PRIMARY TARGET POPULATIONS

Agreement's Primary Target Groups	Target population is clients aged 60 and older with various sexual orientation and ethnic backgrounds living with persistent severe mental illness and severe functional impairments with very complex needs, requiring intensive case management to remain living safely in the community. Priority population are older adults experiencing or at risk of experiencing homelessness.
Agreement's Primary Target Neighborhood or Area	Primary target will be clients living in under resourced neighborhoods, such as the Tenderloin, South of Market, the Bayview, and Visitation Valley.

Purpose of Agreement:

The new Behavioral Health Intensive Case Management (ICM) for Older Adults works with clients 60+ providing field based targeted clinical case management, integrated mental health and substance use disorder treatment, medication support services, crisis interventions, and collateral work with family, partnering with In-Home Support Service workers, housing support services, conservators, case managers, primary care, and Adult Protective Services with referrals to neuropsychiatric assessment and evaluation for dementia or other cognitive impairments that impact clients to live safely and independently in the community. Services will integrate peer based services/individuals with lived experiences, offer culturally congruent care, and prioritize diverse staffing and increased language capacity in the threshold languages. Goal of services is to stabilize and support clients on recovery and wellness goals, live safely in the community, and transition to less intensive care.

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Felton was founded in 1889 with the mission to promote quality of life through equitable access to innovative, high-quality evidence-informed services for residents in the community. Felton has a long history providing Children, Youth, Family, TAY, Adult, Older Adults and Justice Services with offices on 1500 Franklin and 6221 Geary Blvd. Services include Early Psychosis Prevention, Outpatient Services and ICM/FSP Linkage for the unhoused adult and older adults, and a suicide prevention hotline.

Felton Institute was the highest ranked proposer under RFP SFGOV-0000008342. The RFP allows for an Agreement of up to 10 years (RFP expiration date 11/30/2033) which includes contract options which may or may not be exercised.

Monitoring Report/Program Review & Follow-up:

This Agreement will receive annual monitoring through the DPH Business Office of Contract Compliance (BOCC), including for performance and fiscal stability.

Health Equity and Inclusion Compliance:

The Vendor will provide the necessary information to comply with the Department's Office of Health Equity (OHE) requirements and will work collaboratively to remove systemic and operational barriers that impede providing appropriate levels of services to meet the needs of disadvantaged BIPOC stakeholders and communities.
