- It's not my "opinion" whether I was awake last night when I'm usually asleep. Reckless driving is a crime. Speeding kills over 12,000 people per year, which is 30% of automobile deaths. While it may be a part of Bay Area culture, it does not logically follow that it is a *good* part of Bay Area culture. The argument that "culture" excuses bad behavior is poppycock. I do not know if you have a daughter, but let's assume you do. Would you send her to Afghanistan, Egypt, or Sudan for a semester aboard? In those places, the culture would have her wear a burqa, stay silent in public, and have her genitals mutilated at birth. "It's the culture" does not excuse bad behavior.

# Some articles for you:

<u>Every person killed by SFPD since 2000</u> (this was published in 2022, there's more from 2023)

- I have personally analyzed that list before. At least half of those people were armed **and** attacking or about to attack an officer or someone else. I do not think anyone should be killed, but sometimes officers need to act to defend themselves or others. Why don't you check this out instead? A much, much longer list of every homicide and cold case in San Francisco in the same time frame, 99% of which were committed by regular people. You are thousands of times more likely to be killed by someone you know than a police officer.

# Police are not primary crime fighters

- I'm not claiming they are. But one thing they are *great* at is dissuading bad behavior (see next item).

## Adding a new police officer to a city prevents between 0.06 and 0.1 homicides

- I didn't know that. By that logic, we should add as many officers as we can and save as many lives as possible. Oh, and we are not talking about homicides, we are talking about public disorder. Have you ever hit your brakes when driving past a police cruiser on the highway? Congratulations, you understand that police deter bad behavior.

Funding for social programs have been cut for years, while the SFPD budget increased by \$63 million just for 2023, totaling to \$787.9 million. Have you seen a positive change in our neighborhood as a direct result of this funding? I haven't. As you said, it's only gotten worse.

- I have seen positive change in the policing of the neighborhood. The police are responding faster, and Captain Harvey has done a good job. But we still lack enough officers. GrowSF said it well: "As of July 2023, San Francisco only has about 1,500 police officers for a city of over 800,000 people, or about 187 officers per 100k. Meanwhile, the European Uninon average is about 330 officers per 100k. To meet the European Union average, San Francisco would need to hire 1,000 more officers, bumping our staffing from 1,500 to about 2,500 officers.

Nobody thinks the European Union is over-policed. Instead, they have an adequate number of police to ensure no officers are over-worked and they put their officers through rigorous training. We should copy this model. Well rested, well trained, and well paid officers will do their jobs better and be less likely to make mistakes."

So while we are hundreds of officers short, every informed tax payer in SF knows we are over-budgeted for social services. So much we can't even spend it all. The homeless budget in recent years has been as high as \$1.1 billion. Homelessness has gotten worse and worse every year. Remember Prop C and how all that extra money was supposed to solve the problem? Even Prop C's biggest supporter (Marc Benioff) has just announced he

is considering taking his annual conference out of SF due to homelessness and crime issues. For these social programs, it will never be enough. We need to make sure people can get services in extreme situations, then help them transition off. And pair these programs with stronger enforcement of the law. Carrot and stick. That's the ethical way to solve the actual problem instead of creating mass dependency. I promise you, there is no limit to the number of social services that can be provided. People are waking up to this fact and realizing they aren't willing to be bled dry for virtue-signaling programs which do nothing to address the problems.

San Francisco will continue to decline without more common-sense governance. A few thoughts on the problems:

- Originally well-meaning "live and let live" attitude which has been perverted into a culture of lawlessness, where so-called "compassion" is the only virtue and all other virtues (there are many) are sidelined
- Fetishization of victimhood, where only so-called "oppressed peoples" are deserving of having their needs met, everyone else is guilted into silence
- Wimpy politicians who are so afraid of saying the wrong thing they become utterly useless the moment they are elected
- Zero viewpoint diversity on the Police Commission leading to hamstrung enforcement of the law (this is the fault of both the Board of Supervisors and Mayor Breed, both of whom appoint Police Commissioners) - this is why Governor Newsom has had to call in other departments to assist with the drug crisis in SF

Hi Neighbors- I removed the elected and city officials from the chain in order to send my response as I do not want to mix my campaign for D9 Supervisors with official emails.

