The Juvenile Probation Department would like to direct your attention to the following slides from the February 2024 Monthly Data Report:

**JH Chart 1.1: Admissions & Releases (slide 6)**

- There were 28 admissions in February, 61% of which were mandatory.
- Most of the non-mandatory admissions were due to no non-secure option available.

**JH Chart 1.2: Average & Peak Population (slide 7)**

- The average daily population in February was 29 young people, with a peak population of 32.

**JH Chart 3.2: Average Length of Stay for Youth Released (slide 15)**

- The average length of stay for youth released in February was 12 days.

**PS Chart 1: Referrals to Probation & Diversion Referrals (slides 22 -23)**

- There were 63 referrals to Probation in February, and 13 were either counseled/referred and closed or diverted.

**PS Chart 4.2: Alternative Placements by Details (slide 36)**

- The number of youth in alternative placements in February was 37% higher than the 2023 average. The largest increase over the last year has been in RFA placements.
