REYNOLDS'S POLITICAL MAP OF THE UNITED STATES.

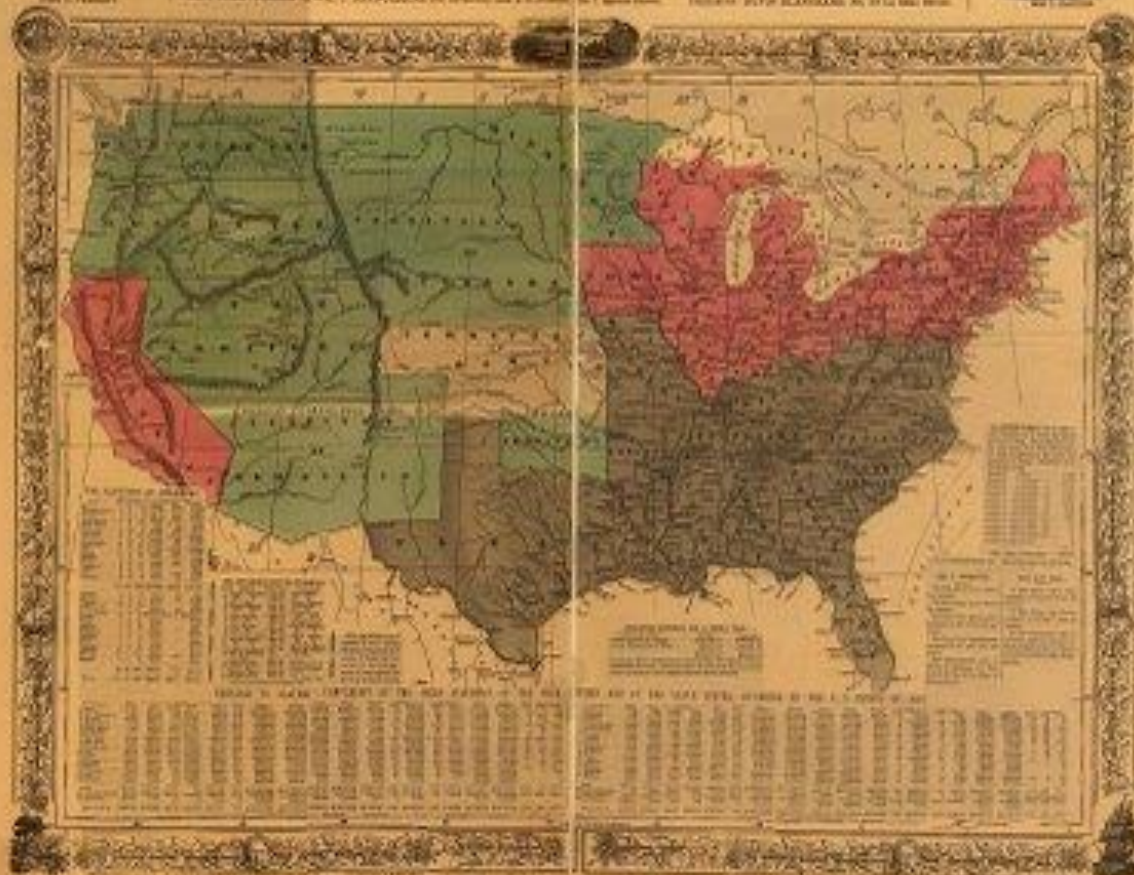

I make this great sacrifice in the value of the property, to satisfy myself whether they prefer paying a small sum to release him, or play their old game, and try to steal him. If not redeemed, the sale will take place in front of the Southern House, 57 J street, at 10 o'clock of said day.