I wanted to reply with my specific policy plans for these issues, which will be put up on my <u>website</u> when it is updated later this month.

First and foremost, I am the only candidate to support a fully staffed police department who also hasn't previously called for defunding. We need a responsive, accountable, and fully staffed SFPD. I am also the only candidate who supports arresting fentanyl dealers. With crimes in D9 17% less likely to end in arrest or citation than in neighboring D8 despite sharing the same Mission SFPD station, City Hall's status quo is failing us and endangering us. We also need the SFPD to follow up on evidence provided to them, I have heard too many stories, especially from small business owners, who provide clear video evidence along with where the perpetrators can be found, only to be turned away, so they have stopped calling police altogether.

### My Plan for Encampments:

Support the City Attorney's effort to allow the City to move those unwilling to accept shelter and services. Better coordinate DPW staff to have regular, consistent, and responsive street and sidewalk cleaning. Enforce sanitation and fire code violations in tents to prevent disease and disaster.

Reestablish and enforce pre-COVID RV parking limits to ensure residential vehicles are operable and allow effective street cleaning.

### My Plan for Addiction and Mental Health:

Redefine the success of city and nonprofit addiction services to be based on the number of people moved off the streets and into addiction treatment rather than solely on harm reduction standards.

Fully implement Governor Newsom's CARE Courts in San Francisco.

Update conservatorship laws to protect those who are a danger to themselves and others.

End public drug markets and arrest and arrest fentanyl dealers.

### My Plan for Graffiti:

Enforce graffiti and tagging laws and fully staff the graffiti team at SFPD.

Increase DPW staffing of the graffiti abatement program.

Implement community service for first time graffiti and vandalism offenders as an opportunity for restorative justice with increases in accountability for each future offense.

Only fine the owners of vacant storefronts for blight and graffiti – not small business owners.

### My Plan for Illegal Vending

Individuals found selling commercial merchandise without proof of purchase will have their items confiscated and donated to a navigation center or homeless shelter.

First-time offenders will immediately gain access to job training programs through the Office of Economic and Workforce Development, enabling them to secure legal employment that provides a living wage.

Repeat offenders who refuse offers of job training and legal employment will face escalated levels of enforcement, including fines, continued confiscation of goods, and possible charges if items can be proven as stolen.

I am writing to you on behalf of our building (26 units at 2412 Harrison Street), neighbors and our neighborhood with regard to daily/nightly activities on the block of Harrison Street between 20th & 21st in and around the Mission Recreation Center.

Today marks three (3) weeks after the shooting of Damien Gonzalez and each day/night since that event our neighborhood has been subject to endless noise, large crowds and as of last night dangerous acts. On the night of 08.31.23 three (3) sideshows took place on Harrison Street.

You can pull Police and 911 call logs to understand the level of frustration taking place in our neighborhood. Local Police have a good sense of how bad conditions have become as they needed to break up what was quickly developing into a dangerous event on 08.26.23 (an evening the city granted closure of Harrison for a memorial).

These are not peaceful memorials to a fallen friend. These are parties fraught with bad actors, drugs, alcohol, loud music and fireworks. The Police are using a lower level of enforcement with these

individuals than would be used with a normal resident of San Francisco;

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- Loud music after hours should be suspended (Police have done this at parties taking place on Treat Street behind the Mission Recreation Center (again check call logs for the past 2+ years)
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- Individuals leaving the scene in cars are clearly under the influence of alcohol and/or narcotics yet are not being stopped and arrested

The situation is escalating not de-escalating. It's simply a matter of time before someone is injured or worse. Last night I personally witnessed close to two (2) automobile accidents due to the sideshows.

