What is Buprenorphine?

- Buprenorphine is a medication for chronic pain or opioid use disorder.
 It sometimes includes naloxone.
- It replaces and blocks the effects of other opioids.
- Buprenorphine helps to:
 - stop withdrawal
 - reduce cravings
 - prevent overdose
- It is usually taken every day. You may feel sick if you stop it suddenly.

What if I Stop Buprenorphine and Go Back to Using Opioids?

Call us for advice! Or you can always try again. We are here to support you.

The drug supply is changing and can be more potent, so withdrawal symptoms may be different than previous tries.



REFILLS: Follow up with your provider. May need to adjust daily dose to address cravings and withdrawal.

DURATION: Discuss with your provider.



Starting Macrodosing Buprenorphine

Macrodosing is quickly starting buprenorphine with the intention of continuing on a stable dose of buprenorphine.

It is putting yourself through withdrawal quickly to switch your body fully to buprenorphine.

Day 1:

- Stop taking the opioid you had been taking (like fentanyl, heroin, oxycodone, etc).
- Take up to 32 mg total on the first day.

Days 2-7:

Use the dose recommended
to you:
(generally 8 mg three times daily)

What to Expect

- Macrodosing will likely lead to intense withdrawal symptoms.
- The longer you wait to start, the less severe withdrawal symptoms will be.
- Withdrawal symptoms
 can include body aches,
 diarrhea, vomiting,
 sweating, restlessness,
 shaking, yawning,
 or goosebumps.

What if the Withdrawal Symptoms are Too Much?

- You may be provided with additional medications for withdrawal symptoms.
 Use them if you need to.
- Call 911 or go to the hospital if you are having trouble breathing, cannot control vomiting or diarrhea, or are experiencing changes in how you are thinking.
- If you aren't sure and are able to wait, call CBHS Pharmacy or your provider.

Ready to Dose?

Drink water before.

Dry mouth can slow down dissolving.



Your film or tablet must be dissolved **under the tongue.**



Do not talk, eat, drink, smoke, or put anything in your mouth while the medication dissolves (about 5-10 minutes).



5 mins after your dose has fully dissolved, swish a large sip of water around your mouth, then swallow.



When is Buprenorphine Dangerous?

- When injected or snorted
- When taken with other things
 that make you
 sleepy (alcohol, GHB, benzodiazepines, certain sleep medications)
