Program Area A: Union Square Market Hall

Maximum Budget Request: \$500,000 Anticipated # of Awards: 1

Total Funding: OEWD expects to allocate a total of \$500,000 to cover 12 months of services.

Target Neighborhoods: Union Square

Target Population(s): Small businesses, artists, nonprofits and entrepreneurs with limited resources and high barriers to capital.

- OEWD is seeking proposals from both nonprofit and for profit organizations to establish and
 operate a multi-vendor market hall in the Union Square area featuring local retailers, artists, food
 and beverage providers or other vendors based in San Francisco and the Bay Area.
- Eligible activities under this program may include: Lease negotiations; Architectural, design, legal
 and permitting costs; Selecting and negotiating leasing agreements with sub-tenant vendors;
 Community outreach and engagement; Marketing and promotional activities; and Ongoing
 operational costs for the space.
- Applicants must provide a **Letter of Intent (LOI)** signed by the applicant and the property owner confirming that the parties are in active negotiations to lease a property in the Union Square area for a period of **at least 3 years**.

Program Area B: Union Square Tenant Attraction

Maximum Budget Request: \$500,000 Anticipated # of Awards: 1

Total Funding: OEWD expects to allocate a total of \$500,000 to cover 12 months of services.

Target Neighborhoods: Union Square

Target Population(s): Residents, business, workers, and visitors to Union Square

- OEWD is seeking proposals from nonprofit and for profit organizations to lead a targeted tenant
 attraction campaign to identify 1-3 signature destination retail or food and beverage tenant(s)
 for a vacant ground floor retail space(s) in Union Square, specifically on Powell Street between
 Market and Post Streets for a lease term of at least 3 or more years.
- Eligible Activities under this program may include: **Tenant attraction**; **Brokerage**, **and lease negotiation services**; **Developing a panel for approval by the City to select final tenant(s)**; **Managing distribution of grant funds to selected tenant(s)**.
- Must have a minimum of **3 years of experience** providing brokerage, leasing or related services to retail or food and beverage tenants in San Francisco or other major global markets.



About Community Economic Development (CED)

The **Community Economic Development (CED) Division** is committed to advancing racial equity, diversity and inclusion in San Francisco's neighborhood commercial corridors and meeting the needs of local residents and users by strengthening small businesses, improving physical conditions, increasing quality of life, and building community capacity.

In pursuit of these objectives, CED offers programs that are designed to provide focused, customized assistance that meets the specific needs of San Francisco's neighborhood commercial corridors by leveraging existing programs from across multiple City departments and nonprofit partners. Program Area C: Castro cultural activation, targeting Queer and Transgender Asian American and Pacific Islander communities

Maximum Budget Request: \$30,000 Anticipated # of Awards: 1

Total Funding: OEWD expects to allocate total of \$30,000 for an award to cover 1 event.

Target Neighborhoods: Castro

Target Population(s): Castro merchant community.

- OEWD is seeking proposals from nonprofit organizations to coordinate and implement a cultural event in the Castro commercial corridor to celebrate communities such as Asian American and Pacific Islander queer and transgender community members and encourage visitor engagement.
- Funding in this area may support a **new or existing** neighborhood event.
- Proposed budgets should be no more than \$30,000 for one event, with a minimum attendance of 100 individuals.
- Applicants must have experience designing, coordinating, and implementing successful neighborhood events, and demonstrate experience working in the Castro neighborhood.



Program Area D: Excelsior Economic Vitality

Maximum Budget Request: \$350,000 Anticipated # of Awards: 1

Total Funding: OEWD expects to allocate a total of \$350,000 for 12 months of services.

Target Neighborhoods: Excelsior, Outer Mission

Target Population(s): Excelsior and Outer Mission small business owners.

- OEWD is seeking proposals from nonprofit organizations to support the Excelsior Outer Mission business community.
- Eligible activities may include: business outreach and engagement; marketing and producing cultural heritage events and activations; coordinating cleaning and beautification services within the Mission Street commercial corridor (Silver Avenue to Geneva Avenue); Developing and implementing mini-grant programs that support economic development goals and/or disbursing funds to small businesses.
- Must be Excelsior or Outer Mission-based community organization established for at least 5 years.



Program Area E: Civic and Cultural Event Honoring Jerry Garcia

Maximum Budget Request: \$60,000 Anticipated # of Awards: 1

Total Funding: OEWD expects to allocate a total of \$60,000 for 12 months of services.