Simple solutions are available;

- Station an occupied Police car at the scene (eventually it will no longer be "the place" to hangout and party)
- Respond quickly to calls and enforce the law
- Remove the memorial in front of the Mission Recreation Center
- Enforce the law

Patience has run out for our neighborhood. This is becoming news worthy and I'm sure the press will be interested in covering these daily/nightly events given the light in which our city is painted around the world. Now is the time to step in and stop the situation from further escalation.

You can pull Police and 911 call logs to understand the level of frustration taking place in our neighborhood. Local Police have a good sense of how bad conditions have become as they needed to break up what was quickly developing into a dangerous event on 08.26.23 (an evening the city granted closure of Harrison for a memorial).

These are not peaceful memorials to a fallen friend. These are parties fraught with bad actors, drugs, alcohol, loud music and fireworks. The Police are using a lower level of enforcement with these individuals than would be used with a normal resident of San Francisco;

- Double parked cars could be ticketed
- Loud music after hours should be suspended (Police have done this at parties taking place on Treat Street behind the Mission Recreation Center (again check call logs for the past 2+ years)
- Cars illegally parked in Mission Recreation Center drives could be ticketed and/or towed if the driver is under the influence
- Individuals leaving the scene in cars are clearly under the influence of alcohol and/or narcotics yet are not being stopped and arrested

The situation is escalating not de-escalating. It's simply a matter of time before someone is injured or worse. Last night I personally witnessed close to two (2) automobile accidents due to the sideshows.

Simple solutions are available;

- Station an occupied Police car at the scene (eventually it will no longer be "the place" to hangout and party)
- Respond quickly to calls and enforce the law
- Remove the memorial in front of the Mission Recreation Center
- Enforce the law

Today marks three (3) weeks after the shooting of Damien Gonzalez and each day/night since that event our neighborhood has been subject to endless noise, large crowds and as of last night dangerous acts. On the night of 08.31.23 three (3) sideshows took place on Harrison Street.

You can pull Police and 911 call logs to understand the level of frustration taking place in our neighborhood. Local Police have a good sense of how bad conditions have become as they needed to break up what was quickly developing into a dangerous

event on 08.26.23 (an evening the city granted closure of Harrison for a memorial).

These are not peaceful memorials to a fallen friend. These are parties fraught with bad actors, drugs, alcohol, loud music and fireworks. The Police are using a lower level of enforcement with these individuals than would be used with a normal resident of San Francisco;

- · Double parked cars could be ticketed
- Loud music after hours should be suspended (Police have done this at parties taking place on Treat Street behind the Mission Recreation Center (again check call logs for the past 2+ years)
- Cars illegally parked in Mission Recreation Center drives could be ticketed and/or towed if the driver is under the influence
- Individuals leaving the scene in cars are clearly under the influence of alcohol and/or narcotics yet are not being stopped and arrested

The situation is escalating not de-escalating. It's simply a matter of time before someone is injured or worse. Last night I personally witnessed close to two (2) automobile accidents due to the sideshows.

Simple solutions are available;

- Station an occupied Police car at the scene (eventually it will no longer be "the place" to hangout and party)
- Respond quickly to calls and enforce the law
- Remove the memorial in front of the Mission Recreation Center
- Enforce the law

Patience has run out for our neighborhood. This is becoming news worthy and I'm sure the press will be interested in covering these daily/nightly events given the light in which our city is painted around the world. Now is the time to step in and stop the situation from further escalation.

In closing, we support our Police Department. This is not a reflection of the officers. This is a direction reflection on our elected leaders and their politics.

- I have seen positive change in the policing of the neighborhood. The police are responding faster, and Captain Harvey has done a good job. But we still lack enough officers. GrowSF said it well: "As of July 2023, San Francisco only has about 1,500 police officers for a city of over 800,000 people, or about 187 officers per 100k. Meanwhile, the European Uninon average is about 330 officers per 100k. To meet the European Union average, San Francisco would need to hire 1,000 more officers, bumping our staffing from 1,500 to about 2,500 officers.