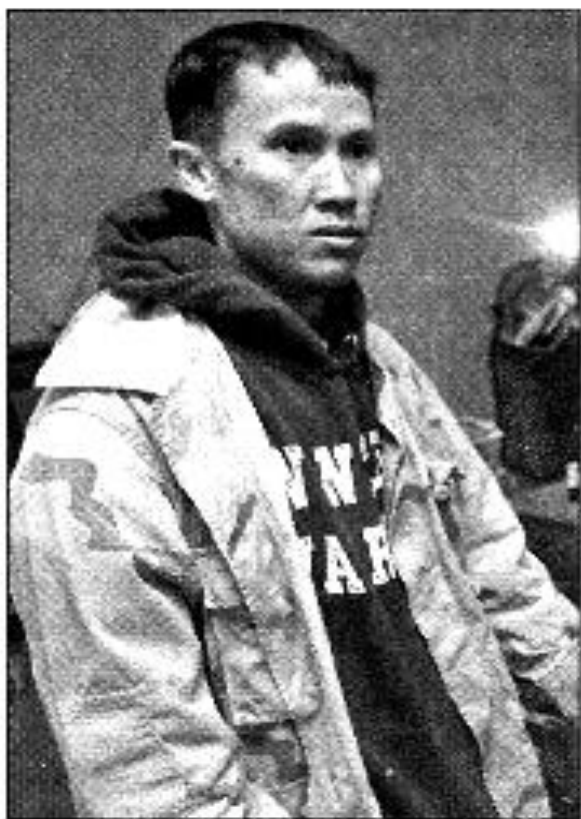

YOKI LEE, being first duly sworn, deposes and says: I reside in the City of Sonoma, State of California, and am of the age of 36 years. That I am a native of the State of California, having been born in San Francisco, California. That I am about five feet tall and weigh about 110 pounds. That I have a scar on my face on the right side of the nose near the right eye and also a large scar on the right side of the mouth, also a small raised scar at the base of the index finger of the right hand and a small scar on the right hand about an inch below the wrist at the base of the thumb. That the annexed photograph is a photograph of myself taken by William Harrington, Photographer, at Sonoma, California, in January, 1910.

That this affidavit with the annexed photograph is made for the purpose of identifying me in case I should be kidnapped or in case any criminal charge should be brought against me and by reason of the fact that my husband, Charlie Jones, is now in jail charged with a criminal offense and I fear that his enemies may try to do away with me either by bringing some fictitious charge against me or by kidnapping and imprisoning me. The annexed signature is my name written in English and also in Chinese.