Target Neighborhoods: Excelsior (event must occur at Jerry Garcia Amphitheater, located in John McLaren Park).

Target Population(s): San Francisco residents and visitor fan base of legendary rock group The Grateful Dead.

- OEWD is seeking proposals from nonprofit organizations to coordinate and implement a single civic and cultural event that amplifies and celebrates San Francisco and Excelsior District native Jerry Garcia.
- The goal of the event is to **encourage local merchant participation and support economic activity along the Excelsior commercial corridors** (Mission Street between Silver Avenue and Morse Street & Geneva Avenue between Athens Street and Gloria Court).
- No less than 80% of funds must support event costs.
- Applicant must have a minimum of five (5) years of experience producing a similar civic and cultural event with a specific and similar focus.

Program Area F: Japantown Public Safety Interventions

Maximum Budget Request: \$300,000 Anticipated # of Awards: 1 or more

Total Funding: OEWD expects to allocate a total of \$300,000 to cover 15 months of services.

Target Neighborhoods: Japantown

Target Population(s): Japantown residents and businesses, and tourists that visit Japantown.

- OEWD is seeking proposals from nonprofit organizations to implement small business and commercial corridor-specific safety interventions involving community partners to create an environment that feels safe, welcoming, active and vibrant in Japantown.
- Eligible Activities include: Community Ambassadorship; Partnerships, Coordination and Engagement; Business Outreach and Strengthening; Mini-Grant Programs; Economic Development Marketing and Activations; Public Safety Interventions to Improve Visitor and Resident Experience; Enhanced Cleaning of Sidewalks and Public Realm.



Program Area G: Capacity for Lower Fillmore Community Based Collaboration

Maximum Budget Request: \$40,000 Anticipated # of Awards: 1

Total Funding: OEWD expects to allocate a total of \$40,000 for 12 months of services.

Target Neighborhoods: Lower Fillmore

Target Population(s): Organizations, businesses and residents in the Lower Fillmore neighborhood.

- OEWD is seeking proposals from nonprofit organizations to support capacity building, coordination, and collaboration amongst community-based organizations, merchants and residents within Lower Fillmore to promote strategic partnerships and coordination to further and inform economic development strategies.
- Proposed projects should result in the development of a **one-year work plan** for the collaborative that outlines specific tasks, goals, and timelines.
- Proposed collaboratives must have a strong focus on furthering economic development in the Lower Fillmore, **must be established for a minimum of 3 years**, and must have a current strategic plan.

Program Area H: Lower Fillmore Young Adult Entrepreneur Leadership Program

Maximum Budget Request: \$50,000 Anticipated # of Awards: 1

Total Funding: OEWD expects to allocate a total of \$50,000 for 12 months of services.

Target Neighborhoods: Lower Fillmore

Target Population(s): Young Adults aged 16-30 in the Lower Fillmore neighborhood

- OEWD is seeking proposals from nonprofit organizations with an established program based in Lower Fillmore that engages young adults in leadership development activities that promote health and wellness and promote economic empowerment in learning the basics about entrepreneurship.
- Proposed programs should include an emphasis on young adult leadership development by building entrepreneurship skills in the industries of interest such as fashion design, interior design, graphic design and culinary arts.
- Proposed programs must have been established for a minimum of 3 years
- Competitive applicants will have experience developing and implementing youth programs in the Western Addition community.

Program Area I: Mission District Commercial Beautification Program for Storefronts

Maximum Budget Request: \$300,000 Anticipated # of Awards: 1

Total Funding: OEWD expects to allocate a total of \$300,000 for 12 months of services.

Target Neighborhoods: Mission District, with emphasis on the Mission Street commercial corridor.

Target Population(s): Property owners, merchants, local muralists, vacant ground floor commercial buildings.

- OEWD is seeking proposals from nonprofit organizations to manage a Mission District commercial beautification program for storefronts.
- The primary goal of this program is to beautify storefronts highly impacted by graffiti and vandalism, including vacant ground floor commercial store fronts that may be boarded up.
- Applicants must demonstrate the ability to partner with property owners and local Mission District
 artists, understand the Art Commission's process for installing murals, and have at least 5 years of
 experience, or partner with an organization that has at least 5 years of experience, providing
 services in the Mission District.



