If you are not already enrolled, the SF Health Service System (SFHSS) Open Enrollment Period is your opportunity to get enrolled in CCSF's high quality employee health care system. **The Open Enrollment period for 2024 is between September 30th and October 25th**. If you use a flexible spending account, you must enroll and elect in this yearly.

- > The ROVING Vaccine Nurse will provide the following services:
 - o Conduct the screening

 - Provide Vaccine Information Sheet and education (including side effects)
 - Provide the vaccination record
 - If applicable monitor the patient and/ or advise the team when the monitoring time will conclude - no longer applicable/ recommended by CDC for most of the public (nurse will assess which patients need monitoring from screening)
 - Provide anaphylaxis management and medications as-needed


TRAUMA DOCUMENTATION REMINDER:

The American College of Surgeons requires for the highest level of activation (900 TTA), the trauma surgeon must be at the patients bedside within 15 minutes. THANK YOU for continuing to capture Trauma Attending arrival time for our 900 TTA and our 900 Upgrades!

Performance Metrics

For the highest level of activation, at least 80% of the time, the trauma surgeon must be at the patient's bedside within 15 minutes

EDUCATIONAL OPPORTUNITIES

PEM PEARL

A <u>recent study</u> of over 31,000 pediatric trauma activations from 15 trauma centers in LA County found that **children with lower child opportunity indices** (COIs, a measure of neighborhood level resources critical for children's development) had **WAY higher mortality rates** after trauma (we're talking mortality rates **47.6%** in very low COI compared to **7.6%** in very high!). Many of the children we care for at SFGH have lower COIs and these findings will apply to them.

In addition to the unsurprising, yet appalling disparity in <u>pediatric mortality</u> (reminding ourselves that this is <u>children</u> <u>dying</u>-- a grave outcome), there are some other interesting tidbits in the paper:

- Highest mortality was from assaults, followed by PVAs and MVCs
- 32.6% of all fatalities were from firearms
- Kids from lower COIs were more likely to die from **assault**, whereas kids from higher COIs were more likely to die from **self-inflicted** injuries

How might this change our practice? Well, being aware of the fact that many of the children we care for are already more likely to die from their injuries solely because of where they live can help us to proactively mitigate our own biases and really go the extra mile to give the child their very best chance of survival. This data also affirms the excellent injury prevention work by the Wraparound Program to help save our community's children from unnecessary deaths by assault and/or firearms. Make sure to refer any children injured by violence (other than IPV or child abuse) to the wraparound program, wraparoundreferrals@ucsf.edu. You could save one or several lives and break this tragic cycle!
