Purpose of Agreement:

The purpose of this agreement is to integrate Peer Counselors into the City's Street Overdose Response Team (SORT), and the Department's Post Overdose Engagement Team (POET). In so doing, RAMS will hire, train and provide supervision for Peer Counselors in these roles. SORT is managed by the San Francisco Fire Department, and the team includes a RAMS Peer Counselor and an SFFD Community Paramedic who sit on the "rig" and respond to calls that have been triaged through 911 to serve as a corespondent to standard 911 paramedic response.

For POET, the RAMS Peer Counselors, DPH Street Medicine, and the non-profit Harm Reduction Therapy Center behavioral health clinicians provide follow-up care and linkages to individuals identified in response to an overdose. The contract covers 9.0 FTE Peer Counselors for a total cost of \$338,958 (\$37,662/staff), 1.75

This Agreement is for the provision of direct treatment/services that serves as an extension of DPH's service delivery system.

Peer Supervisors at \$76,606 total (\$43,774/staff) as well as benefits and associated programmatic and administrative support costs, and program supplies. Annual program costs are \$1,508,000 annually.

The Units of Services (UOS) time duration varies based on the team assignment. Sometimes it might be an outreach to a specific client and sometimes it might cover an hourly shift on the rig with EMS responding to 911 calls or attempting to locate clients for follow up. The Peer Counselors play integral roles in San Francisco's SORT and POET overdose prevention teams. POET is managed by DPH under the section Whole Person Integrated Care (WPIC).

Prior to the proposed contract, there was an existing RAMS contract for SORT, which was approved by the Health Commission on June 6, 2022 for the contract ending 12/31/23. Then, the SORT service was brand new and the contract was authorized under Chapter 21.42 sole source authority. Subsequently, RFGA 7089 was issued to continue the peer role as part of SORT, and to add the POET programming component. The subject contract reflects both programs and is reflected on the Health Commission Memo to reflect the new programming that has been added.

RAMS, Inc. is a non-profit mental health organization that is committed to advocating for and providing community-based, culturally competent, and consumer-guided comprehensive services. Founded in San Francisco's Richmond District in 1974, RAMS offers comprehensive services that aim to meet the behavioral health, social, vocational, and educational needs of the diverse community of the San Francisco Area with expertise in serving the Asian & Pacific Islander American and Russian-speaking populations.

Richmond Area Multi Services Inc was selected under RFGA Sourcing Event 7089. Richmond Area Multi Services Inc was the highest ranked proposer. The RFP allows for an Agreement of up to 10 years which includes contract options which may or may not be exercised.

Monitoring Report/Program Review & Follow-up:

This Agreement will receive annual monitoring through the DPH Business Office of Contract Compliance (BOCC), including for performance and fiscal stability.

Health Equity and Inclusion Compliance:

The Vendor will provide the necessary information to comply with the Department's Office of Health Equity (OHE) requirements and will work collaboratively to remove systemic and operational barriers that impede providing appropriate levels of services to meet the needs of disadvantaged BIPOC stakeholders and communities.