Program Area J: Mission District Ambassador Program

Maximum Budget Request: \$500,000 Anticipated # of Awards: up to 2

Total Funding: OEWD expects to allocate a total of \$500,000 for initial awards to cover 12 months of services.

Target Neighborhoods: Mission

Target Population(s): Residents, businesses and visitors in the Mission District.

- OEWD is seeking proposals from **nonprofit** organizations to manage a Mission District Community Ambassador Program.
- The initial targeted area of focus is Mission Street between 14th and Cesar Chavez, including alleys such as Lilac, Capp, Osage, and Clarion. Geographic cover may be expanded or adjusted based on neighborhood needs and available resources.
- Community Ambassadors **shall provide** a consistently **welcoming atmosphere for workers,** residents, and visitors to support the reopening of storefront businesses and spur economic activity.



Program Area K: North Beach Street Beautification

Maximum Budget Request: \$35,000

Anticipated # of Awards: 1

Total Funding: OEWD expects to allocate a total of \$35,000 for initial award to cover 12 months of services.

Target Neighborhoods: Applicants must be based in North Beach

Target Population(s): Residents, businesses, tourists, visitors, and small businesses and entrepreneurs in the North Beach neighborhood.

- OEWD is seeking proposals from nonprofit organizations to coordinate and implement programming and projects that address street cleanliness safety, to create an environment that feels safe, welcoming, active and vibrant in the North Beach community.
- Eligible activities under this program area may include: Neighborhood beautification and street trash pick-up in high pedestrian traffic commercial areas; Coordination and logistics of meetings, collection of data, writing and drafting of reports; Maintain updated public facing information including regarding program outcomes, and Engaging non-English speaking stakeholders.
- Applicant must be physically located in North Beach.



Program Area L: South of Market Area (SOMA) Enhanced Sidewalk Cleaning Implementation Plan

Maximum Budget Request: \$200,000 Anticipated # of Awards: 1 or more

Total Funding: OEWD expects to allocate a total of \$200,000 in initial awards for 12 months of services.

Target Neighborhoods: South of Market Area (SOMA), with emphasis on the blocks described below

Target Populations: Residents, businesses, and visitors in the SOMA neighborhood.

- OEWD is seeking proposals from Community Benefit Districts (CBDs) and nonprofit organizations
 that directly provide sidewalk cleaning services and/or have experience addressing health and
 safety-related quality of life issues.
- Services must be offered multiple days per week.
- For initial round of funding, services will be prioritized within the area bound by 5th Street and 6th Street on the east, Minna Street and Folsom Street on the north, South Van Ness Avenue and the U.S. Highway Freeway on the west, and Townsend Street on the south.



Program Area M: Sunset Outdoor Street Food Night Market Project

Maximum Budget Request: \$150,000 Anticipated # of Awards: Up to 3

Total Funding: OEWD expects to allocate a total of \$150,000 in initial awards to cover 12 months of services.

Target Neighborhoods: Sunset

Target Populations: District 4 Commercial Corridors, Sunset residents, businesses, and visitors.

- OEWD is seeking proposals from nonprofit and for-profit organizations to organize and facilitate a new outdoor food night market to celebrate Asian American and Pacific Islander (AAPI) cultural identity and connect visitors and residents to an unforgettable food experience.
- Proposals should include the production of a minimum of 2 events that may occur in different locations within District 4.
- Eligible Activities include: Logistical support for events and activations; Marketing and outreach activities, and Business Engagement in Activations. A mini-grant program may be proposed to fund several events.



Program Area N: Union Square BigBelly Maintenance

Maximum Budget Request: \$50,000

Anticipated # of Awards: 1

Total Funding: OEWD expects to allocate a total of \$50,000 for initial awards to cover 12 months of services.

Target Neighborhoods: Union Square

Target Populations: Residents, businesses, and visitors in the Union Square area.

- OEWD is seeking proposals from Community Benefit Districts (CBDs) and nonprofit organizations
 that currently utilize BigBelly trash receptacle units within the Union Square area.
- Eligible activities under this program area may include: Replacement of existing BigBelly units as needed due to malfunction and/or inability to maintain; Providing necessary cleaning and topping-off as-needed to existing BigBelly receptacles in the district
- Applicant must have an **established physical location in the Union Square** neighborhood of San Francisco.