Nobody thinks the European Union is over-policed. Instead, they have an adequate number of police to ensure no officers are over-worked and they put their officers through rigorous training. We should copy this model. Well rested, well trained, and well paid officers will do their jobs better and be less likely to make mistakes."

So while we are hundreds of officers short, every informed tax payer in SF knows we are over-budgeted for social services. So much we can't even spend it all. The homeless budget in recent years has been as high as \$1.1 billion. Homelessness has gotten worse and worse every year. Remember Prop C and how all that extra money was supposed to solve the problem? Even Prop C's biggest supporter (Marc Benioff) has just announced he is considering taking his annual conference out of SF due to homelessness and crime issues. For these social programs, it will never be enough. We need to make sure people can get services in extreme situations, then help them transition off. And pair these programs with stronger enforcement of the law. Carrot and stick. That's the ethical way to solve the actual problem instead of creating mass dependency. I promise you, there is no limit to the number of social services that can be provided. People are waking up to this fact and realizing they aren't willing to be bled dry for virtue-signaling programs which do nothing to address the problems.



Additionally, sideshows might not be *your* culture, but in fact is a <u>long-standing culture</u> of the Bay Area at large, regardless of your opinion of how it's disturbing your sleep.

We all want to feel safe and comfortable in our neighborhood, but I highly disagree with the tactics of begging for increased police presence. There's plenty of data supporting this, as I shared above.

These are systemic issues that will not be solved overnight with street barricades or with increased surveillance. The only way to truly "solve" these issues is by actually helping people through social services: increasing minimum wage nationally, providing below market rate & affordable housing, safe consumption drug sites, etc.

I am not a politician, I am not here to figure this out for you, but I do suggest reading about these issues holistically to gain a broader perspective on how we came to be in this place rather than knee-jerk reactions for more cops.

My wife was sick and we were both unable to sleep. We both get up early for work. I am writing to you on behalf of our building (26 units at 2412 Harrison Street), neighbors and our neighborhood with regard to daily/nightly activities on the block of Harrison Street between 20th & 21st in and around the Mission Recreation Center.

Today marks three (3) weeks after the shooting of Damien Gonzalez and each day/night since that event our neighborhood has been subject to endless noise, large crowds and as of last night dangerous acts. On the night of 08.31.23 three (3) sideshows took place on Harrison Street.

You can pull Police and 911 call logs to understand the level of frustration taking place in our neighborhood. Local Police have a good sense of how bad conditions have become as they needed to break up what was quickly developing into a dangerous event on 08.26.23 (an evening the city granted closure of Harrison for a memorial).

These are not peaceful memorials to a fallen friend. These are parties fraught with bad actors, drugs, alcohol, loud music and fireworks. The Police are using a lower level of enforcement with these individuals than would be used with a normal resident of San Francisco;

- Double parked cars could be ticketed
- Loud music after hours should be suspended (Police have done this at parties taking place on Treat Street behind the Mission Recreation Center (again check call logs for the past 2+ years)
- Cars illegally parked in Mission Recreation Center drives could be ticketed and/or towed if the driver is under the influence

Individuals leaving the scene in cars are clearly under the influence of alcohol and/or narcotics yet are not being stopped and arrested

The situation is escalating not de-escalating. It's simply a matter of time before someone is injured or worse. Last night I personally witnessed close to two (2) automobile accidents due to the sideshows.

Simple solutions are available;

- Station an occupied Police car at the scene (eventually it will no longer be "the place" to hangout and party)
- Respond quickly to calls and enforce the law
- Remove the memorial in front of the Mission Recreation Center
- Enforce the law

Patience has run out for our neighborhood. This is becoming news worthy and I'm sure the press will be interested in covering these daily/nightly events given the light in which our city is painted around the world. Now is the time to step in and stop the situation from further escalation.

In closing, we support our Police Department. This is not a reflection of the officers. This is a direction reflection on our elected leaders and their politics.
