Founded in San Francisco’s Richmond District in 1974, RAMS offers comprehensive services that aim to meet the behavioral health, social, vocational, and educational needs of the diverse community of the San Francisco Area with expertise in serving the Asian & Pacific Islander American and Russian-speaking populations.

If RFGA Use:

Richmond Area Multi Services Inc was selected under RFGA Sourcing Event 7482. Richmond Area Multi Services Inc was the highest ranked proposer. The RFGA allows for an Agreement of up to 10 years which includes contract options which may or may not be exercised.

This Agreement will receive annual monitoring through the DPH Business Office of Contract Compliance (BOCC), including for performance and fiscal stability.
