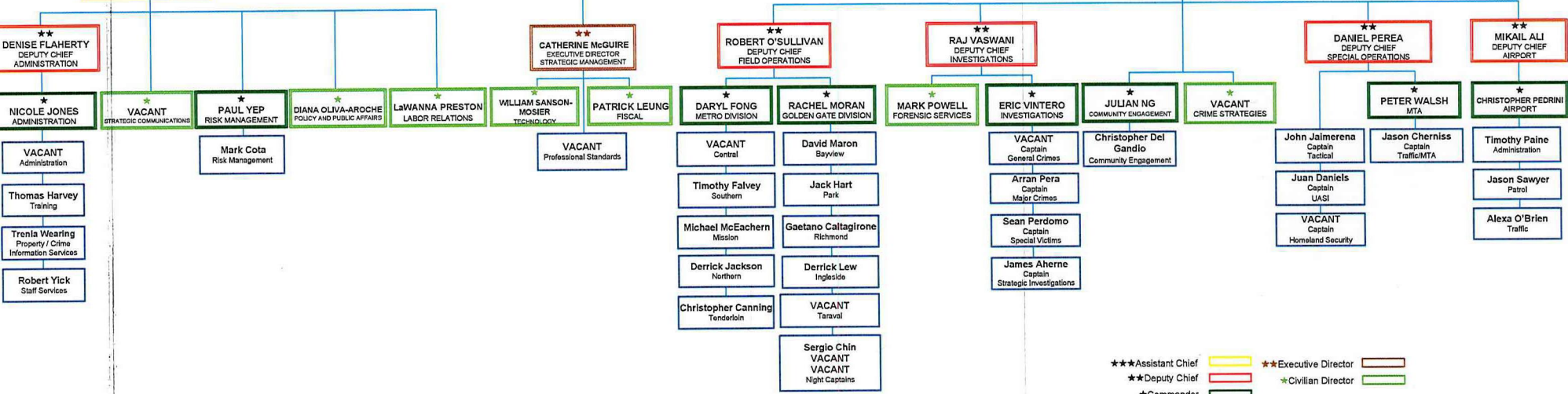
