At the request of the Police Commission, the DPA researched how police departments in other jurisdictions run homicide/cold case tip lines. Below is a chart summarizing our research as well as findings from a survey we sent to ten similarly situated jurisdictions.

## **Notable Findings:**

- San Francisco offers the highest Homicide/Cold Case reward of all city and county reward programs. For context, the SFPD's highest reward is equal to the FBI's minimum reward for the "Ten Most Wanted Fugitives" at \$250,000.
- The four jurisdictions that participated in our survey reported similar experiences
  utilizing third-party reporting systems. They acknowledged third-party tip lines as
  providing a high volume of information and found the tips useful to corroborate
  known information.
- News articles around the country have questioned the effectiveness of both inhouse and third-party tip lines.
