Goal

Develop detailed recommendations for a new food organizing structure in San Francisco that will be presented to the Board of Supervisors, Mayor, and Department Heads.

Vision & Values

Vision	A food secure San Francisco in which all people at all times are able to obtain and consume enough nutritious food to support an active and healthy lifestyle.
	In alignment with the San Francisco General Plan's Environmental Justice Framework on Healthy Food Access: We envision a City where everyone has easy and secure access to healthy, affordable food that suits their needs and dietary preferences, and supports their cultural identity. Food is healthy when it promotes a healthy environment and the well-being of everyone involved in its production, processing, distribution, consumption, and disposal.

Values	 Equity: We focus on eliminating inequities in food insecurity and on ensuring that the promise of a food secure San Francisco extends to all our residents. Community partnership: We work bidirectionally with communities experiencing food insecurity to amplify their voices, share information, and collaborate on solutions.

Key Stakeholders

- 1. San Francisco residents who are food insecure or at risk of food insecurity.
- 2. The Food Security Task Force.
- 3. Government agencies, San Francisco Unified School District, and community-based organizations who are advocating for food security in San Francisco.
- 4. Public, private, and non-profit social services entities interacting with residents who are food insecure or at risk of food insecurity.
- 5. San Francisco Board of Supervisors, Mayor, and Department Heads.

Background

2018	The 2018 Food Security Task Force Assessment calls for advancing food systems that prioritize principles of food justice.
2020/2021	 The FSTF member & stakeholder survey brought about recommending changes to the structure of the task force for reauthorization and to compensate resident members. The Office of Racial Equity presents the Food Sovereignty Framework, and Supervisor Safai and Mayor Breed call for "reimagining food security". Jade Quizon researches different models for food organizing for the FSTF. The FSTF is reauthorized by the BOS until 2026 without changes in structure.
2022/2023	 The FSTF 2022 and 2023 recommendations calls for a centralized food policy office in City government, and to invest in neighborhood-level and community-led food policy, and to compensate members. The FSTF presents these recommendations to the BOS, Mayor's office, and Department heads. The FSTF in the fall of 2023 develop a proposal for moving this recommendation forward.

Process and Scope of Work

Formation of subcommittee	 The subcommittee will need at least one task force member to chair subcommittee. FSTF and community members are encouraged to join. DPH/Office of Anti-Racism and Equity will staff the subcommittee.
Host monthly meetings	Meetings will be virtual and are public and open to everyone to participate and provide public comment.

Defining and prioritizing criteria	 The subcommittee will collectively develop and review criteria for evaluating different food organizing structures and models. The subcommittee will decide priority criteria based on what's most important for San Francisco's needs.
Research on food organizing structures and models	 The subcommittee members will engage in research on food policy structures and models outside of the monthly meeting and report back to subcommittee on findings. A consultant will be hired to support with research and data collection/organization.
Guest presentations on different food policy structures and models	The subcommittee will coordinate and connect with other food policy bodies throughout the country to have them present at subcommittee meetings or meet with them about their structure, best practices, challenges, advantages, and disadvantages, etc.
Discussion and collaborative decision-making	 The subcommittee will engage in discussion related to criteria and food organizing structures and models. The subcommittee will review advantages and disadvantages of each structure and model and see which best meet the food security needs of San Francisco. The subcommittee will provide monthly updates to the FSTF and prepare recommendations for the FSTF to vote on to present to the Board of Supervisors, Mayor, and Department Heads.

Subcommittee Structure and Membership

- 1. The subcommittee will be chaired by a Food Security Task Force member.
- 2. The subcommittee will include FSTF members as well as people not on the Task Force.
- 3. The minimum time commitment is a monthly, 1.5-hour virtual meeting.
- 4. The subcommittee will be required to engage in independent work outside of the monthly meeting to prepare for discussions and decision-making at monthly meetings.
- 5. The subcommittee will report to the FSTF at least once a month.

Timeline and Milestones

September 2023	 The subcommittee proposal was shared at the September 6 FSTF meeting. First subcommittee meeting to be held on September 26.
October – December 2023	 The subcommittee will connect with presenters from other city/state food policy councils to learn of other models. December 2023 – the subcommittee will finalize the criteria list for the entire FSTF to vote on.
January – February 2024	 January FSTF meeting – FSTF members will vote on criteria list and finalize for priority ranking. Subcommittee and FSTF members rank criteria list. Subcommittee continues to meet to with city/state food policy councils.
February – May 2024	 The subcommittee will review rankings and develop recommendations. May 1 FSTF meeting – the FSTF will vote on a model to recommend to the BOS/Mayor.
May – July 2024	 The subcommittee will present recommendations to BOS, Mayor, Department Heads, and community meetings. Refine recommendations as needed.
August 2024	The process to adopt recommendations is outlined and FSTF takes action to implement.