Program Area O: Geary Arts Venue Marketing and Activations

Maximum Budget Request: \$150,000 Anticipated # of Awards: 1 or more

Total Funding: OEWD expects to allocate a total of \$150,000 for initial awards to cover 12 months of services.

Target Neighborhoods: Union Square, Lower Nob Hill

Target Populations: Residents, businesses, visitors and tourists.

- OEWD is seeking proposals from nonprofit and for-profit organizations to coordinate and implement activations and marketing efforts that amplify and center the cultural contributions of San Francisco's arts and entertainment venues on the Geary Street commercial corridor between Van Ness and Powell Streets, as well as other Lower Nob Hill commercial areas.
- The selected grantee must coordinate across multiple venues and small businesses for a curated experience that will encourage visitors and support economic activity within San Francisco commercial corridors.
- Applicant must have a minimum of three (3) years of experience providing similar services to small businesses and entrepreneurs.

Program Area P: Capacity for Community-Based Organization Collaboration, targeting the Latino Community

Maximum Budget Request: \$105,000 Anticipated # of Awards: 1 or more

Total Funding: OEWD expects to allocate a total of \$105,000 to cover services.

Target Neighborhoods: Citywide

Target Populations: The program shall be made available to nonprofit partners that serve all ethnicities and populations in San Francisco but target Latino-serving community-based organizations.

- OEWD is seeking proposals from nonprofit organizations to support capacity building, coordination and collaboration amongst community-based organizations across service areas that serve San Francisco residents and small businesses with limited resources and high barriers to economic opportunities.
- The intent of this program area is to support the facilitation of convenings, research, community
 engagement, administration and strategic planning across multiple agencies to highlight
 community challenges, opportunities and progress made as a collective to further the well-being
 of the communities in San Francisco, such as the Latino communities.
- Proposed collaboratives must be established for a minimum of 3 years



Program Area Q: Outreach, Engagement and Marketing Services for the Small Business Construction Mitigation Program

Maximum Budget Request: \$350,000 Anticipated # of Awards: 1 or more

Total Funding: OEWD expects to allocate a total of \$350,000 in initial awards to cover 12 months of services.

Target Neighborhoods: Citywide, with emphasis on neighborhoods impacted by moderate to major public construction projects

Target Population(s): Small businesses and merchant associations in construction impact zones with a planned or active moderate to major-impact construction projects.

- OEWD is seeking proposals from nonprofit and for-profit organizations to administer public outreach, engagement and marketing services for the Small Business Construction Mitigation Program.
- Applicants must have experience in: Neighborhood Marketing; Stakeholder engagement; brand creation, survey and brand development; Communications and public relations.
- Applicant must have a minimum of **three (3) years of experience** providing similar services to small businesses and merchant associations.

Program Area R: Skateboarding Retail Activations

Maximum Budget Request: \$150,000 Anticipated # of Awards: 1 or more

Total Funding: OEWD expects to allocate a total of \$150,000 for initial award to cover 12 months of services.

Target Neighborhoods: Citywide, with emphasis on the Mission, Tenderloin, Mid-Market, South of Market Area (SOMA).

Target Population(s): Small businesses, residents, visitors, and entrepreneurs.

- OEWD is seeking proposals from nonprofit and for-profit organizations to develop partnerships
 and collaborate with retailers that sell skateboards and related goods to activate spaces in a way
 that contributes to neighborhood vitality by strengthening small businesses, improving physical
 conditions, increasing quality of life, and building local community capacity.
- Eligible activities under this area include: **Event Coordination and Compliance**; **Entertainment Sourcing Logistical support for events and activations**; **Marketing and outreach activities**; **Business Engagement in Activations.**



Program Area S: Small Business Incubation Program Grants

Maximum Budget Request: \$500,000 Anticipated # of Awards: 1 or more

Total Funding: OEWD expects to allocate a total of \$500,000 for initial awards to cover 24 months of services.

Target Neighborhoods: Citywide

Target Populations: San Francisco small businesses that successfully complete a San Francisco business incubation program and intend to open a new storefront.

- OEWD is seeking proposals from **nonprofit** organizations to **establish and coordinate a minigrant program to support small business incubation activities**, including providing resources to program graduates to assist them with costs associated with **opening a new storefront**. Incubator programs must assess businesses and demonstrate that revenue projections will support opening a new storefront.
- Nonprofit organizations eligible to apply must have a minimum of 3 years remaining on their
 existing lease or own a physical facility for purposes of incubating entrepreneurs and small
 businesses.

