The Juvenile Probation Department would like to direct your attention to the following slides from the March 2024 Monthly Data Report:

JH Chart 1.2: Average & Peak Population (slide 7)

• The average daily population in March was 27 young people, with a peak population of 30.

JH Chart 4.1: Admissions by % Mandatory (slide 17 – new slide)

• There were 35 admissions in March, 80% of which were mandatory.

JH Chart 3.1: Average Length of Stay for Detained Youth Released (slide 14)

• The median length of stay for detained youth released in March decreased to 6 days, the same as the 2023 average, after having increased for the first two months of the year.

PS Chart 1: Referrals to Probation & Diversion Referrals (slides 22)

 There were 80 referrals to Probation in March, and 13 were either counseled/referred and closed or diverted.

PS Chart 3.2: Huckleberry Service Referrals (slide 34 – new slide)

 In March, 29 youth were referred to services at Huckleberry Youth Programs, regardless of diversion status.

PS Chart 4.2: Alternative Placements by Details (slide 37)

• As of the last day of March, there were 13 youth placed with Resource Families (RFAs) in comparison to 1 youth in an STRTP (formerly referred to as a group home).