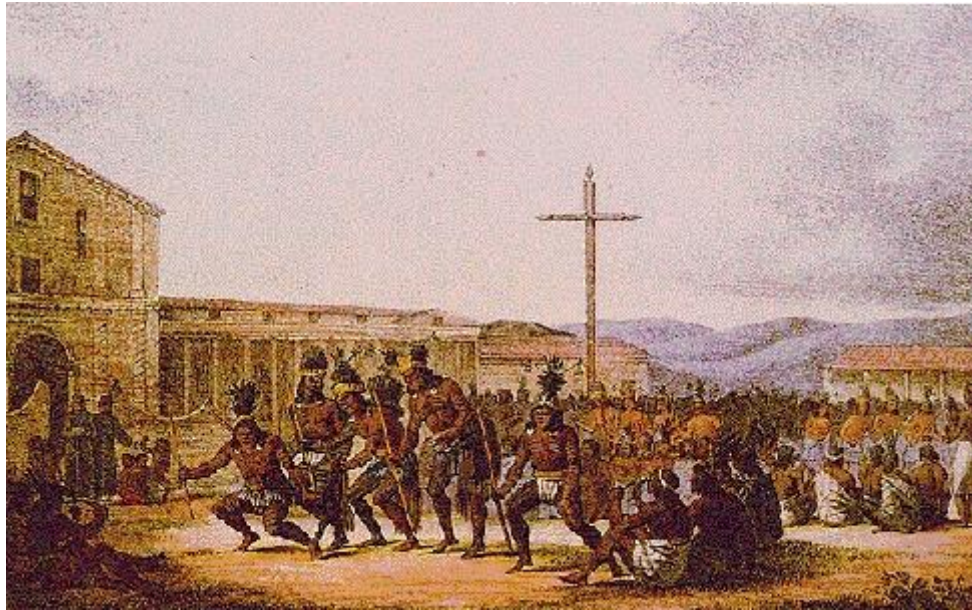

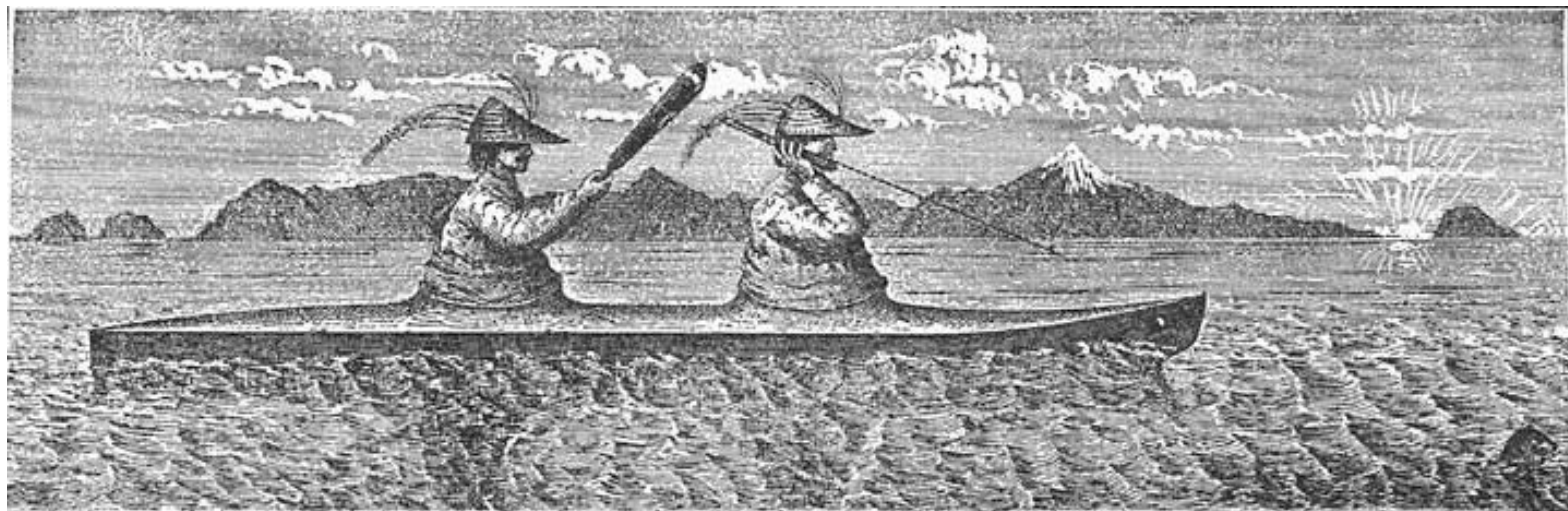

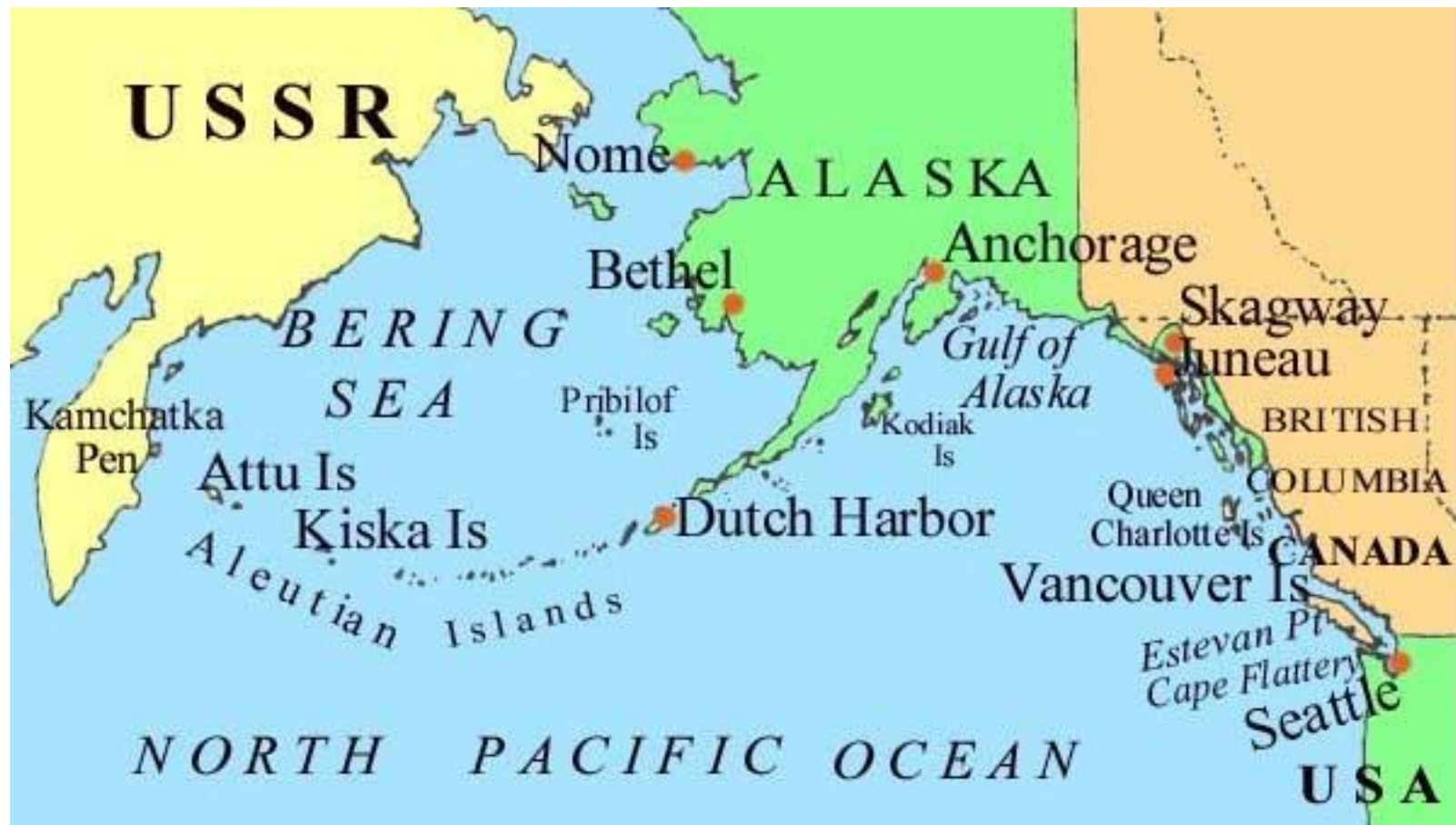