Program Area T: Small Business Relief Grant Administration

Maximum Budget Request: \$1,108,862 Anticipated # of Awards: 1 or more

Total Funding: OEWD expects to allocate a total of \$1,108,862 to over 12 months of services.

Target Neighborhoods: Citywide

Target Populations: The program shall be made available to all ethnicities and populations in San Francisco but target low-to-moderate income small business owners who have been unable to access other COVID-19 recovery programs barriers such as limited proficiency in the English language, and lack of access to technical tools and training.

- OEWD is seeking proposals from nonprofit organizations to administer small business grant funds that support independently-owned and operated small businesses.
- The goal of the fund is to **provide immediate financial assistance and resources to small business owners** that have been identified by OEWD for stabilization support, who meet an established criteria identified by OEWD.
- Applicants must have at least three years of experience conducting similar programs and the financial capacity to cover fund disbursements totaling up to \$500,000 per month.

Program Area U: Small Business Grant Program for Accessible Barrier Removal

Maximum Budget Request: \$500,000 Anticipated # of Awards: 1 or more

Total Funding: OEWD expects to allocate a total of \$2.5M for initial awards, Applicants may propose \$500,000 to cover 12 months of service.

Target Neighborhoods: Citywide

Target Populations: Small Businesses improving the physical accessibility of their place of public accommodation.

- OEWD is seeking proposals from nonprofit and for-profit organizations to administer small business grant funds that support independently-owned and operated small businesses.
- The Office of Small Business (OSB) will determine program eligibility for the small businesses, and provide the selected grantee(s) with a list of approved grant recipients on a biweekly basis.
- As this is a cost-reimbursement grant, qualified applicants must have the financial capacity to
 cover fund disbursements totaling on average \$50,000 per month and disburse payments with
 either a physical check or digitally, through an Electronic Funds Transfer or similar system.







Search the Files of the Registry of Charitable Trusts

The Registry Search Tool allows you to query the Registry's database and verify whether a charitable organization or fundraiser has compiled with the Attorney General's registration and reporting requirements. You may also review and download records and public filings that a charitable organization or fundraiser has submitted to the Attorney General's Registry of Charitable trusts. This includes copies of annual registration renewal forms (Form RRF-1), IRS Forms 990, raffle reports and fundraising reports that are in the Registry's database. Information is retrieved from the database in real-time but data and statuses may change intrady as fillings are processed.

Potential donors are encouraged to research organizations using this query tool and those available from the Scretary of State, Franchise Tax Board and IRS to determine an organization's tax examples for more compliance status with all appropriate state and federal agencies. Each agency maintains their own database and independently determines the disposition of organizations relative to their statutory oversight. Each should be considered carefully and collectively to gain the most complete assessment possible. Donors may also beginned to reviewing our Resources and Donation Tips.



Note: On the organization details page, under Filings & Correspondence, if incorrect documents seem to open when you try to download or view them, try clearing your browser's cache and then also refreshing that page. The order of the documents may change, but those two steps should clear up most issues with the links.

WHAT IS THE FIRST SOURCE HIRING PROGRAM?

- The First Source Hiring Program was enacted into law in 1998 as Chapter 83 of the SF Administrative Code and amended in 2009
- Requires covered employers to make good faith efforts toward employing economically disadvantaged San Francisco residents for entry level positions on applicable projects
- The San Francisco Workforce Development system provides supply of qualified workers to employers with hiring needs, and gives economically disadvantaged individuals the opportunity to apply for entry-level jobs in San Francisco





WHAT IS THE FIRST SOURCE HIRING PROGRAM?

COVERED EMPLOYERS

- All businesses with City contracts for goods, services, grants or loans in excess of \$50,000 (or in excess of \$350,000 for construction contracts)
- Employers engaged in commercial activity in over 25,000 square feet space that involved new construction, an addition, or alteration after April 2001 and resulted in the expansion of entry level positions
- Businesses who have leases on City property





HOW DOES FIRST SOURCE HIRING WORK?

- First Source applies to entry level positions that require less than two years of experience
- Covered employers submit entry level job descriptions to OEWD's First Source Hiring Program team by submitting a <u>First Source Workforce Projection Form</u> for every applicable contract
- First Source positions are promoted across OEWD's network of community and educational partners
- OEWD and partners pre-screen applicants to refer qualified candidates to employers
- Employers make a good faith effort to hire First Source candidates



5 STEP PROCESS


- Complete/submit a <u>First Source Workforce Projection Form</u> of entry-level positions
- Register as a First Source Employer with <u>WorkforceLinkSF</u>
- 3. Create and submit a job order which includes basic qualifications, wage rate, benefits etc.
- 4. Make a "good faith effort" to interview and hire referrals from the City's workforce development system.
- 5. Submit verification of any hires made with your designated First Source Hiring Specialist.



What is the Chapter 12B Equal Benefits Ordinance?

This is a social policy to ensure that employees of City Contractors are treated fairly and equally. Compliance is required for award of a contract. Employees in domestic partnerships must be treated the same as married employees.

Domestic Partners

- same-sex and different-sex couples registered with any state or local government agency
- same proof of relationship/waiting period requirements for domestic partnerships and marriages
- domestic partner registry certificates accepted the same as marriage certificates

Compliance - Chapter 12B Equal Benefits

3 Documents Needed to Achieve Compliance

- 1. Complete online <u>12B Declaration</u>
- 2. Submit proof of employee count (example: IRS Form 941)
- 3. Provide a copy of the Memorandum to Employees that summarizes domestic partner policies (Memorandum Template)

Instructions – 12B Equal Benefits

- 1. Gather info needed—1) number of employees in U.S., 2) verification of employee count (IRS 941 or W-3), and 3) Memorandum to Employees.
- 2. Log in to the SF City Partner portal at https://sfcitypartner.sfgov.org/
- 3. On the certification menu, click 12B Declaration



- 4. Click Add A New Value (necessary boxes self-populate)
- 5. Click ADD

PREVAILING WAGE

San Francisco's prevailing wage laws create wage and benefit requirements for certain types of work – typically construction related tasks. However, certain limited types of non-construction work are also covered by the City's prevailing wage requirements.

Minimum Compensation Ordinance (MCO)

Covered Employer

- For-profit and nonprofit 5+ workers (permanent, temporary, etc.) anywhere in the world
- with a City contract
- subcontractors and subtenants need to comply

Covered Employee/Worker

- Anyone working for a covered employer on a City contract
- Working in the US

Compensation = Wages + Time Off







Wage Rates Effective:

7/1/2023-6/30/2024

For Profit Rate: \$20.22

Non-Profit Rate: \$18.93

Annual increases occur every July

1

Paid Time Off (PTO)

- 12 days (Accrual rate is 0.04615 hours)
- PTO is the property of the worker

Unpaid Time Off (UTO)

- 10 days (Accrual rate is 0.03846 hours)
- For use as unpaid sick time

Health Care Accountability Ordinance (HCAO)

Covered Employer:

- For Profits have 20 or more workers anywhere in the world
- Non-Profits have 50 or more workers anywhere in the world
- Has a City Contract
- Subcontractors and subtenants need to comply

Covered Employee:

 Anyone in the US who works at least 20 hours a week or more on a City Contract for services or on the leased property.



Office of Labor Standards Enforcement

HCAO's Three Options- Slide 1 of 2

Employer chooses how to comply with HCAO depending on where the work is performed.

Option 1- Available in all locations in the U.S.

- Offer each covered employee a compliant health plan at no charge to the employee-no later than the first of the month after 30 days.


HCAO's Three Options- Slide 2 of 2

OPTION 2- Available for work performed in the CCSF, SFO, or San Bruno Jail

Pay **HCAO Fee Rate** per employee, per hour to SF General Hospital

OPTION 3- Only available to employees who do NOT work in the CCSF, SFO, or San Bruno Jail

Pay the fee amount directly to employee





- > Payments capped at 40 hours per week
- > Rates adjusted every July 1st
- > 7/1/2023-6/30/2024: \$6.35 per hour



MCO and HCAO Declaration Forms

- To contract with the City and County of San Francisco, both the MCO and HCAO Declaration Forms are required for contracts that are \$25,000 or more.
- By completing the Declaration Forms, you are agreeing to comply with the ordinances when the ordinances apply to your firm
- A Department can not request a waiver or exemption for the Declaration requirement
